

Revenge-Minded Oretch Trains Guns on Raiders

Oregon Tech hopes Saturday night to avenge for three years of football lumps it took from Southern Oregon College.

The Homecoming clash kicks off 8 p.m. in a game expected to set an attendance record for the mile-high school.

Saving their big bombs for Boise Oct. 19, the Owls here that is expected to be the Owls' toughest of the season—may keep Oretch from going all-out against the Red Raiders Saturday night.

But it's a catch the Owls are revenge-minded, not only for the three lumps 1948 through 1950, but for the colossal brush-off from the Ashland school last year.

The Raiders encircled a Turkey Day engagement when the Owls were drooping for a chance to wallop the Ashland crew.

And it was almost a mortal clutch they would have, too, with the Raiders victims of fearful drubbings by almost every team they met, while the Owls were riding high on their best season to date amidst talk of personal or bowl games.

Of course, there's always the chance Oregon Tech will have too much of Boise in mind and take a beating Oregon lightly. These are the ingredients that would mix for a victory for the Raiders.

But if that happened, it would have to go down as the largest upset of the season.

It's a catch the invading Raiders won't push over easily. The Oregon Tech-Southern Oregon rivalry is young, but Herge Coach Alex Petersen's team is bound to be high for this one to keep intact its win streak over the Owls.

They'll be loose too in the underdog role with everything to gain, little to lose.

This revenge business is personal with three of the Oregon Tech players who saw action against Southern Oregon in 1950 when the Raiders notched the last of its three successive victories by a 19-12 count.

The three are Cecil Spencer, Don Foreman and Jim McIntosh. Dean Weekley was also on deck but injuries benched him and soon after he was grabbed by Uncle Sam.

The Southern Oregon squad is made up mostly of sophomores who signed their groundwork last year under the tutelage of Bill Abbey, now in the army.

One of the Raiders is well-known here. He's Morris Jimenez, ex-

Klamath Union High School boy, now rated one of the best small college guards in the state.

Two newcomers are bidding for the right halfback spot with Southern Oregon. They are Don Briggs and Jim Owens. The latter, from Cave Junction, has played under both Abbey and Al Simpson, who sired the Raiders for many years. Briggs is a sophomore who shows promise.

Fullback Ron Maurer is probably ROC's major backfield threat, while Ray Rodriguez, a dippy, doodle runner, runs from the left half post in the Raiders' single wing.

Lloyd Fidler will probably open at quarterback. Starting ends are Dave Campbell and Chick Quinowski, the latter a quarterback for the Pelicans last year.

Homey Waters and Jim Jordan are at tackle spots. Steve Crippen works with Jimenez at guard and Bob (Tiger) Smith holds down the center spot.

Grant Out of Playoffs

Ineligible Player Used By Generals

PORTLAND (AP)—Powerful Grant High School was found with an ineligible player Wednesday and it knocked that perennial champion out of the coming state football playoffs.

Grant, winner of more state titles in football than any other team in Oregon, was leading the city league here until the "ineligibility" ruling. The team was ranked No. 4 in the latest Associated Press poll.

That ruling, however, made Grant forfeit four of its five league games, and took away the team's excellent chance to reach the state playoffs.

It was a technical ruling that dropped Grant. A reserve end was found to be living a half-block outside the Grant school district. City school officials then ordered the forfeits.

That boosted Jefferson, with four wins and a tie, into the league lead. Franklin with four wins and one loss moved up to second place. The league's two top teams qualify for the state playoffs. Franklin must play Grant Friday.

Dancer Gets Early Nod

NEW YORK (AP)—Winter-book odds on the 1953 Kentucky Derby haven't been posted but when they are you can bet your bottom dollar Native Dancer will be one of the shortest priced favorites in the history of the 3-year-old turf classic.

A lot of things can happen between now and the first Saturday of next May. But as matters now stand the unbeaten grey son of Polynesia from Alfred G. Vanderbilt's stable stands out as only a few horses have in recent years.

The Dancer answered the question regarding his staying powers yesterday when he stepped the mile and one-sixteenth of the East View Stakes at Jamaica for his ninth straight victory. And the \$38,525 he won boosted his earnings for the year to \$230,495—a new record for a 3-year-old. The old money-winning record was \$219,000, won by the unbeaten filly Top Flight in seven races in 1931.

True, the Derby is three-sixteenths of a mile farther than the East View and that's where stamina tells. But Native Dancer won so easily yesterday that the experts said there is no question about his route-running ability.

"He had no trouble at all," said jockey Eric Guerin after returning the grey ghost to the winner's circle. "He tried to pull himself up as usual just before the finish, but I kept him going."

Michigan State over Penn State; Penn State is unbeaten and has an outstanding end in Jesse Apple. But Michigan State should preserve its No. 1 ranking with absolute ease.

Maryland over LSU: Maryland's nickname and mascot is that of a turtle. And, if you remember the fable, the turtle always got there first.

Oklahoma over Kansas State: if Kansas couldn't stop the Sooners, the K-Staters certainly aren't strong enough to do it.

Illinois over Purdue: your Saturday afternoon TV feast, The Illinois hospital list is long but the homecoming enthusiasm should be just enough to get them past the ambitious Boiler-makers.

Southern California over California: the Trojan defense, fourth best in the country, to shackle Johnny Olzewski & Company. But

it will be close.

Georgia Tech over Vanderbilt: Vanderbilt had been good for an upset a year since Bill Edwards became coach but this doesn't appear to be the spot for it.

Duke over Virginia: two unbeaten teams with potent defenses and everything indicates it should be a 21-21 deadlock. Duke's superior reserves get the nod.

Wisconsin over UCLA: in the belief that Alan (The Horse) Ameche will bust loose for a big day.

Notre Dame over North Carolina: that two-week polo layoff hurt Carolina's timing and now that the Irish have shown a passing attack they will be tougher than ever.

Penn over Navy: you must favor the team that lists Ed Bell on its roster. He is a letter-perfect end.

Texas over Rice: you can't ever be sure of anything in the Southwest Conference. However, the Longhorns have lost only to Notre Dame and Oklahoma.

Babe No Longer Has Corner on Golf Loot

NEW YORK (AP)—The professional women golfers of this country now are whacking up more prize money each year than their male counterparts did in 1936.

Six of them will average better than \$10,000 apiece this year and will pick up additional thousands from sporting goods firms whose tools they use on the fairways.

Before rushing out to buy the daughter a set of clubs, however, it might be well to listen briefly to Freddie Corcoran, who invented playing golf for money.

"The competition among the five or six top girls has become fierce lately," marvels the tournament manager, both for the men and women gladiator players. "A few years ago Babe Dillrickson (Zaharaj) was in a class by herself. She won most of the money and the others took what was left. It's tightened up now to where the Babe is just one of the girls."

"They've gone away entirely with women's par. Louise Suggs shot 284 to win this year's open—an average of 71 strokes to the round. Patty Berg shot a 64 on one course to break the men's record by a stroke. One 54-hole tournament was won by Betsy Rawls, who led the money winners with a total of over \$14,000, is a good bet to equal men's par any time she goes out."

We observed that Freddie was sticking to the well known names and asked what the chances were for some new girls to break into the picture in the near future. At most every season produces some bright new figure in the men's division, we pointed out, Corcoran was dubious.

"It's a different situation with the girls," he said. "We have seven former women's amateur champions in our group, and they've been playing one another in hard competition for several years now. In fact, they don't call it practicing any more, but say they're going out to work on their game for a while."

"No matter how good a girl might be as an amateur, she simply can't get this kind of competition. After she joins our group it will take her some time to bring her game up to the tournament pitch of the original bunch and begin getting her share of the money."
