

# Bears, Trojans, Bruins In Top Ten; Spartans On Top

NEW YORK (AP)—Michigan State's rampaging Spartans continued their stranglehold on the No. 1 spot in the Associated Press weekly football poll today by nosing out Maryland in the fourth edition.

The result gives Michigan State a record of three out of four finals. Only in the second week did the Spartans falter. That was when

Wisconsin took over the top rung. State was second then.

The undefeated Spartans, who are making the experts look good—they were selected as the best team in the country in the AP's preseason poll—had a margin of 50 points over Jim Tatum's powerful Maryland outfit.

Maryland also was second last week, but the margin that time was 65 points, so the Terps are

gradually trimming the margin. State garnered 1,191 points along with 49 firsts, from the 138 sports writers and sportscasters from coast to coast who cast ballots. Maryland, which has won one more game than Michigan State, five, had 1,141 points and 36 firsts.

The votes are tabulated by giving 10 points for first place, nine for second, eight for third and so on down the line.

There were two newcomers to the first 10—Virginia, No. 9, and Wisconsin, No. 10. To make room for the pair, Kansas and Purdue, both of which were defeated last Saturday, went tumbling downward.

The most impressive gain, however, was made by Oklahoma, which vaulted from sixth to third and gathered 23 first-place votes along with 913 points. The Sooners just about wrapped up the Big Seven title for the fifth straight year with their triumph over Kansas.

After Oklahoma came California, No. 4; Georgia Tech, No. 5; Duke, No. 6; Southern California, No. 7, and UCLA, No. 8.

# Waldorf Has Right To Worry

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Two undefeated football giants, California's powerhouse and USC's ace defenders, collide Saturday in a game that goes a long way toward deciding the Pacific Coast representative in the Rose Bowl.

California, 11-0, high-scoring offense led by torpedo-like John Olcese, is No. 4 in the Associated Press poll of the nation's top teams.

USC, No. 7, is one of the top defensive teams in the nation. "We have a chance to win but everything has to break right for us," California Coach Lynn Waldorf told the Northern California football writers Monday.

# WORRIES

"If we are to be in the game we have to improve 100 per cent," added Waldorf who, for the first time this season, has real reason to worry.

Jess Hill, coach of the host Trojans, said in Los Angeles: "We'll be ready for 'em."

Coach Chuck Taylor, whose Stanford Indians meet tired - up Washington Saturday at Palo Alto, told the sports writers he'll concentrate on stopping the Huskies' Don Heinrich, a rifle-armed quarterback.

# INJURIES

Taylor said because of injuries to defensive linemen Chuck Essegian and Ron Eadie the Stanford defenses will have to be shaken up. Essegian has been the Indian defensive mainstay.

Of Stanford's 24-14 loss to UCLA, Taylor said it was simply a case of "too much Paul Cameron." Cameron flipped three touchdown passes in two quarters, then retired.

Santa Clara meets Idaho in San Francisco Saturday and Bronco Coach Dick Gallagher said "It should be a dilly. Idaho is sound and well-balanced on both offense and defense."

# Ezz Charles Draws Brion In First Comeback Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Ezzard Charles, the cautious pugilist, starts back up the long comeback trail this coming Friday night when he fights Cesar Brion, a big, awkward giant from the Argentine, at Madison Square Garden.

Ezzard figures to win the one without too much trouble. Almost everyone over voting age has beaten Brion at one time or another. But in Ezzard's particular

case, a simple victory will not be enough, and he knows it. If the former heavyweight champion is to become one of the foremost contenders, he must win this one impressively, preferably by a knockout.

The situation really is a very peculiar one. The Cincinnati Negro has proved on occasion that he comes close to being a great fighter. Actually, he won the decision over Jersey Joe Walcott in

their last meeting at Philadelphia as several million televisioners can testify. Just about the only one who didn't think Ezzard deserved the nod were the officials.

And now, such a short time later, Charles finds himself on the outer fringe, striving desperately to get back in the running. A purely personal bunch here is that no matter what he does, Ezzard will never get a shot at Marciano. On a given night, Ezzard might cut Rocky into ribbons. The men who guide the new champion's destinies are among the smartest in the business. They will make few mistakes.

Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, playing captain of the American Davis Cup tennis team, is scheduled to leave for New Zealand and Australia within a few days, and there still seems to be some uncertainty about who is going with him.

Though no official announcement has been made, our information is that Straight Clark of Los Angeles probably will be on the plane with Seixas, Ham Richardson, the former junior champion from Baton Rouge, will not leave for Sydney until late in November.

So far, only Seixas and Richardson have been named on the team. It has been taken more or less for granted that Tony Trabert would be given another leave of absence from the Navy to help challenge the Aussies for the cup.

# PGA Eyes Tourney Change

DETROIT (AP)—Match play in the Professional Golfers Association Tournament would be cut to 16 players, instead of 64, in changes proposed to the PGA by the club that will be host to its 1953 tournament from July 1 through July 7.

The Birmingham Country Club voted yesterday to ask the PGA for a new tournament set-up. It got a quick okay from the Michigan PGA chapter.

It proposes that the defending champion and the 15 low-scorers in four days of medal play covering 72 holes compete in four rounds of match play in the final three days.

Now the defending champion and 43 low-scorers in two days of medal play over 36 holes compete in five days of match play for the championship.

Jack Calvert, Birmingham club president and Art Zebedeo, tournament chairman, proposed the change to the PGA committee.

PGA President Horton Smith, pro at the Detroit Country Club, and Harry Moffitt, PGA secretary, expressed preference for a change, which could be made by delegates to the PGA Convention in Chicago Nov. 10 or by the PGA's 13-man Executive Committee.

A major reason advanced for the change is to guarantee the appearance of top-flight stars for four days, and thus increase the tournament boxoffice take.

In many past tournaments upsets in the first round of play have eliminated major drawing cards.

# Being Yank Like Owing An Oil Well

NEW YORK (AP)—The old saying that a Yankee uniform changes a ball player is correct—it changes him from a poor man to a rich one.

Red Patterson, New York Yankee publicity director, turned out figures Monday to prove that playing for the Yankees was almost as good as owning an oil well.

The figures showed that since 1921, the Yanks' first pennant year, members of the Bombers have earned \$3,148 extra per season in World Series cuts.

During the 32-year span the Yanks have won 19 pennants, and 15 world championships and \$3,265,000 in series cuts.

In addition, the Yanks have finished second six times, third five times and fourth once to swell the gravy to a grand total of \$3,525,800. The only time the Yanks failed to check up additional \$88 was in 1925 when they limped home seventh.

Based on the usual 35-man split each year, the extra gold averaged \$3,148 per man.

# O'Briens Back For Finale

SEATTLE (AP)—Johnny and Eddie O'Brien, back for their last year of college basketball, headed the 17-man Seattle University squad which reported to Coach Al Brightman Monday.

Others suiting up for the first turnout of the Chieftains' ambitious 1952-1953 season included eight lettermen, a junior college transfer and members of last year's championship freshman team.

Most attention focused on Johnny O'Brien who broke the national single-season scoring record last spring. This year he will be shooting at the all-time collegiate mark.

The Chieftains' rugged schedule includes games with Wyoming, New York University, Georgetown, and St. Joseph's of Philadelphia.

# Earley Ready For Stanford

SEATTLE (AP)—Coach Howie Odell ran the Washington Huskies through a light drill without pads Monday in opening practice for the Pacific Coast Conference football game with Stanford at Palo Alto, Calif., Saturday.

Odell said the heavy workouts would come later in the week.

The Husks were cheered by word that right half Bill Earley, who was injured in scrimmage two weeks ago, will be ready for the Stanford game.

Earley, Washington's No. 1 passer, appeared briefly against Oregon last Saturday. He took the field as a "decoy" for a single play and snared a touchdown pass tossed by Heinrich.

# Cougar Trio Banned Up

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Three Washington State Cougars, injured in last week's intercollegiate grid clash with Ohio State, are expected to miss the Pacific Coast Conference game with Oregon State here next Saturday.

Coach Al Kircher said Monday tackle Mill Schwenk suffered a broken hand in the game at Columbus. Left half Al Charlton wrenched a knee and defensive back Wayne Berry cracked some ribs.

# Salas Inks For Collins

BOSTON (AP)—Mexico's Lauro Salas—recently dethroned lightweight boxing champion—will tackle with hard-hitting Tommy Collins of Boston in a 10-rounder Nov. 17 in Boston Garden.

Salas lost the title back to Jimmy Carter of New York last week, while Collins again proved his punching prowess by knocking out British featherweight tilting Ronnie Clayton in five rounds at Boston.

Salas, a natural featherweight, has signed with the sponsoring Calahan A. C. to enter the ring at 128 pounds or lighter. The Mexican has been guaranteed \$10,000 or 27 1/2 per cent of the gate.

Collins has whipped such featherweights as Fabela Chavez, Willie Pep and Glen Flanagan in recent bouts.

# Dickson Pitches 24 Circuit Balls

NEW YORK (AP)—It'll be a sad day for National League power hitters when 36-year-old Murry Dickson of the Pittsburgh Pirates finally decides to put his rubber-arm in mothballs.

The little Buck righthander, who has been more than generous in serving up home runs to the Gorons and Sauer during his nine year career, led all major league pitchers in the rubber ball department for the 1952 campaign.

Wee Murry, holder of the big league "home runs off pitchers" record (39 in 1948), gave up 24 round trippers during the past season. He also led the National League in 1951 with 22.

In the American League, Cleveland's Early Wynn gave up the most home runs, 23.
