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# Big Boys Bite Gridiron Dust

NEW YORK (AP)—This is the time of year that the titans of college football usually begin looking forward to the gold of bowl games or the glory of conference titles.

Not this time.

The muscle-men, noting the trend of things, are quaking as they ponder to each other. The upsets haven't been startling but each week some of the big boys are biting the dust.

If Iowa, the punching bag of the Big Ten, can whip Ohio State and Southern California, can shut out California—teams that hadn't been accomplished in 60 games—nothing should be a surprise.

Perhaps the only certainty, and that's going out on the limb, is that Michigan State and Maryland are the class of the country insofar as the records are concerned. Neither has stumbled even once, and each has shown a wealth of power and an ability to stop the enemy when it counts.

**BEHIND**

Right behind are once-tied Oklahoma and two Southern powers, Georgia Tech and Duke. The upsets last should be reduced by one come Saturday when Tech and Duke collide head-on at Durham, N. C.

Until this week, California was high up on the list. Then Southern California whipped the Golden Bears, 10-0.

Now the Pacific Coast race is up in the air. Cal still can win it, but Southern Cal and UCLA, which like the Trojans, is undefeated, will have plenty to say. UCLA meets the Golden Bears this Saturday and if they can answer the question, they might win it.

**HEADLINE**

Georgia Tech and Duke will play the headline game of the South, and the Engineers will rule slight favorites. Both warmed up to their tanks Saturday, Tech clotting Vanderbilt, 30-0, and the Blue Devils

conquering previously undefeated Virginia, 21-7.

Fearful Maryland, which whipped Louisiana State, 34-6, will test its might once again against Boston University.

The Big Ten also is unsettled. Illinois and Wisconsin both were supposed to fight it out for the title with the Badgers probably going to the Rose Bowl in any event because the Illini were there last year. Today, the Illini are in the cellar.

**OVERLOOKED**

Purdue, overlooked in the pre-season ratings, and Michigan are leading the loop. And Purdue's 40-12 triumph over Illinois Saturday would indicate that the Boilermakers are getting more confident as the season progresses. If they can do that to the Illini, they ought to be able to take it.

Nor is anything settled in the Southwest Conference. However, Texas is looking more and more like the class of the league. The Longhorns slugged Arkansas right out of the running Saturday, 29-7, and now take on Southern Methodist. Both are undefeated in league play.

In the Ivy League, Yale, which currently is tied with Penn for the lead, each with 3-0 marks, faces Dartmouth, which should be a set-up for the Elis. Penn must play Penn State, no cinch, in a non-league encounter. Princeton, the defending champion, entertains Brown after whumping Cornell, 27-0.

In the Big Seven, championship-bound Oklahoma figures to run through a workout at the expense of Iowa State, and Kansas, the runner-up, should have no trouble with Kansas State. Missouri and Nebraska play the top game from a competitive standpoint.

Oklahoma A and M and Tulsa go at each other in what could be a game to decide the championship

of the Missouri Valley. In the Sky-Line Conference Utah and Colorado A and M probably will fight it out for the title when they meet Nov. 8. The Aggies will meet up this week, but Utah will entertain Colorado of the Big Seven. Idaho State is expected to clinch a share of the Rocky Mountain crown by defeating Colorado Mines Saturday.

It ended an unbeaten season for Coach John McGinnis' team with two wins over Medford, two over Ashland, and victories over Grants Pass and Lakeview.

Charles Gaster romped 20 yards early in the second quarter for Klamath's first score and Gerald Hackley added the second score in the same period with a 46-yard cruise.

David Peppie scored the third touchdown from the one-foot line after setting it up with a 21-yard sprint. Gaster scored the last touchdown on a plunge through the line.

In the six victories, the freshmen scored 125 points to their opponents' 20.

## Fire Claims 35 Horses

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Approximately 35 thoroughbred horses burned to death Sunday night in a fire that quickly engulfed a big barn at Douglas Park, a popular training track in Louisville.

Most of the barns at the one-time race track were filled with horses in training and others that were brought to Louisville for Monday's opening of the fall race meeting at Churchill Downs.

However, the fire was confined to the one barn and officials said no big-name horses perished. A large number of those that died were yearlings getting ready for their first racing campaign in 1953.

## Babe Wins Texas Open

PORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Mrs. George (Babe) Zaharias annexed her fifth championship of the Women's Texas Open tournament Saturday with a blistering 7 and 6 victory over Fort Worth's Polly Riley.

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## Unbeaten 49'ers Whip Dallas Texans, 48-21

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Football League — where the boys play for "Dear Old gold and silver" — headed toward the halfway point Monday with the American Conference engaged in its annual pastime — chasing the Cleveland Browns.

With Lou Groza kicking four

field goals, the Browns rallied to defeat the Washington Redskins, 19-15, Sunday in a one-game lead in the American Conference.

While the Browns were moving in front, the unbeaten San Francisco 49ers (5-0) held their two-game bulge in the National Conference by blasting the wisest Dallas Texans, 48-21, at Hugh McElhenny, Joe Perry and Frankie Albert sparkled.

The New York Giants and Chicago Cardinals, both tied with Cleveland before the day's action, were upset by teams which were decided winners.

The Philadelphia Eagles, 15 1/2-point underdogs, stunned the Giants, 14-10.

And Pittsburgh, winless in four games and 12-point underdogs, surprised the Cards, 34-28.

In other games, Detroit's latent offense exploded for a 52-17 romp over Green Bay, and Los Angeles punched out four touchdowns in the final period to whip the Chicago Bears, 31-7.

At San Francisco, the 49ers scored in every period to hand the Texans their fifth straight setback. Albert pitched three touchdown passes, and McElhenny sprinted 82 yards and Perry 77 for TD's.

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## Heinrich Too Much For Tribe

SEATTLE (AP)—The Washington Huskies, their spirits high after successive victories over Oregon and highly touted Stanford Monday on the practice field Monday, readying for Saturday's Pacific Coast Conference clash with Oregon State.

And while the wins against Oregon and Stanford established the Huskies as favorites in the game at Portland Saturday, coaches warned the Beavers are no pushovers.

They pointed out that despite losses to Washington State, Southern California and Stanford, OSC gave Michigan State, the nation's No. 1 team all it could handle losing 17-14 in the final seconds.

Don (The Arm) Heinrich, Washington's 1950 All-America quarterback, was in top form Saturday as the Huskies upset favored Stanford 27-14 at Palo Alto. Heinrich completed 15 out of 26 passes — two of them for touchdowns — for 253 yards in the air, and masterminded a ground game that sent the Indians' defense reeling.

The Huskies scored touchdowns on the ground in the first and second period. In the third quarter, Heinrich fired his first touchdown pass to left end George Black, who raced 12 yards to paydirt. In the final period, Heinrich again connected with Black who galloped 65 yards through Stanford defenders for the final Washington tally.

The Indians, held scoreless for three quarters, crossed the goal line twice in the final period to pull within shooting distance, but Heinrich's toss to Black put the game on ice for the Huskies.

## Cougars Win As Beavers Bobble Badly

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—The Washington State Cougars turned Oregon State fumbles into touchdowns Saturday and crashed the win column for the first time in the 1952 football season.

Trailing 20-6 going into the final period, the Cougars appeared to be on the way to their fifth straight kicking, 7-0 with the game three-quarters gone, a WSC team that had played listlessly most of the afternoon suddenly came to life, turned fumbles into touchdowns to even the count and pull ahead, and added insurance points for a 33-20 victory.

Oregon State scored first shortly after the opening kickoff when Jim Cordial blocked a WSC kick, and Doug Hogland carried it over from the one.

WSC led the game in the middle of the second quarter on a touchdown pass from Don Burkhardt to Ed Barker, and the Beavers pulled ahead 13-6 just before the half ended on Jim Withrow's pass to Brown after Ted De Merritt recovered a WSC fumble.

The Beavers took a two-touchdown lead early in the second half when Sam Baker crossed the goal line after OSC had moved the ball 59 yards in 12 plays.

The Beavers held the lead and appeared assured of a victory until fumble set in in the closing period and they handed the game to the Cougars.

The University of Mississippi played its 62nd game in Memphis since 1893 when its played host to Auburn in Crump Stadium on Oct. 4.

Seven clubs in the major leagues drew over one million to their home parks this season. They were the Yankees, Red Sox, Indians, Tigers, White Sox, Cubs and Dodgers.
