Earl Blaik Ahead of Remodeling Schedule

NEW YORK (AP)—There is a possibility that the most interesting college football result of the season up to this time—Army 37, Dartmouth 7—was widely overlooked by fans absorbed in the prodigious feats of such gridiron giants as Michigan State and Maryland.

Off this one victory the Cadets do not, of course, leap back to their long-accustomed place among nation's elite, but it would seem to indicate that Coach Earl Blaik is far ahead of schedule in rebuilding his wrecked forces. Those who figured it would require three or four years for the military academy to recover from the ravages of its wholesale expulsion in the summer of '51 vastly underrated the red-head's coaching ability.

NO POWER
Dartmouth is no football power, true, yet on the Saturday before playing Army the Big Green displayed a defense staunch enough to hold Penn to 30 yards by rushing, and the Quakers since have

Price Is Top Pro Runner

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Eddie Price of the New York Giants, the league's top ground gainer in 1951, leads the pack of National Football League leather luggers again this year with an overall mark of 316 yards for three games.

The former Tulsa flash has carried the ball 54 times for an average of 5.9 yards. He gained 971 yards to win the title last year.

Leading the passers is Tobin Rote of Green Bay with 13 completions in 28 attempts for 311 yards and three touchdowns, an average of 11.1 yards per try.

On the receiving end, Gene Schroeder of the Chicago Bears is on top with 18 completions for 234 yards and three touchdowns. Lou Groza of Cleveland, although he hasn't scored a touchdown, still is the best point-getter with 25, garnered from seven extra points and six field goals.

In other departments, Horace Odom of Cleveland leads the punters with a 48.3 average. Woody Lewis of the Los Angeles Rams has the best punt return average, 23.3, while Ed Bawel of the Philadelphia Eagles and Ed Kinsell of Pittsburgh are tied for the lead in rushing, enemy passes with four interceptions each.

Runner-up spot in the ground-gaining department is held by Hugh McElhenry of San Francisco, a rookie from the University of Washington who has the best average in the league, 9.3 yards per try in 26 attempts for a total of 241.

North Carolina Lifts Quarantine

CHAPEL HILL, N. C. (AP)—The University of North Carolina, which cancelled two football games because of a polio outbreak here, returns to action Saturday against Wake Forest in a renewal of one of Dixie's oldest gridiron series.

For more than two weeks, all intramural athletics at the university were halted as a safeguard against the spread of polio. Games with Georgia and North Carolina State were cancelled.

The polio situation showed improvement and university officials lifted the quarantine Monday.

Carter Seeks to Regain Title

Ex-Champ, Salas Mix Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—Jimmy Carter, lightning-fast New York Negro, hopes to repeat the feat of another lightweight of a dozen years ago and recapture the 135-pound crown from Lauro Salas tonight.

Carter will try to emulate Lou Ambers, who lost the title to Henry Armstrong in 1938 and won it back the next year.

No other lightweight has ever done it.

The scrap promises to sizzle from start to finish and run a full 15 rounds.

5,000 or so customers are expected at ringside, which would be the smallest turnout for a title bout ever promoted by the International Boxing Club. The Chicago Stadium attraction will be televised and broadcast nationally starting at 10 p.m. EST.

VIDEO FURSE

Each fighter will receive nearly \$10,000 as his share of television receipts. This sum should far overshadow their 30-30 split of a gate not expected to exceed \$25,000.

A big Latin following will be on hand to cheer the 24-year-old champion. The confident little mauler from Los Angeles via Monterrey is boxing's first bona fide Mexican title-holder.

While compiling a record of 45 victories, 20 losses and six draws, Salas has never been knocked out. Usually a slow starter, he opens up with explosive flurries at the close of each round. He is a hard-shooter, somewhat wild, and has scored 18 knockouts.

FINISH STRONG

Salas finished strongly in defeating Carter for the 135-pound crown five months ago in Los Angeles. He is confident his mauling style will again take care of his 24-year-old rival.

Carter, the more polished, clever fighter, likes to mix it up. This is his third meeting with Salas. The Mexico hero was beaten in their first battle although dropping Carter in the 15th round by catching the little Negro off balance rather than with a staggering blow.

FAVORED

Carter rules a 2-1 favorite. He has kayoed 21 foes in winning 38 fights, losing 13 and drawing one. Like Salas, he has never been flattened. He has fought only once since losing his crown while Salas has kept busy scoring four victories, each by a knockout within five rounds.

There is no rematch clause in their contract for tonight's bout. If Salas loses, there are reports he will go after the feather-weight title. He has done most of his campaigning in that division and will weigh in at about 131 pounds, four less than the lightweight limit packed by Carter.

Peterson Back With Beavers

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State's chances against Southern California in their Pacific Coast Conference football clash at Portland Saturday were improved Tuesday by the return of left half Jack Peterson.

Coach Kip Taylor said Peterson, who was sidelined early in the season by a leg injury, probably will be ready for action against the Trojans.

Two other Beavers were still on the injured list. They are center Joe Fulwiler and left guard Cal Moore.

Cougars Schedule Last Home Drills

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Final home drills were on the schedule for Washington State Wednesday as the Cougars practiced for Saturday's intercollegiate football game with Ohio State.

Coach Al Kircher said the squad will fly to Columbus Thursday and work out in the Buckeye stadium Friday.

In Tuesday's practice, the Cougars worked on plays designed to stop Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy, Ohio State's freshman back who starred against Wisconsin in last week's upset win.

Kircher said Terry Campbell probably will start against the Buckeyes replacing Bob Burkhardt. Both are passing specialists.

Andrews Whips Hall in Tacoma

TACOMA (AP)—Sonny Andrews of Los Angeles hammered out a 10-round decision over Jess Hall of Tacoma in their heavyweight boxing match here Tuesday night.

Andrews weighed 177; Hall 180. The Los Angeles slugger took the mandatory eight-count when he slipped to the canvas in the fourth, but went on to win handily.

Matt Jackson, 160, Port Lewis, knocked out Billy Corbett, 163, Sedro Woolley, in the fourth round of another ten-round bout.

In a preliminary, Chuck Ross, 218, Portland, scored a technical knockout over Jim Murphy, 187, Bremerton, in the fourth round of a scheduled six-round.

The Washington Senators topped last season's home attendance figures by 4,000 when they drew 699,000 fans to Griffith Stadium.

Stengel Second-Guessed on World Series

NEW YORK (AP)—Everybody agrees that the 1952 edition was the most exciting World Series ever played.

Frank Frisch, who participated in eight, goes along with that, adding that the 1934 set, starring the Deane and the Cardinals against the Tigers, was the only one that approached it.

This year's Series was so well managed that it was remarkably free of second guessing.

Still the barber shop strategists never fail to have their say, and fault Casey Stengel on three counts.

They contend Manager Stengel erred in bringing Young Tom Gorman in to relief of Eddie Lopat

in the ninth inning of the third game, especially with the superior baserunners, Jackie Robinson and Pee Wee Reese on.

Even the newsmen, following the game by radio outside the park, foresaw the double steal on Gorman's delivery.

Next, Gorman permitted Robinson to annoy him by jogging from and back to third base, without once checking him with a throw to Gil McDougald.

Then came the passed ball which enabled the winning runs to score and put the horns on Yogi Berra. The consensus now is that the catcher was crossed.

Stengel is also taken over the coals for bringing in Johnny Sain after Carl Erskine had blown a four-run lead by yielding five in

the fifth of the fifth game. "Chuck Dressen had Joe Black working the bull pen, but decided to go along with Erskine when he saw Sain. That's how little regard the Brooks' boss had for Sain, whom the Dodgers belted to a fare-thee-well before he left the Braves. He knew that Duke Snider always massacred Sain, and sure enough the Common clouter became the Archduke when his single tied it and his double won it.

"Giving you an idea of how Brooklyn felt about Sain, when Gene Hermanski, the former Brooklyn outfielder, visited his old teammates' dugout before the next game, Billy Cox greeted him with: 'You shoulda been in the Stadium yesterday to bat against Sain. Hermanski, as a Dodger, hit .700

CHICAGO (AP)—A grand jury has refused to indict Jim Rivera, Chicago White Sox outfielder accused of raping the young wife of an Army private, it was reported here Tuesday.

Rivera was accused by Mrs. Janet Gather, 21, who said he offered to carry her packages to her apartment, then refused to leave and attacked her. Rivera was arrested Sept. 28 as he was leaving Comiskey Park here.

Rivera denied the charges. He said he was intimate with Mrs. Gather but with her consent. He is at liberty under \$5,000 bond.

Rivera played with the Seattle Rainiers in the Pacific Coast League in 1951.

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Tatum Figures Navy Will Test Terp Line

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)—One thing Coach Jim Tatum believes he'll learn from the Navy game Saturday is just how good his Maryland offensive line is.

This may sound odd after the 37-0 trouncing his Marylanders, ranked second this week in the Associated Press poll, handed Georgia last Saturday and in the wake of victories over three other foes.

But the Maryland coach says: "Our offense just hasn't had to block anybody yet. By that, I mean, no good line such as navy's has ever squared off with us. The others have been stunting their defenses so much that I'm not sure how good our blocking is."

Still, Tatum recalled that last year the Navy line was rated by himself and the Maryland players the best they had faced. That was a Navy team which won only two games and succumbed to Maryland, 35-21. This year, the Middles are undefeated in three games and have one of the best overall defensive records in the nation.

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—George Shaw and Hal Dunham alternated at quarterback for the Oregon Ducks Tuesday as they drilled for Saturday's Coast Conference grid meeting with Washington at Seattle.

Coach Len Casanova indicated he had not decided whether Shaw, who set a conference record last week by completing 23 passes in 50 attempts, or Dunham would start against the Huskies.

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Cameron May Start Saturday

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Halfback Paul Cameron of UCLA, handicapped though he is by an ankle and a shoulder injury, apparently is destined to play in the No. 1 tailback position against Stanford here Saturday.

The reason is simple. Coach Red Sanders' alternate tailback, Tiny Ted Narleski, is nursing a badly torn rib ligament sustained in the Rice game.

Both Cameron and Narleski were in practice uniform Tuesday.

REVERSE TWIST

BOSTON (AP)—Two National League pitchers who last year won 20 games found the pitching shoes on the other foot this season. Warren Spahn of the Braves and Murry Dickson of the Pirates hit the 20-game charmed circle in 1951. This year, however, fate forgot to smile on the pair. Dickson dropped 20 games and Spahn lost 19, just missing the reverse twist by one.

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
