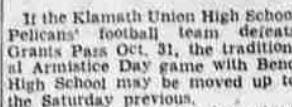

Mau Mau Kills White Farmer

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Anti-white Mau Mau terrorists hacked a European farmer to death Monday night as he sat in the bathhouse on his lonely farm 80 miles from Nairobi.

His two young native servants also were murdered.

The bodies of the farmer, E. T. N. Bowyer, and the two natives were found in the ransacked house Tuesday morning.

Bowyer was the first white settler killed since the government of this British East African colony proclaimed a state of emergency and launched a troop-backed, colony-wide drive on the Mau Mau a week ago.

The terrorist society has sworn to drive all white settlers from Kenya.

Jap Says U.S. In Frenzy

TOKYO (AP) — A prominent Japanese newspaper executive and author said Tuesday the American people were becoming so wrought up over a possible third world war that they were "driving themselves into a state of mind in which they feel the sooner it is started the sooner it will be over."

Dr. Ryuzaburo Shikiba, president of the Tokyo Times, told a news conference fear of a third world conflict soon may reach a stage where it would justify, in the minds of the American people, the initial step be taken by the United States.

He declined to elaborate. Shikiba met reporters after a six-month tour of Europe and the U. S.

He said the war scare in America and the U. S. political attitude were creating animosity in Great Britain, particularly in Great Britain.
