89-0 Over Raiders is Record

3000 On Hand For Slaughter

It's not a common occurrence for some 3000 persons to witness murder.

But that's what happened Saturday night on Modoc Field when Oregon Tech paraded up and down the sod in an 89-0 victory over Southern Oregon College in a Homecoming game.

The more than three touchdowns a quarter slaughter was witnessed by a record number of fans to an Oregon Tech game.

That wasn't the only record set by the Owls Saturday night.

The 89 points was a new Oregon Tech mark, surpassing with room to spare the 73-0 shellacking the Owls hung on Eastern Oregon last year.

FIRST TIME

It was the first time Oretech had whipped the Red Raiders who held three successive wins over the Owls from 1948 through 1950. The teams didn't play last year.

The score may be a Modoc Field record but no statistics are immediately available.

The Owls didn't have to make first downs. They just took the ball and wheeled to scores in a touchdown blitz that had the customers' heads swinging from side to side almost as much as if they were viewing a tennis match.

13 EACH

Oddly enough, the Hilltoppers made the same number of first downs as they did touchdowns, 13.

The Raiders collected five, three of them in a last-quarter spurt that carried them from their own five to the 37.

The Owls scored 20 points in the first quarter, added 33 in the second for a 53-0 halftime lead, bogged down in the third with just 14 points, then added insult to injury with 22 in the fourth frame.

In all, they traveled 475 net yards by land and air while Southern Oregon could count just 66 net yards when the final whistle ended the legalized murder.

143 POINTS

That's 143 points the Owls have scored in their last two home appearances (they whalloped Portland State 54-0 here Oct. 11).

Meanwhile, Coach Rex Runkner and his first lieutenant, Art Kirkland, hope their charges have some steam left for next Saturday night.

Because that's when the Boise

Junior College Broncos come to town. The Broncos are mentioned prominently as a possible participant in the Pasadena Junior Rose Bowl Game come Jan. 1.

A win over Boise would somewhat erase the bitter memories of the 19-0 loss to Santa Rosa JC (Oretech's only loss in a 5-1 season to date) and could put the Owls in line for one of the various Bowl games.

Only once did the Raiders invade Oretech territory. That was early in the first quarter when Bill Buckingham fumbled a punt and Ernie Bretzel recovered for SOC on Oregon Tech's 34.

INTERCEPTION

But this threat was short-lived. Chimp Prayso intercepted one of Ray Rodriguez' passes on the second play and the punt was on.

Prayso was dumped on the 44. In two plays, Larry Jeter smashed to SOC's 42. Len Genetin from that point took off on a sparkling touchdown ramble that touched off the fuse. It was a magnificent scamper that saw Genetin lose his interference quickly, then go it alone the rest of the way, twice faking SOC tacklers out of their knickers.

Chronologically, here's the way the rest of the scoring went. Carl Bour fumbled on the second play after the subsequent kickoff. Paul Patrick recovered for the Owls 22

yards away from scoring territory. Three plays later Oretech had its second touchdown when Don Foreman covered 11 yards, Genetin two, then Foreman on a right end sweep went over standing up. Genetin kicked one of his seven for a 13-0 lead with just eight minutes gone.

CANADA

Odie Canada set up the next score when he returned a Southern Oregon punt from his 45 to SOC's seven where he was banged out of bounds. Gino Lelli quarterback sneaked to the five, Foreman was dropped on the one-foot line and Larry Jeter bombed over standing up. Genetin's kick was good.

The Owls started a 64-yard drive late in the first quarter that paid off early in the second. Foreman and Dick Flanigan teamed up on a 39-yard pass play to set the score up on the second play of the second quarter. Flanigan, after nearly breaking away, was knocked down on the six-yard line and Genetin hurried over from there and kicked good to bring the count to 27-0 barely into the second chapter.

Another fumble, this time by Ray Rodriguez on his 22, opened the way for OT's fifth six-pointer. Jeter, Foreman and George Clark took turns in advancing the ball

to the nine-yard line, from where Lelli bootlegged it over for the score. After Genetin's kick, the score was 34-0 with just four minutes gone in the second quarter.

THREE MORE

The Owls scored three more times before the half ended. Jack Brown, who pitched two touchdowns passes to which even Don Heinrich could point with pride, got together with Flanigan to put the Owls in position for the next score. The ex-Banks thrower hit Flanigan with a pass and the ex-Granite Passer was shoved out of bounds two yards away from the pay-off zone. The play covered 25 yards, Jeter piled over on the next play and Genetin methodically nudged the ball through the uprights.

Moments later, another SOC fumble, this time by Dave Campbell on the kickoff, plus a penalty, gave the Owls possession just 21 yards away from scoreland. In two plays, Foreman, who makes yard-gaining look like child's play, walked over.

Oretech's eighth touchdown kept the fans waiting during the intermission. Just 22 seconds were left when Brown faded far back to Southern Oregon's 46, spotted Genetin racing downfield and let fly. The pitch was perfect. At full speed, Genetin gathered it in on the 25 and went over.

WANT 100

When the fans quit buzzing about that play at halftime, they started talking in terms of 100 points.

Canada intercepted a pass on Southern Oregon's 40 midway in the third and scooted to the 20. Jim McIntosh plowed to the one-foot line on the first play and exploded into the end zone on the next play. Genetin's kick brought the score to a nice, round 60-0.

The next touchdown was a beaut. Lelli rifled to Cecil Spencer on

third down from the enemy 11-yard line. Spencer, trapped and almost thrown on the five, lateraled to McIntosh coming up fast as the big fullback covered the rest of the distance. Genetin's kick made it 67-0.

SAFETY

That was all for the third quarter but on the first play of the fourth, the Owls added a safety for two more points. A whole host of Oretech linemen blocked Crippen's punt and Laverne Clumf got credit for the two points.

Southern Oregon had to kick to OT from the 30. Foreman caught the boot on his 25, headed straight down the field twisting away from tacklers, headed for the sidelines and scooted 75 yards for his third touchdown.

That made it 75-0 after Genetin's kick was blocked and Clark made it 81 with a dazzling 50-yard sprint moments later. Canada kicked the extra point this time to bring it to 82-0 and ouch off "we want 100" chants from the crowd.

TO 83

Brown again, this time throwing to Jerry Wyatt, puffed it to 88 after Southern Oregon had driven 32 yards and reeled off three first downs in the only spurt that resembled a march by the visitors.

But the Raiders were forced to punt and Ralph Perkins was slapped down on his 44.

On the first play, Brown faded back, appeared to be trapped but faked his intended tacklers out of position, took one step forward and winged a pass to Wyatt for a 56-yard touchdown play. Canada's kick made it 89-0 with time for just a kickoff and one Southern Oregon play.

Recapitulated, Genetin and Foreman each scored three times, Jeter and McIntosh twice each. Lelli, Clark and Wyatt once. Genetin booted seven extra points, Canada

SAN FRANCISCO — Grandstand quarterbacks were still calling signals Monday on last week's upheavals along the Far Western football front, a Saturday of form reversals that left two unbeaten contenders for the Coast Conference title.

Southern California's rock-ribbed Trojans dispelled the myth of California's attacking power, hobbling the Bears' heralded running backs while building up a 19-0 winning count.

Southern California's giant defenders held the California backs to a total of 115 yards, only 9 yards in the second half. The Bears had

previously led the country in rushing, averaging better than 300 yards per game. California's touted All-America fullback candidate John Olszewski, could only gain a net 56 yards against what has been described as the strongest defensive team in the nation.

Southern California and UCLA now share the league leadership with three wins apiece. They have won all six of their starts this season.

The UCLA Bruins went far afield last week to rack up Wisconsin 20-7 and move into Berkeley this Saturday for a crack at California.

Washington's Huskies hung up a whopping upset by tumbling Stanford 27-14 on the latter's field. The Huskies' peerless, passer, Don Heinrich, was the thorn in Stanford's side, throwing two touchdown strikes and directing the other two on the ground. The defeat knocked the defending champions out of the running and put Washington into third place in the standings with a 3-1 record.

Washington meets Oregon State this week-end, the latter a 33-20

victim of Washington State last Saturday.

Four times beaten Montana contributed another big surprise by tying highly favored Oregon 14-14 in a non-league encounter.

Stanford could catch a tartar this Saturday in its non-conference contest with the pass-throwing, fast-running San Jose State team.

Washington State meets Idaho in a league game, the latter beaten 9-7 last week by Santa Clara.

Oregon takes on College of the Pacific in an engagement outside the circuit.

40 Still Unbeaten

NEW YORK — As the college football season swings into its second half of play, 40 teams are listed among the nation's list of unbeaten-untied eleven.

Seven of the teams are major colleges. They include Maryland, Georgia Tech, Duke, Southern California, UCLA, Villanova and Michigan State. All have won six straight games except Michigan State which has taken five in a row.

A pair of minor schools, Peru (Ind.) Teachers and Northern State (Okla.), each have seven successive victories.

Among the teams to drop from the ranks Saturday were California, Holy Cross, Virginia, Bucknell and Central Washington.

Noble Jorgensen, six foot nine inch player on the Syracuse Nationals in the NBA, worked as a representative of a lawnmower manufacturer during the off-season.

Walsh Batters Pentathlon Mark

LOS ANGELES — Stetle Walsh of Glendale, Calif., 41 and for 20 years an outstanding woman athlete, has bettered her own world record in the pentathlon.

She set a new global mark in winning the women's West Coast AAU pentathlon championship Saturday. Her points totaled 2,773 after she won four of the five events and placed second in the fifth.

The former Polish champion won the 200-meter race in 23.4 seconds, breaking her own American record of 23.6. She also won the 60-meter dash in 7.4, the broadjump with a leap of 5.66 meters and the discus throw with a toss of 32.18 meters. Edythe Mendyka, Los Angeles Athletic Club, won the javelin throw with a heave of 27.32 meters and Miss Walsh took second.
