GOOD DRESSING Plain wedges of head lettuce make a tasty salad with this peppery dressing. Combine 1/2 cup mayonnaise with 1/4 cup chopped ripe olives, 1 tablespoon vinegar and 2 tablespoons crumbled blue cheese.

BETTERPIE If you haven't tasted a dry apple pie you've got a tasty treat in store for you. Clip cores from an 8-ounce package dried apples. Cook apples slowly in 3 1/2 cups water about half an hour. Then stir in 1 tablespoon flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and pinch salt. Turn into pastry-lined 8-inch pie pan. Sprin-

kle with lemon juice and dot with margarine. Cover with top pastry and bake in hot oven 30 minutes.

KLAMATH COUNTY COUNCIL LEGISLATIVE MEASURES

By Mrs. Alexander Luft With the approach of the Nov. 4 elections, the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers has restated its legislative policy of endorsing or opposing only non-partisan measures related to education, according to Mrs. Hagan Moore, president of Klamath County Council of P.T.A.

At the state convention held last April in Pendleton, the Oregon Congress reaffirmed its position in support of the School District Reorganization bill, 320 X YES. P.T.A. leaders point out that this measure will provide an orderly manner in which school districts may be combined, through action of local voters, to plan adequately for the local needs of each community. The Oregon Congress of P.T.A. and educational leaders throughout the state are endorsing the measure making Superintendent of Public Instruction appointive, 300 X YES. The highest educational office in Oregon should be filled on the basis of qualifications rather than by popular election and qualified professional people are unwilling to campaign for public office. The amendment to the state constitution which will allow taxing bodies to establish new tax bases by vote of the people, 306 X YES, provides a realistic answer by allowing the tax base to be adjusted to current cost. This amendment provides that the 6 per cent limita-

Recipe

WITCH-HAT MUFFINS 1 cup ready-to-eat bran, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup molasses, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons soft or liquid shortening. Put bran and milk in large mixing bowl. Sift and measure flour. Put flour into sifter. Add baking powder, and salt. Stir, then sift into bran and milk. Add molasses, egg and shortening. Stir only until mixed and flour is dampened. Do not beat. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 400 F., about 25 minutes. Makes 9 medium size muffins.
