He will be speaking at the local Church of the Nazarene here, Garden and Martin Streets, Wednesday 7:30 p.m.

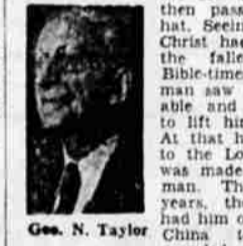
