By RUSS NEWLAND SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Coast Conference football, engaged in a great battle royal for the championship this season, had three unbeaten contenders left in the battle on Monday.

Two of them, California and Southern California, will fight it out in the West's "game of the week," Saturday in Los Angeles.

The third challenger with an unblemished record, UCLA, digs cleats in Big Ten turf in the inter-sectional encounter with Wisconsin at Madison.

California's Bears and the USC Trojans come to grips in a game that should peak the 100,000 plus seat coliseum. It will match two big, rugged squads. There is no love lost between the two rivals.

The Bears are the highest scoring outfit in the league. They were obviously pointing for USC when they sloughed through to a 27-7 win over outmanned Santa Clara Saturday.

Southern California's mighty defense has brought more plaudits than its offense. Nevertheless, the Trojans have rolled on in steady fashion, sometimes taking three-quarters of the game in which to get started. They lapped Oregon State, 28-6 last week.

Defending champion Stanford was knocked out of the undefeated ranks last week by UCLA, 24-14. The Indians stay home Saturday to take on a revitalized Washington team that stunned Oregon 49-0.

TOO MUCH In the UCLA contest, Stanford saw too much of tailback Paul Cameron, who threw three touchdowns passes while limping on an injured leg. It was an impressive return for Cameron, who'd played a total of 20 minutes in four previous games.

Stanford will have an even better passer to contend with this time. Washington's All-American quarterback (1950) Don Heinrich pitched three touchdowns passes against Oregon.

Oregon State and Washington State, twice beaten in the conference, look up at Pullman, W.S.C. which hasn't won this season, lost to Ohio State, 35-7, last week while OSC was bowing to USC.

Oregon figures over Montana in their non-league clash, Idaho, 54-9, winner over North Dakota State last week, takes on four-time loser Santa Clara in San Francisco Friday night.

Cougars 'Look Good' In Loss to Buckeyes

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — The Washington State Cougars, back home after Saturday's 35-7 humbling at the hands of Ohio State, donned practice togs again Monday and opened drills for what they hope will be the season's first football win in this week's Pacific Coast Conference clash with Oregon State.

Despite the trouncing at Columbus after successive losses to Southern California, Stanford and Baylor, coaches appeared optimistic.

Grove said the Cougar running attack worked well against the Buckeyes while the defensive line held the Ohioans in check "pretty nicely."

The coach said the Cougars "only" trouble was against their passing.

John Barton, a 19-year-old sophomore, connected on 18 of 21 passes, including five touchdown tosses, for 375 yards.

ELMIRA, N. Y. (AP) — Signs increased Monday that the American Basketball League would vote at a meeting Thursday to allow use of players involved in the College All-Star investigation.

Jobacher, president of the Colonels, said he expected favorable votes from Elmira, Jersey City, Scranton and Wilkes-Barre.

Robert Gass, spokesman for the Saratoga-Harlem Yankees, said in Saratoga Springs his club favored allowing the former college players in the league.

The National Basketball Association has barred such players for life.

49ers Drub Bears, 40-16

NEW YORK (AP) — It appears likely the American Conference title of the National Football League won't be decided until the final weeks of play, while on the other hand, the National Division race has developed into a one-team stranglehold.

The pulverizing San Francisco 49ers rule the roost in the National Conference with a 4-0 record. Two games in arrears are the Chicago Bears, Detroit Lions and Green Bay Packers, each with a pair of triumphs in four starts. The defending champion Los Angeles Rams (1-3) and the Dallas Texans (0-4), the league's newest entry, trail the pack.

In Sunday's action, San Francisco embellished its stature with a resounding 40-16 success over the Bears while the Lions remained in contention by vanquishing Los Angeles, 24-16.

The Redskins nipped Pittsburgh, 28-24, in the day's other game. On Saturday night Green Bay thumped Dallas, 24-14.

Hurricane Hugh McElhenny, continued to scintillate for the 49ers, as San Francisco completely throttled the once-potent Bears.

The Rookie sensation from Washington galloped 86 yards for a touchdown on a punt return and gained 103 yards from scrimmage.
