Jr. Calf Sale Called Off

There will be no 1952 Junior Farmers Club Calf Sale for 4-H and FFA members this year as was originally scheduled. General Chairman Charles Cheyne announced today.

The decision not to hold the sale was made during a meeting of the Junior Farmers last night. It was decided there was not enough interest among 4-H and FFA members to warrant a calf sale.

A survey of county club leaders held earlier this week showed only six "probable" buyers among the county's hundreds of club members.

The sale has been held for the past two years for youngsters to select young stock for development for 4-H and FFA projects. Klamath ranchers consist club-type calves to the sale, which are auctioned off to the highest bidder with the youngsters themselves doing the bidding.

Bob Rhodes, Klamath Livestock Commission auctioneer, was to have cried this year's auction.

If enough interest is shown before sale time next year, the Junior Farmers committee may re-activate the sale.

Federal Court In Recess

The session of U. S. District Court being held here was recessed yesterday afternoon to allow Judge James Alger Fee to go to San Francisco for some scheduled work there today.

Court is due to resume at 2 p. m. tomorrow, and a trial jury panel has been called. Three cases remain on the docket, according to Clerk Hal Kenyon.

Yesterday a civil suit against the Coca Cola Bottling Company of Klamath Falls, charging violations of OPA ceiling prices, was heard by the court and submitted to Judge Fee for decision. A civil case against the Southern Pacific, charging violation of Interstate regulations, has been settled, Kenyon said.

The three remaining cases docketed include two involving auto accidents, and one in which a Southern Pacific employe is suing for damages claimed resulting from being required to work in freezing weather without gloves or warming facilities.

Fire Destroys Midland Home

A fire of undetermined origin yesterday afternoon destroyed the residence of the Carroll Eugene Horsley family in the Midland area.

The fire broke out about 3:20 p. m. while the family was away, and equipment from the county fire department and KPFA went out. By the time the equipment arrived, the fire was too far along to stop.

The old frame house was a complete loss, and the clothing and possessions of the family were destroyed.

Fake Amphib Attack Lures Reds Into Range

With U. S. Joint Amphibious Task Force Off Northeast Korea—The Army, Navy and Air Force combined Wednesday to stage a mock invasion of Communist northeast Korea and drew thousands of Red troops out into the open where they were plastered by Allied warplanes.

Nearly 100 ships including a battleship, six aircraft carriers and four cruisers—the greatest concentration of U. N. naval vessels since the Inchon landing in 1950—participated. So did thousands of well-trained American troops.

Allied warplanes strafed and bombed the beaches.

The troops took only a short ride. They clambered down cargo nets in full view of the Communist shore. Then the landing craft took them around to the other side of their mother ships and the soldiers, in full invasion gear, clambered back aboard.

The landing ships, with only Navy crews aboard, then dashed toward the beach—but pulled up 4,000 yards from shore and returned to the huge fleet.

The operation was the culmination of months of realistic training and planning. There was no plan to land but the operation was completely realistic in every other way.

The mock forces gathered off Kojo, south of the Red port of Wonsan and 33 miles north of the battle line on the East Coast.

The sight of the great gray fleet must have given the Reds the jitters.

One purpose of the mock invasion—dubbed "Operation Trojan Horse"—was to draw the Reds toward the coast so air could strike them.

Three days before Allied ships and warplanes had moved in to soften the Kojo area, exactly as in a real pre-landing bombardment. The Reds returned the fire. Meanwhile, the troops practiced landings at Kangung to the south in full view of friendly South Koreans.

Word of an impending "invasion" was purposely allowed to leak out. The Reds would start moving troops to Kojo, making them good
