## Reynolds, Wilhem ER Kings

NEW YORK (AP) — Veteran Allie Reynolds of the New York Yankees and rookie Hoyt Wilhelm of the New York Giants, a pair of sturdy pitching stalwarts, are the 1952 major league earned run leaders. Reynolds, in his 11th season in the majors, topped the American League hurlers with a dazzling 2.07. Wilhelm, a relief specialist, paced the National League in earned run effectiveness with an impressive 2.43 mark.

Final statistics compiled by the Associated Press disclose that Reynolds allowed 56 earned runs in 244 innings. Wilhelm was solved for 43 untended failures in 158 frames.

In becoming the first Yankee twirler to capture the earned run crown since Spud Chandler turned the trick in 1947, Reynolds pitched 94 complete games, six of them shutouts.

The St. Louis Cardinals did not drop a double-header during the 1952 season. They also topped the National League in one-run victories.

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## Spartans Lead In Yardage

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NEW YORK (AP) — It follows as a matter of natural course that the No. 1 college football team in the country should have the No. 1 offense.

That, at least, was the situation Wednesday when latest statistics of the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau showed that Michigan State, top-ranked in the Associated Press poll, is leading all other major college teams in advancing the ball.

The Spartans broke loose with 592 yards in walloping Texas A&M last Saturday, 48-6, to wrest the elusive team lead from Tulsa, which fell to 12th after a mediocre day against Houston.

Most of the Spartans' yardage, totaling 1,396 for three games, has been picked up through the air, leaving California the honor of being the sport's most effective ground-gaining unit so far this season.

The Golden Bears, third-ranked in the latest AP poll, have piled up a commanding average of 361.3 yards a game in their four victories to lead rushing statistics. They have virtually ignored the overhead game.

California ranks second to Michigan State in the total offense standings, averaging 459 yards a game to 465.3 for the Spartans. San Jose State, with 455.5, and Arizona, with 417.5, follow. Wisconsin is fifth with an average of 385 yards a game. Washington ranked fifth with 66 completions of 132 attempts.

Nebraska, which last week lost the services of 1950 All-American Bobby Reynolds, is second to California in rushing with a 330-yard average. Then come San Jose State, Arizona State at Tempe and Oklahoma.

Thursday's game has the rubber stamp. Weber won in 1950 by a 20-7 score. Last year the Owls, probably hitting their season's all-time high, walloped the Cats, 41-14, on Modoc Field.

Hunaker said there would probably be one starting change Thursday night. Larry Jett, who has been showing power at the fullback spot, will probably get the nod over Jim McIntosh.

Gino Leili is at the quarterback position, while Don Foreman and Len Gettlin get the halfback assignments.

The offensive line remains the same. Dick Flannigan and Cecil Spencer are at the end spots. Leroy Wilding and Charley Wagner get the tackle chores. Floyd Printz and Bill McLain at guards and Ralph Vick at center.

## USC Leads In Defense

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California, UCLA, California and Stanford, the Coast Conference's four unbeaten football teams, rate in just that order on defense.

Statistics released Wednesday show these figures for total defense and opponents' yardage per game: USC 816-204.0; UCLA, 882-220.5; California, 1018-254.5, and Stanford, 1026-255.5.

California remains the leading yard gainer, thanks to Johnny Olszewski, Don Johnson and Bill Powell, the top three rushers in the conference. California has gained 1836 on total offense, or 459 yards per game.

The leading team on pass offense, with Don Heinrich the reason, is Washington, with 780 yards total.

UCLA leads in the number of pass interceptions, with 17, and in rushing defense, with 388 yards. USC is second in pass interceptions, with 13, but leads in pass defense, with 277 yards.

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## Browns, Pirates Rebuild

NEW YORK (AP) — The Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Browns, confronted with a gigantic rebuilding job, are wasting no time in getting their reconstruction program rolling.

Pittsburgh, a sorry last this season, and St. Louis, marooned in seventh place, highlighted a busy major league bartering session yesterday which chiefly involved minor league clubs.

The Pirates pulled off the only "real" trade of the day. The Bucs shipped Gus Bell, 23-year-old long-ball-hitting outfielder to the Cincinnati Reds for three players.

Bill Vecek, major domo of the Browns, lured shortstop Bill Hunter, hailed as one of the best prospects in the minors, from the Brooklyn Dodgers organization in what he called a \$150,000 deal. The Browns turned over a bundle of cash and three players.

The St. Louis Cardinals, Boston Red Sox and Cleveland Indians brought up a number of players from their minor league affiliates in "paper" transactions while the Philadelphia Athletics purchased righthander John Mackinson, a former New York Yankee farmhand, from Birmingham of the Southern Association.

**IN DOGHOUSE**

Bell, reportedly in the doghouse with the powers that be at Pittsburgh for lack of hustle, batted only .246 for the Pirates in 131 games.

To get Bell, the Reds shipped catcher Joe Rossi, a .221 hitter, and outfielders Cal Abrams and Gail Hestley to the Pirates. Hestley was obtained by the Reds Monday from the New York Giants for pitcher Frank Miller. Abrams, who started the season with Brooklyn, batted .278 while Hestley hit .373 for the Reds' Tulsa club of the Texas League.

The Pirates also added two players from the minors and dropped two. Catcher Bill Hall was called up from Pittsburgh's Charleston club of the South Atlantic League and Charley Sipple, once with the Philadelphia Phillies, was procured from Indianapolis of the American Association.

**SHAKE PITCHERS**

Pittsburgh disposed of two pitchers, dispatching righthander Don Carlson to Charleston and lefthander Len Yochim to New Orleans of the Southern Association.

Hunter, voted the Texas League's most valuable player, batted .290 for Ft. Worth and led the loop in fielding and stolen bases. He was moved to the Dodgers' St. Paul club after the season to protect him from the draft.

The Browns turned over outfielder Ray Coleman, pitcher Bob Mahoney and Stan Rojek, a former Dodger shortstop prospect, to St. Paul.

**ILLINI IN AIR WITH O'CONNELL**

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — The University of Illinois, predominantly a running team since the days of Red Grange, has undergone a great change this season behind the passing of Tommy O'Connell.

Without any outstanding ball-carrying halfbacks to shoot at the opposition, Coach Ray Eliot of the Illini has had to place most of the burden of his attack on O'Connell's right arm.

Combining with two terrific target men, ends Rex Smith and Rocky Ryan, O'Connell has triggered 54 passes in three games, completed 32 for a 59.2 average. He has gained 520 yards and spiraled six touchdowns, five within 20 minutes against Washington last Saturday.

In comparison, Illinois total gain on the ground in three games has been 265 yards.

O'Connell, a poised 22-year-old junior who stands 5-11 and weighs 178, shattered all Illinois aerial yardage records in spraying his shots against Washington. He picked up 262 yards with 14 completions out of 17 pitches before leaving the game after a little more than 30 minutes of action.

O'Connell probably is the most experienced football player as a junior in the country. Originally he went to Notre Dame and then shifted to Illinois where he waited out a two-year transfer rule before becoming eligible for the varsity.

During all this time, he played freshman football and learned the T formation from A to Z.

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## Harris Inks New Contract

NEW YORK (AP) — Managerial heads rolled at an alarming rate during the 1952 major league baseball season but the survivors are all set for 1953, many with juicy contracts that extend beyond the next campaign.

The signing of Bucky Harris to a two-year contract by the Washington Senators Tuesday just about completed the picture for 1953.

Brooklyn and Pittsburgh are the only big league teams that have not signed pilots for the coming season.

In the Dodgers' case, however, it's just a question of time since Chuck Dressen, who led the Brooks to the National League pennant, is a cinch to be back.

The Pirates are seeking a replacement for Bill Meyer, who resigned on the next to the last day of the season. Meyer was the sixth manager to leave his club in 1952 for one reason or another.

Harris' signing came hard on the heels of the inking of a two-year pact by Casey Stengel of the world champion New York Yankees. With bonuses, old Case could make \$100,000 per year.

Bucky settled for considerably less, reportedly \$36,000, a ten grand hike over his salary for the past three years.

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
