His appearance there is sponsored by KUHS Tri-H-Y and Hi-Y. At noon he is to be guest of the YMCA's board of directors and their wives at a buffet luncheon, and later is to appear on a program over Station KFLW. Burr's development in Madras is now used as a model in India for the entire Indian YMCA movement. In all places the Y there furnishes about the only common meeting ground where Moslems, Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, Parsis and Christians work and play together as friends.

MILK PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ACT BILL—Purpose: Authorizes governor to appoint milk control administrator, an instrumentality of state, with annual salary of \$7,200, vested with power to investigate, supervise and regulate the production of milk for human consumption within the state. Act requires butterfat labeling of milk and licensing of milk dealers. Appropriates license fees for expense of administration. Authorizes administrator to designate marketing areas, require uniform records and accounts to be kept by producers and dealers, fix minimum milk production prices after public hearing, and require bonds of milk dealers. Appeals are provided and penalties for violations; all existing milk control laws are repealed. Vote YES or NO
