Klamath, Grants Pass Clash on Modoc Field

The Klamath Pelicans go title-hunting Friday night on their own shooting grounds.

The Pelicans must get over the Grants Pass Cavemen to seal their ownership of the Dist. 6-A-1 title and a berth in the state quarter-finals.

A victory for Grants Pass, on the other hand, would throw the district into a confusing three-way middle between the two teams and Medford.

The Friday night mix on Modoc Field with Mel Ingram's Cavemen is one the Pelicans have had two weeks to get ready for, since their important 7-0 victory over Medford.

The Klamath eleven takes a 5-1 record onto the field, alongside the Cavemen's 3-3 season mark.

In district play, Medford whipped Grants Pass by a 20-13 count. The Pels puffed out the Tornado, 7-0.

But Klamath's one loss was to

Redding by a 0-28 score; Grants Pass beat the same team, 21-7. That, and the fact that Ingram never fails to field a team that is all-out all the way has prompted Klamath Coach Bob Hendershot to work overtime for this one to get the Pels high.

NO INJURIES

Hendershot said yesterday the Pels would go into the game without an injury, unless something happens along the way this week.

Guy Munsell, defensive end, and Dennis Todd, reserve center, were sidelined for the Modoc game. They'll be ready for the Cavemen.

Bill Salt, who broke his right thumb in the Redding setback, saw action against Medford but his business hand was virtually useless for passing.

PASSING DUEL

But the Battle Ground, Wash., lad will be throwing them against Grants Pass, pointing up a tossing tilt between the Pelican quarterback and Grants Pass' Jerry Yosten.

The Pels planned their last scrimmage tonight with gradual tapering off until game-time to put them in peak form for the crucial clash.

Pappy Figures UCLA May Be Even Tougher

Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf says — almost shuddering — that the UCLA defense his California Bears face Saturday may be lighter than the Southern California defense which shut out his club last week.

Waldorf told the football writers' meeting Monday he had no excuse for California's 10-0 loss for USC had "the best defensive unit I've ever watched."

The outcome raised the Trojans from No. 7 to No. 5 in the National Associated Press weekly poll. California slid from fourth to 11th. Of this week's UCLA game at Berkeley, Waldorf said, "We're in deep water."

"UCLA's defensive team is as good, maybe better than USC's in Don Moomaw, they have an in good a linebacker as there is in the country, scout 'Eggs' Manske informs me that Paul Cameron is the best tailback he has seen in 15 years of scouting."

Waldorf said he expects UCLA

to run up three or four touchdowns and still hopes California is able to score more.

The Bruins rose from eighth to seventh in the AP poll, after dumping Wisconsin, 20-7.

Chuck Taylor said his Stanford Indians "will have to play a top game" to defeat San Jose State this weekend. "San Jose's Lynn Aplanalp is as good a passer as Washington's Don Heinrich."

With Heinrich leading the attack, Washington surprised Stanford 27-14. "Heinrich turned in a masterful job against us," Taylor said. "His field generalship and our fumbles cost us the game."

Gallagher Raps Close Grid Calls

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Too many borderline penalties are hurting football, Santa Clara Coach Dick Gallagher said Monday.

Gallagher told the Northern California Football Writers' meeting: "I think if the officials keep calling so many penalties, especially borderline cases, which could go either way, football will get like basketball. The game will be ruined."

Gallagher said, however, he could not agree with Idaho Coach Babe Curfman who protested a penalty call in last week's game with Santa Clara in Kezar Stadium. Curfman contended Idaho was assessed 60 yards on a pass play when 15 yards was the proper penalty. The penalty was stepped off from the line of scrimmage and not where the foul was committed.

Gallagher said films of the game showed an Idaho player pushed a Santa Clara player "three or four feet," clearing the way for the Idaho receiver.

"The official correctly called this foul," he said. "If it had not been called, I would have protested."

KF Skids To Fourth In Vote

Only Marshfield and Central Catholic of Portland, the state's two top teams, could hold on to their positions among Oregon high schools in this week's Associated Press poll. The others in the top 10 underwent a re-shuffling.

Marshfield, the undefeated season-long leader, again was the unanimous choice for No. 1, after defeating Eugene last week end, 25-6.

Central Catholic held its No. 2 position by defeating its long-time rival, Columbia Prep, 6-0.

Klamath Falls was idle, resting up for its big game with Grants Pass next week end, and the idleness cost Klamath the No. 3 spot. Jefferson of Portland took it over by defeating Washington, 21-0 to win the Portland title. The decision was close though, Jefferson getting 87 points and Klamath Falls 86.

FORFEIT

That pushed Klamath Falls down to No. 4 and Grant of Portland down to No. 5. Grant was a notch higher last week, before the school had to forfeit four games because of discovery that a reserve player lived a half-block outside of the Grant district.

Hillsboro, which barely shaded West Linn, 7-6, was No. 6.

The sportswriters and sportscasters taking part in the poll left no doubt about the district they consider the toughest. That's district No. 5, which provides the No. 1 team, Marshfield, the No. 7 team, North Bend, and the No. 10 team, Eugene.

North Bend, tied for tenth place last week, moved up on the basis of a 47-6 walloping of Roseburg. Eugene was No. 8 last week, but dropped two places after its loss to Marshfield.

JOHNSON CITY, N. Y. (AP) — Michael J. (Mike) Murphy, 64, former major league baseball player and minor league umpire, died Sunday.

Murphy umpired in the Eastern and New York-Pennsylvania Leagues from 1930 to 1936. He played for the St. Louis Cardinals of the National League in 1912 and for the Philadelphia Athletics of the American League in 1916.

Three Get All-America Nominations

DENVER (AP) — Standout performances by three linemen in the heart-thumping 16-16 tie played Saturday by Colorado and Nebraska have earned them nominations for the Associated Press All-American football team.

They are left end Dennis Emanuel and left tackle Jerry Minnick, who sparkled in Nebraska's defense, and Jim Stander, Colorado defensive tackle who dealt misery to Nebraska's offense.

Also nominated by the AP's Rocky Mountain regional board were Don Peterson, Utah's first-rate fullback, and Del Ray Campbell, Utah state's standout fullback.

The board also voted another endorsement to a trio previously nominated — Colorado fullback Ralph (Cactus) Curtis, quarterback Don Rydahl of Utah and Don Burroughs of Colorado A&M. The nominations are made weekly by the regional board and will be considered in the final selection of the AP All-American.

Injured Ducks Show Improvement

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Word that three injured Oregon players may be ready for next Saturday's non-conference football game with College of the Pacific cheered the Webfoot camp Monday.

Coach Len Casanova said tackle Dick Stout, who broke a leg early in the season, probably will be in action Saturday and Monte Brethauer and Emery Barnes, also on the injury list, are on the mend.

A newcomer to the list, however, was Don Sloan who suffered a broken leg on the opening kickoff against Montana last Saturday.

SEATTLE (AP) — Coach Howie Odell planned a scrimmage session for the Washington Huskies Tuesday preparing for the Pacific Coast Conference football game with Oregon State at Portland Saturday.

The Huskies, who turned in a surprise 27-14 victory over Stanford last week, held only a light workout Monday.

Odell said two regulars on the injured list may be fully recovered in time for the OSC meeting. Halfback Bill Earley, who was used briefly against Oregon and Stanford, and end Phil Gillis are expected to return to the lineup Saturday, the coach indicated.
