Hunters Fined For Violations

Eight fines were assessed in the past few days in three Klamath Basin courts for hunting violators, but only one was a resident of Klamath County.

That was Buck Charles Short, 36, 2170 Homedale, who was apprehended one hour and 10 minutes past shooting hour closures. He pleaded guilty before Judge D.E. Van Vactor and was fined \$75.

Other violators nabbed by federal game officers from the Tulelake Refuge and from the Game Management office in Klamath Falls included:

Clyde Newell Palmer Jr., 30, Palo Verde, Calif., pleaded guilty before Judge I. E. Chase, Dorris, and was fined \$15.

Leonard Elvis Robertson, 42, Richmond, Calif., was apprehended with two over the limit of dark geese, and was fined \$15 in Lee Sonnenberg's Tulelake court.

Edward Horace Laguna, 30, and Laurence Herman Mead, both of Los Angeles, pleaded guilty before Judge Sonnenberg for joint over possession of limit of geese, and jointly were fined \$40.

Clayton Powell Trivett, 48, Gold Beach, Ore., pleaded guilty before Judge Chase for hunting in a closed area—the Lower Klamath Wildlife Refuge—and was fined \$25.

Ragnwald Robertson, 52, Prospect, forfeited \$30 to Judge Van Vactor's court for shooting one bird hour after hours in the Williamson River Ranch area.

Dick Vander Meulen, 46, Beaver-ton, forfeited \$30 bail for the same offense, though he was apprehended along the Klamath River.

Commercially Useful Earth Discovered In Basin Area

By HALE SCARBROUGH An unexploited source of a substance which has hundreds of practical uses has been located here almost within the city limits of Klamath Falls, and it is probable that the substance, diatomaceous earth, could be found almost anywhere around Upper Klamath Lake.

Diatomaceous earth is composed of the featherweight, fossilized mineral skeletons of diatoms, microscopic water plants, related to algae. In one form or another, it is used as an abrasive, in polishes, as an insulating material, as a purifying agent, in paints, fertilizers, in making rubber, cosmetics, matches, sugar and drugs. It also is the principal ingredient of chalk.

Diatomaceous earth has been in commercial use widely only for about 35 years, since the end of World War I, although its properties have been known for centuries. According to a recent article on the substance in a national magazine (Collier's for July 19, 1952), ancient people used it for building bricks. The earth can be found in many localities, but in only a few instances in the quantity and quality

It's principal use, however, is as a filter-aid, in sewage treatment. The presence of the substance in the Klamath country has been known, or at least strongly suspected, for a long time, apparently nothing has been done about it. Recently A. B. Epperson, local real estate man, gouged a chunk of the white substance he noticed in a railroad cut near Pelican City and sent it to the University of Nebraska where it was tested and examined by a mineralogist. The tests showed it was diatomaceous earth. The extent of the stuff, whether it can be recovered readily enough for commercial exploitation, or whether there is enough demand for it to make the recovery feasible, are other matters not determined.
