# Oretch Collie Scores

Champion Reeder's Gay Blue O'Hillsgrove (Freckles), a Blue Merle collie owned and shown by Francis X. Mulvey, fire chief at Oregon Tech, won Best of Breed honors in recent shows at Sacramento and Chico, Calif.

Freckles, also placing second in the Working Group at Sacramento, finished his championship last August, dominating the collie showing in Oregon and Washington.

His first major show win was at the Staten Island, N.Y., Kennel Club show in 1930, where he went Best of Breed for his first points toward his championship.

Retiring from the New York fire department in 1951, Mulvey moved to Portland and recently judged at the Klamath Falls Kennel Club Show. He was appointed fire chief on the mile-high campus in September.

Also entered in the two California shows was Cloud Cap Cavalier, Tricolor male owned by Mrs. Curtis Jester of Chilouquin. Cavalier placed Reserve dog at Sacramento and Winners dog at Chico, picking up his first points toward his championship.

# Disputed Tilt Gets 2nd Okay

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Another Pacific Coast Conference official has given the disputed Idaho-Oregon football game another month a clean bill of health.

Commissioner Vic Schmidt saw the movies of the game Wednesday and said he agreed with Frank McCormick, PCC supervisor of officials, that questioned penalty calls by game officials were "just a matter of judgment."

Schmidt said there was no evidence of any mistakes by officials in application of the rules.

Oregon won the game in the last minutes after trailing through most of the four quarters. Idaho fans complained about the officiating and the student newspaper demanded that the game be called "no contest."

# Oregon Staters Stress Defense

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State stressed defense in the final home scrimmage Wednesday before Saturday's Pacific Coast Conference football game with Washington State at Pullman.

Trainer Bill Robertson said most of the squad was recovering from illnesses or injuries suffered against Southern California last week and would be ready for action Saturday. Only reserve tackle Ernie Madsen, who wrenched a knee in the USC game, will remain home.

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP)—A knee injury had ended the collegiate grid career of Stanford linebacker Chuck Essegian.

The big Los Angeles fullback was hurt in last week's UCLA game. Physicians urged Essegian to have an operation after they discovered torn ligaments.

Coach Chuck Taylor named Marsh Howe, a junior, to replace Essegian in the starting lineup against Washington here Saturday.

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
