



Carter Regains Crown

CHICAGO (AP)—Guiseppe Salas, who left a job as signman on the Mexican National Railway to take up boxing, left a switch open last night and Jimmy Carter expressed through to retain the world's lightweight championship.

The 24-year-old youth from Monterrey and Los Angeles showed an instinctive gameness in standing up to Carter's sharp shots. But that was about all.

The peppery little New York Negro, displaying a terrific left hook as his main weapon, made it look as easy as taking candy from a baby.

After 15 rounds, blood flowed from vicious gashes on both of Salas' eyebrows, a split lower lip and a battered nose.

FIVE MONTHS
His five-month reign as his country's only undisputed champion in ring history ended as abruptly as it began last May, when he lifted Carter's crown in Los Angeles.

The nationally televised and broadcast scrap at Chicago Stadium attracted only 5,283 fans at ringside. One of the smallest championship crowds on record. Carter and Salas each received \$6,428 as a share in a net gate of \$21,429. But each also picked up nearly \$10,000 from television receipts.

Carter's decision was overwhelming as he became the first lightweight to recapture the title since Lou Ambers did it against Henry Armstrong in 1929.

DECISIVE
The official point-scoring showed Referee Frank Gilmer favoring Carter, 81-69, Judge James McManus, 82-68, and Judge Frank McAdams Jr., 84-66.

They awarded Salas the 11th and 12th rounds when the little Mexican fighter furiously and desperately forced Carter into the ropes several times.

But Carter was never hurt and not even severely jolted.

The best that could be said of Salas was his ability to weather Carter's punches and keep a record intact of never having been knocked off his feet.

Carter weighed 135, Salas, 132.

MATCH
Willie Ketchum, Carter's co-manager, said he may match the 28-year-old champion against the winner of the Phil Kim-Art Aragon scrap in Los Angeles. He said the bout, if arranged, would be in Los Angeles.

Salas said he was saddened by losing the title for Mexico.

"It was my worst fight in two years," he mumbled. "My punches were very bad. Carter was no better than when I beat him five months ago."

Carter said:

"I figured all along that Salas was going to fight like he did last time we met. So when he came after me in the last half-minute or so of each round I met him coming in. I more than held my own those times and it was for me."

Cougars Underdog To Ohio State

Heinrich, Baker, Shaw All-America Choices

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Don Heinrich of Washington, George Shaw of Oregon and Sam Baker of Oregon State have been nominated for possible All-America football consideration.

The three-man panel representing the Coast Conference in the Associated Press' nationwide board of selectors proposed the three Northwest stars Wednesday along with Johnny Olszewski of California, Don Moorman and Terry DeWay of UCLA, and Elmer Willhoite and Bob Hooks of Southern California.

Members of the board are Royal Brougham of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, Bill Leiser of the San Francisco Chronicle, and Paul B. Zimmerman of the Los Angeles Times.

Olszewski, an All-America candidate last year until forced out of action by injuries, was the only one of the group nominated by two of the selectors.

Heinrich, named to the 1950 All-America team, was smothered by Illinois last week but still leads the nation in yards gained through the air with 719.

Baker is the nation's No. 1 punter, with a 44.9 average, and ranks No. 5 in rushing in the Coast Conference.

Shaw, an all-around handyman at Oregon, cracked Heinrich's conference record last week when he completed 23 out of 50 passes for 244 yards against California.

Casey Stengel Named Manager of the Year

NEW YORK (AP)—Charles Dillon Stengel, has been honored for the miracle everyone figured he would pull off — but wasn't quite sure about — by being named Manager of the Year for the second time.

The "old perferer" was named on 37 of the 72 ballots cast by Baseball Writers in the Associated Press poll. The honor climaxed a season for the 61-year-old Glendale, Calif., seer in which he won his fourth straight pennant and world championship to tie a record held only by Joe McCarthy, another Yankee manager.

Even more surprising than Stengel's naming was the runnerup position which went to Eddie Stanky in his first year as a major league pilot. Eddie brought a "fair to middling" St. Louis Cardinal squad home third in the National League race.

Stanky nosed out Jimmy Dykes of the Philadelphia Athletics who surprised by parlaying Bobby Shantz and Ferris Fain into a fourth place finish for his team.

Ross Victor; Carnera Signs for Local Bout

Jack Terry, ex-Army judo instructor, played two roles last night at the Armory, his last part being directly responsible for Tony Ross holding a victory over Tor Yamato in a rowdy rematch.

Wild as the match was, wrestling fans' main topic of conversation today concerns next Wednesday's card when Primo Carnera will appear.

The giant Italian, ex-heavyweight boxing champion now successfully touring the mat circuit, will appear in a battle royal against six other wrestlers.

But back to Terry. He was a heel in the opener when he used every illegal tactic in the book to whip Joe Gold, a newcomer to the Armory ring. Terry used the sleep-

er hold on Gold after the San Diego boy missed a flying butt and tumbled on his head outside the ring.

But Terry was a hero in referee's garb in the Ross-Yamato rematch. Each had one fall when Terry got in the act. Tiring of warning Yamato of hatchet swipes to Ross' Adam's Apple, a weapon the Nip used to have Ross squirming at the feet of the ringsiders, Terry decided to do something about it.

He held Yamato while Ross climbed slowly back to the apron of the ring. Terry steered Yamato within shooting distance of Ross' right hand. Ross obliged with a well-placed bomb on the Jap's round chin. It was a simple matter for the Salem Slaughterer to flop on the Jap for the deciding fall.

Terry and Yamato traded judo whacks after the Jap got to his feet with Terry getting by far the best of the exchange. Then, to wrap things up, Terry again held Yamato's arms while Ross delivered the bonus punch.

The match lasted just 10 seconds short of fifteen minutes as Ross won the first fall, Yamato the second.

O'Connell 'Back Of The Week'

NEW YORK (AP)—Tommy O'Connell, a 22-year-old junior who sprays the air with footballs for the University of Illinois, Thursday was voted the Back of the Week in the Associated Press' poll of sports writers and sportscasters.

O'Connell has been the main offensive weapon of the Rose Bowl champions, all season, but he really let go last Saturday against startled Washington when he tossed five touchdown passes within 20 minutes.

That gave him a total of 526 yards gained through the air on 32 completions in 54 tries and an average of .592. His aeriels have gained almost twice as much yardage as the entire Illinois offensive has been able to muster on the ground.

Against Washington, which could do nothing more than hope he would miss his target—the Huskies couldn't get near the ball—he completed 14 of 17 throws for 262 yards as his team ran up an impressive 48-14 triumph after being upset by Wisconsin the previous week.

To make his performance even more amazing is the fact that he played a little more than 30 minutes, or just about half the game.

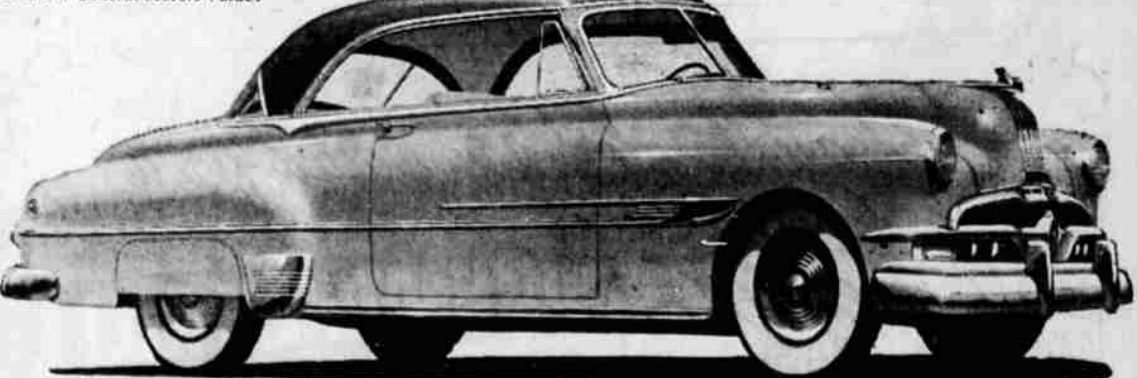
