CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Richard M. Nixon headed by plane for Texas today to address seven audiences in 10 hours as he stepped up the tempo of his whirlwind campaign for the vice presidency.

The Republican running mate of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the spokesman said, will answer the Democrats' claim, "You never had it so good," with a development of the theme, "There are 110,000 boys in Korea who have never had it so good."

Nixon spent yesterday afternoon and evening in Chicago also readying material on Communists in government for speeches at Texas, Arkansas, Longview, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Abilene, Midland and El Paso.

His principal speech of the day, in Cleveland square at El Paso, will be broadcast locally. His 20 to 30-minute talks will be given at the airports at other points on his route.

The Nixon party will leave El Paso at 11 p.m. (EST) tonight for California. After scheduled arrival at 12:35 a.m. tomorrow at Ontario Airport, the party will drive to San Bernardino to spend the night. Nixon will speak in the San Bernardino Municipal Auditorium tomorrow noon.

He declared yesterday that Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, by his silence, has approved "President Truman's injection of the race prejudice issue" into the political campaign. He called this "tactics of desperation."

He had accused President Truman of "the lowest type of gutter politics" for suggestion that Eisenhower "was a protagonist of the master race theory."

"I should think that Gov. Stevenson should have disavowed President Truman's low blow," he told an audience of Chicago Jews yesterday, "but he has remained silent. I think that fact disqualifies him as a leader of united American people."

James B. Poster, special agent in charge of the FBI's Portland Office, announced today that an FBI Law Enforcement conference on auto theft problems will be held Dec. 2, at Portland.

Poster said that conferences of this type have been scheduled throughout the United States, in view of the fact that automobile theft has become the nation's biggest crime against property. Cars stolen in 1951 had an estimated value of more than \$100,000,000.

In addition, crime reports from more than 400 cities analyzed at FBI Headquarters in Washington, D. C., reflected that thefts of articles from automobiles and of automobile accessories comprised approximately 41 per cent of all felonies committed.

The planned conferences are the first step in a concerted national drive on such crimes, according to Poster. More than 100 conferences will be held throughout the country during October, November, and December, 1952. They will be participated in by representatives of local, county, and state law enforcement agencies, representatives of state motor vehicle bureaus and other organizations concerned with the auto theft problem, Poster said.

The conferences will provide increased coordination of law enforcement agencies and utilization of the most effective techniques in dealing with auto thefts.

Topics to be covered at the conferences include spotting and recovering stolen automobiles, registration and title matters, FBI laboratory facilities, examination of stolen automobiles, auto theft rings, coordination of law enforcement agencies, training programs, and related subjects.

The general public and automobile dealers can both be of assistance to law enforcement officers in combating such crimes, Poster said. The dealer should maintain close contact with law enforcement agencies and be alert to cars offered for sale under suspicious circumstances. In addition, he should carefully check

Guard Seeks Lost Plane

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The Coast Guard continued its search today for Gordon Clauser, 40-year-old Norman, Okla., man who reported his plane was running out of fuel over water east of Miami Saturday night.

Four planes and assorted surface craft carried on the search for Clauser, who may have been the victim of a hurricane he tried to tame with a secret formula.

Clauser's wife told the Miami Herald by telephone from her home in Norman her husband had come here to fly into the storm so he could scatter pellets in the turbulent clouds, confident he could stop the hurricane passing east of Florida.

"He didn't want anyone to know what he was doing," she said, "because he wanted to test his theory."

She said he operated a hail prevention company the past two years and believed he had stopped a tornado near Plainview, Tex., last year.

Youth Faces Kidnap Charge

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—A Nashville youth today faces a hearing on federal charges of kidnaping and car theft here as police in three states hunt his partners in a wild highway kidnaping spree.

Virgil LeMay, 15, was placed under \$12,000 bond in Nashville Saturday when arraigned before U. S. Commissioner J. W. More. He protested that he was forced to take part in the wholesale highway kidnaping of 20 persons in three days on penalty of death.

"I didn't kidnap anybody," he protested. "He forced me into it!" LeMay referred to James F. Hill, 29, of Framingham, Mass., who with Charles E. Hopkins, 19, of Jacksonville, Fla., also is charged in the case.

Both Hill and Hopkins are Florida ex-convicts. LeMay has served time in the state reformatory for purse snatching and truancy.

The trio split up in Atlanta Friday. Hopkins spent two nights at Scottsboro, Ala., before heading west toward Huntsville, using the name Billy Lauderdale the second night. Whereabouts of Hill remained a mystery to officers, but he had been reported hiding out somewhere in the Atlanta area.

At Scottsboro, some 45 airline miles southwest of here, Highway Patrolman Preston Bryant said Hopkins tipped out of a hotel before dawn yesterday and was last seen walking toward Huntsville.

Sparkman Due In Oregon

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. John J. Sparkman of Alabama, the Democratic candidate for vice president, will give three campaign talks in Oregon Tuesday.

He is to speak at the University of Oregon at Eugene at 1 p.m. and in Portland twice at night, at 8 and 8 o'clock.

Two other Democratic congressmen also have scheduled talks. They are Rep. Harold Cooley of North Carolina and Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota.

Cooley, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, was to speak at Hood River and Nyssa Monday.

Humphrey is to talk at a dinner meeting in Portland Thursday night.
