McKay Speaks To GOP Here; Plugs National, Local Slate

Gov. Douglas McKay, speaking at a Republican rally in the Balinger Building last night, declared that in his opinion the war in Korea is the biggest issue of this coming presidential election, and that the United States ought to either "go in to win or pack up and come home."

He said that at his first talk with Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, the GOP presidential nominee, Eisenhower remarked that "there is no easy way out of Korea."

But, said McKay, the best man to get us out is Eisenhower. He, said the governor, "is the man in the world Joe Stalin fears most."

Gov. McKay and Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry are in Klamath County this week to attend the Klamath Basin Potato Festival at Merrill today, and McKay said another object of his being here is to put a plug in for Republican candidates for political office all along the line.

During last night's talk he urged the re-election of Newbry; election of Sam Coon of Baker to Congress; of Sig Unander of Portland as state treasurer; of Phil Hitchcock, Ed Geary and Hank

Republican ticket headed by Gen. Eisenhower and Sen. Richard Nixon should be elected, and he dwelled upon his own personal acquaintance with Gen. Eisenhower.

Before Gov. McKay's talk, Floyd Wynne, KFLW radio announcer and an Eisenhower booster, discussed various phases of the political campaign and of the present Democratic administration's record during its 20 years in power.

Shasta Forest Tries Seeding

MOUNT SHASTA—An experimental 200-acre range reseeding project has just been completed on the Pit District under the direction of District Ranger F. J. Alberico, according to Robert E. Jones, supervisor of the Shasta National Forest.

The project area, located near the Wiley Ranch Guard Station, was reseeded to intermediate wheat grass, crested wheat, and smooth brome at the rate of 10 lbs. of seed per acre. Over 100 acres was seeded to intermediate wheat, 70 acres to crested wheat and 300 acres to smooth brome.

Work was done by the fire crew at the Guard Station.

Don Cornelius also established a test plot of 10 range grasses to determine germination and forage production of the species at the elevation and with soils existing at the Wiley Ranch locality.

Supervisor Jones stated that if the project is successful, some seed of the intermediate wheat may be harvested in the future, for use in reseeding of national forest range lands in the California region.

OLCC Action Reported

Grace and Marius Petersen, proprietors of Little Sweden Smorgasbord, 5711 S. 6th Street, have been granted a restaurant "C" license by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission. The license permits the mixing, storing and serving of alcoholic beverages from customers' bottles, the sale of beer, and the sale of other malt beverages and light wines with meals.

The commission also announced cancellation of the retail malt beverage license issued to Ole Eggland, Ole's Tavern, 1012 Main Street. The cancellation was ordered following a hearing on charges that the licensee sold beer to an intoxicated person, permitted a visibly intoxicated person to enter and remain upon the licensed premises, allowed noisy, disorderly and boisterous conduct and use of profane language, and allowed an employe to consume alcoholic beverages while on duty.

Currently suspended for 20 days beginning Oct. 13 is the license of The Kanteen, 132 S. 7th Street, operated by Thomas and Florence Middleton and F. W. and Ellen Nicholas. The licensees were charged with permitting visibly intoxicated persons to enter and remain upon the licensed premises on three occasions and selling beer to intoxicated persons. One of the licensees also was charged with consuming alcoholic liquor during hours that he was working on the licensed premises.
