Adler Fund Still Open

Though donations highlighted by yesterday's \$1,300 contribution by the Klamath Falls Police Beneficiary Association are almost enough to pay for an iron lung, the George-B. Adler fund is still wide open to offers by all donors.

A little over \$1,000 had already been turned into the fund, according to Fund Trustee Alice Vitus, and that makes almost enough to cover the cost of the iron lung being ordered.

The fund was established in the memory of 20-year-old George G. Adler, son of Dr. and Mrs. George Adler, who died of polio in an iron lung in Eugene's Sacred Heart Hospital Sept. 27.

Other money must be raised to cover the cost of attachments for the lung, and for the training of persons to operate it, Mrs. Vitus reported.

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Merrill Has Mayor Race

MERRILL—The political pot has begun to boil after a slow start. The recent filing of Robert R. Walker for the office of mayor to oppose Dr. Frank E. Trotman who is completing his fourth term in office creates a contest.

Two four-year council seats are open with Paul Lewis, long-time council member and water commissioner indicating he would like to continue. Other aspirants are Leland Reeves, incumbent, L. E. Stewart, Allan Carter, and Alex Ducean. Council holdovers are Howard Dewey and Harvey Deham.

Olis Thompson, unopposed, is up for reelection as recorder; Riley De Lap, city treasurer incumbent is also unopposed as is George Williams, incumbent seeking a return as police judge.

The city ballot will be presented on Nov 4 with the general election ballot. Voters will ballot at the East Merrill precinct in the Moose Hill. The West Merrill precinct will be in the Community hall.

Voters this year can vote the city ballot at both precincts instead of in the West Merrill precinct only as in other years.

New Railroad Signals In

MERRILL—Automatic crossing signals have been established at the Hill Road crossing of the Great Northern Railroad at Merrill.

Numerous bad accidents have occurred at that crossing, and the signals are an added safety measure. The corner is blind three ways.

They cost \$5,400, with GN paying one-half the bill, Klamath County one-quarter and Merrill one-quarter.

The signals are Griswolds, and are activated automatically when a train breaks a circuit. They are similar to those at the OC and E crossing at Hager.

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
