Simplistically marked the recent nuptials of Mary Jo Woods and T-S Wesley N. Hunter, U.S. Marine Corps, who exchanged vows before the altar of the First Christian Church. The reception after the ceremony was at the home of the bridegroom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hunter, 2831 Ward Street.

The bride, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Woods, Paris, France, where Woods is a U. S. Navy attaché, came from France recently for her marriage.

Her gown was designed in Paris by Marguerite Millet, and was of pure white brocade purchased by Hunter while he was stationed in China. Styled along classic lines with a dull-finish satin bolero and a cathedral train, the gown was worn with a long veil of illusion lace held with a halo-bonnet of the same satin used in the bolero. She carried a bouquet of white roses and stephanotis.

A floor-length pale pink net dress was worn by the matron of honor, Mrs. R. D. Hard. Her headpiece was made of matching satin and net; and she carried a bouquet of pink carnations.
