Stab Victim Said Critical

A Klamath Indian, Merle Weeks, is in critical condition at Klamath Valley Hospital today from a stab wound in his left side, and a Mexican transient, Francisco Garcia, 57, has been booked at the City Jail for assault with a dangerous weapon.

The stabbing occurred Saturday night at 8th and Klamath, and Garcia was arrested at 12th and Klamath a short time later.

Garcia said he had bought a bottle of wine and that he and Weeks drank it in an alley off Klamath Avenue. Then he said, Weeks wanted him to buy more wine, but that he didn't have any money.

He said Weeks struck him with his fist because he couldn't get any more wine, and that started the fight in which Weeks was stabbed. When Garcia was picked up, he had a hunting knife scabbard in his possession, but no knife. He said he didn't know what became of the knife.

Police took Weeks to the hospital and booked Garcia for being drunk as well as on the assault count. Two women who reportedly witnessed the stabbing Vivian Tupper and Pauline Riddle, also were arrested for being drunk.

for a short while but died some 30 minutes after he was hit. The hunting party had left a pickup on a timber trail and hiked two to three miles into their hunting spot. Moore stayed with his fatally wounded son and Beauchamp returned to the pickup and drove to the Buck Peak forest lookout station to summon aid. From lookout station news of the tragedy was radioed to Klamath Forest Protective headquarters here and an ambulance and rescue crew was quickly formed here. Beauchamp in his first message, said Young Moore "was either dying or dead" when he left the accident scene to get help.

That message was received at KPFA headquarters at 12:50 p.m. and it was not known positively that Moore was dead until the rescue party arrived at the accident scene about 4:40 p.m. The grief-stricken father was repeatedly assured by friends and persons who investigated the accident that he was in no way to blame. Many who had hunted with the elder Moore remarked that he was an extremely cautious hunter. Young Moore and his wife became parents of their first child, a son, only a little over two months ago. Moore was sales manager at Juergeland Truck and Sales used car lot.

He was a Klamath Union High School graduate. After leaving KUH, he studied at the University of Oregon.

His father is general manager of Balsiger Motor Company. Besides his widow, son and parents, the young man is survived by a sister, Marilyn; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Moore; and maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lee Burkner.

Funeral arrangements are to be announced by Ward's Funeral Home.

Potato Festival Committee Reports Prize List, Rules

MERRILL - Committees handling the agricultural exhibits for the annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival to be held here Friday and Saturday have announced exhibit regulations and prize lists. Competition has been thrown open to growers of certified seed stock on a state-wide basis for the first time this year. Early indications are that Deschutes growers, state champions on commercial grades last year will be down again in full force.

EXHIBIT REGULATIONS Exhibitors are requested to notify the Festival Headquarters of their intent to enter on or by Thursday, October 16, 1952. Exhibitors must use labels and tags furnished by Headquarters. All exhibits in Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 9 are to remain the property of Klamath Basin Potato Festival. All other exhibits must be claimed on October 20th and any not so claimed by October 22nd will be forfeited. If there are less entries than premiums in any lot the judge is not required to award the first prize if the entries are of inferior quality. Exhibits should be delivered at the Merrill High School on Thursday, October 16th. Any produce not listed may be exhibited if desired and arrangements made with Festival Headquarters.

Ribbons representing first prize in all lots and classes will be placed on the winning exhibits and must be presented at the Festival Headquarters on Monday, October 20th for the awards.

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General Smith Lauds Truman In Handling Commie Problem

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, head of the Central Intelligence Agency, said Monday if the next president, whether Democratic or Republican, "does as well as President Truman" in fighting Communism in the federal government the American people "have little to worry about."

The general made the statement as a witness before an open hearing of the House Un-American Activities Committee which had subpoenaed him to explain testimony he gave on Sept. 29 at the McCarthy-Beaton slander and libel hearing that he believed Communists "are so stupid and adept they have infiltrated every security agency of the government."

Smith said Monday that his statement was "predicted on pure theory and past performance." He added under cross-examination by committee counsel:

"I would be extremely complacent if I believed that there was no Communist infiltration in the government."

Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.), asked the general (left): "Do you know positively that there are Communists in your organization (the CIA)?"

"I am morally certain that there are Communists in the Central Intelligence Agency," Smith replied. Walter asked: "Do you know who they are?"

Smith replied: "No." Walter, committee chairman John S. Wood (D-Ga.), and Rep. Harold Velde (R-Ill.), aided by counsel Frank S. Tavenner Jr., questioned Smith repeatedly on his Sept. 29 statement.

Walter said "such a statement is disturbing to the entire country." "One of the reasons I came here today was to alleviate that disturbance," Smith replied.

Burglars Hit Liquor Store

GILCHRIST - The Oregon Liquor Control Commission store here was burglarized sometime after closing time Saturday night.
