OWED BY RACKETEERS TILLAMOOK—Is Oregon really free of organized crime? If so, why did Federal income tax sleuths on Oct. 4, report that 59 "racketeers" in the field of abortions, narcotics, gambling and prostitution right here in Oregon own the United States \$2,674,808 in taxes?

Who are these racketeers who owe the government so much money? Where are they operating? The FBI reports Oregon crime rates higher in all except one of the six major categories over the first six months of last year. In addition to the 59 reported above, 102 other operators, or a total of 161 "racketeers" were investigated during the year ending June 30.

I believe that we should institute a thorough-going investigation of crime, of law enforcement and constitutionality right here in Oregon. Similar surveys have been undertaken in New York, Nebraska, Illinois, Washington, California and a number of states with excellent results.

Adlai States Nation-Wide Radio Speech; Says GOP Blocking Progressive Action

WITH STEVENSON (D-Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, given a howling welcome in Buffalo, N. Y., doubled back toward Ohio today for a major address which his campaign manager said will deal with Republican "smear tactics."

Wilson Wyatt, the Democratic presidential nominee's manager, talked of Stevenson's speech in Cleveland tonight as one of the most important of the campaign. Stevenson speaks at the Cleveland arena at 9 p.m. (EST). The address will be rebroadcast over CBS and Mutual radio networks an hour later.

In Buffalo last night Stevenson called out Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, his GOP opponent, and what he called the Republican "Old Guard" intent of blocking all progressive programs.

Police Chief Michael C. Noepfel estimated the widely cheering crowd in Memorial Auditorium at 14,000 persons.

Today's whistle-stop schedule called for a speech from the rear platform of the governor's train at Dunkirk, N. Y., and a talk at the rail station at Erie, Pa.

Then the itinerary took him into Ohio for talks in Ashland, Youngstown, Ravenna, Akron, and on to Cleveland.

Wyatt told reporters tonight's Cleveland speech will deal "with the issue of communism, the Hiss smear tactics."

Truman Appeals For Labor Union Vote With Attack On Nixon, Taft-Hartley

BY ERNEST W. VACCARO WITH TRUMAN (D) President Truman today denounced Richard M. Nixon as "anti-labor" and declared his party's leaders "hate labor unions and would like to destroy them."

Appealing for Democratic votes in West Virginia's soft coal and steel states, Truman made one of his rare attacks on the GOP vice presidential candidate and declared that the Taft-Hartley Act "can wreck the American labor movement."

At a news address prepared for delivery in a rear platform appearance at Wheeling, W. Va., Truman said GOP presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower "picked one of the most anti-labor men in Congress to be his running mate."

Inflation Is Democrat Policy Charges Ike In New York Talk

By JAMES DEVLIN ABOARD EISENHOWER SPECIAL (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower today charged that the Republican Party was augmented today by a bitter attack on President Truman by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the party's 1948 nominee.

Dewey planned to accompany the 1952 GOP candidate on a cross-state tour from Albany to Buffalo, N. Y., starting this morning.

Eisenhower last night told a widely cheering audience in Troy that the Democratic administration had adopted the inflation policy to win the election by duping the people.

But Dewey, in introducing Eisenhower, delivered an even more blistering attack. He accused Truman of heading an "unholy, filthy, stinking campaign."

Referring to Republican charges that Truman falsely accused Eisenhower of religious and racial bias, Dewey asked: "How low can you get to conceal skeletons in your own White House?"

Dewey asked the Troy audience whether the voters were going to allow Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic candidate, to "sneak into the White House on a slimy trail of Truman mud."
