Stock Price Trend Down

Oregon's farm prices on cattle and hogs was on a downward trend this past week, according to information received here from the Oregon State Extension Service in its weekly cattle and hog market review.

On the national level, marketings on cattle continue seasonally high with prices a little irregular. In Oregon the average farm price on cattle was down about \$3.80 from a year ago, with farm level calf prices during September down \$0.50 compared to a year ago.

Hog prices in Oregon still average below a year ago, with average September price down about 70 cents from last year.

In Portland this week good steers topped at around \$32, and good grass steers have been bringing about \$27 and \$29. Utility steers cost \$18.50 to \$20. Cattle prices at Portland continued well below a year ago, with choice steers down \$4 from last year, good slaughter steers down \$4 to \$7, commercial and utility steers around \$7 below a year ago.

At Ontario this week cattle market was steady on steers, heifers and vealers. Steers and bulls were 50 cents to 1 dollar lower.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (U) - Hog prices dropped this week to the lowest levels since early in May. A contentiously lower wholesale pork market was the most depressing factor on live hog values.

Good to prime yearlings and choice and prime steers weighing up to 1,300 pounds were strong to fully 25 cents higher for the week. Other weights and grades were about steady.

\$1,250 Won In RR Case

A judgement of \$1,250 against the Southern Pacific was awarded a Portland Negro, Elise Rhone, 43, by a U. S. District Court jury here yesterday afternoon.

The jury deliberated about three hours. Rhone had asked for a considerably larger sum.

His fingers were frostbitten while he was working as a section gang laborer for the SP at Algoma Jan. 31, 1950. He is presently employed as a janitor for Swift and Company, Portland.

Rhone charged the railroad company was negligent in that he wasn't furnished adequate gloves for the type of work he was doing, wasn't provided with a fire so he could get warm, and wasn't allowed to cease work after he had complained his hands were freezing.

Jury foreman was Ray J. Schumacker of Medford.
