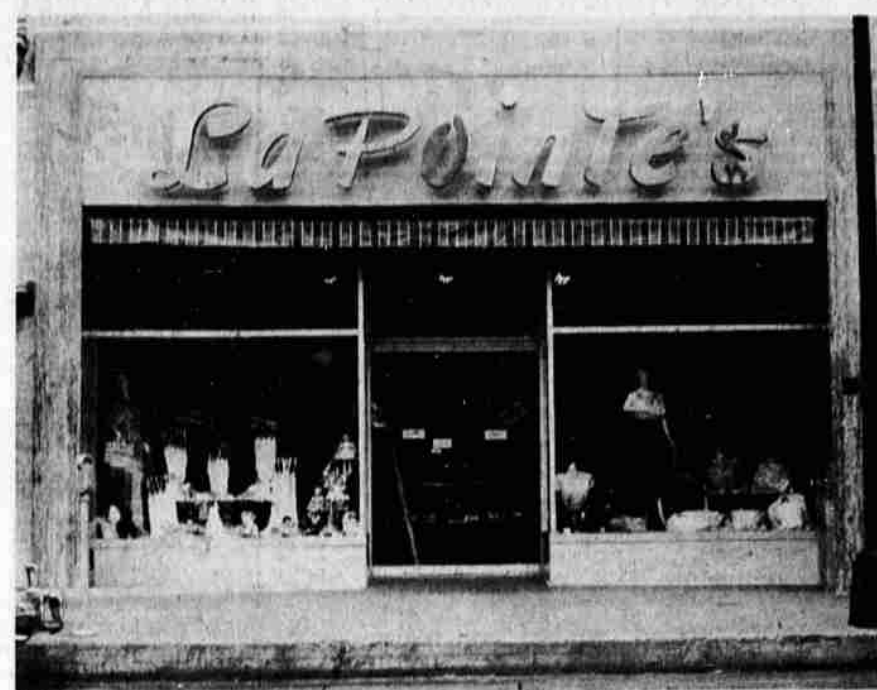


La Pointes' Shows New Store Front



Vermont and Italy are represented in the new facade of LaPointe's Store in downtown Klamath Falls. Both countries are there in marble.

The store, which indicated the parade of remodelings up and down Main Street immediately following World War II, has for the first time—according to Operator Curt Lion—presented a front which shows what the interior of the store has to offer.

The marble, glass and metal of the entrance facade cover the

frontage of the original LaPointe's Store, and new side-walk-flush display windows decorate the rest of LaPointe's 83-foot Main Street frontage.

Italian Travertine marble covers generally the frontage of the new facade, with a framework of mottled Vermont marble enclosing it. The Vermont stone, quarried from the finest marble ground in North America, is matched in "grain" from top to bottom.

One piece, just a section of one side of the framework, arrived here broken, and the entire side had to be replaced. The Vermont marble required special handling.

Lion says his store's expansion period came to an end some time ago, and this last remodeling chore—with a little finishing up yet to go—merely coordinated the front with the promise of what's inside.

Fire Danger Down Slightly

Improved forest conditions have allowed the Klamath Forest Protective association fire crews to cut down, but the fire fighting outfit is maintaining a strong enough suppression and lookout force to keep Klamath Forests protected until the snows come.

To date the KFFPA which watches over about a million acres of Klamath Basin woodlands, has had 80 fires this season, which burned over 61 acres, mostly grass areas.

Last year the patrol handled 82 fires which burned over 15.55 acres.

A heavy run of lightning fires this year upped the fire total, and such blazes as the one on Modoc Point which races up a grassy hill—increased acreage, in the most part.

Fire guards reported surprising little trouble in forests during the recent deer season. One fire suspected to have been started by a hunter was quelled before the season opened, one was started during the season and one about a week after—also suspected to have been started by a hunter.

The lookout stations are manned as much as possible each year into watch control of slash areas. And as long as weather remains as good as it is, foresters report, lookouts also are on guard because there are still many people in the woods.
