Reds Fret; No Laughter Behind Curtain

VIENNA (AP) — The Communists have suddenly become worried about the lack of laughter behind the Iron Curtain.

They complain they can't find anyone to amuse them—because the type of laughter they want is to be political.

Western diplomats in Communist capitals say nobody has been laughing for years. Faced with the general grimness of life, overwork, shortages of food, people on the streets of Moscow, Budapest, Prague and Bucharest are rarely seen to crack a smile.

On trains and buses, passengers sit in virtual silence, staring cheer-

lessly before them. Young couples rarely laugh and tease in public. Humor in night clubs is inauspiciously dull; it is never heard on the radio, infrequently seen in newspapers.

"Everybody seems to be afraid to laugh for fear someone will report them to the police," said a diplomat who recently had his first experience of communism. "It seems to me that laughter is considered almost a sin."

Concern about the lack of merriment recently forced the Czechoslovak newspaper Prace to complain there weren't enough new operettas to amuse people. The old ones, it said, couldn't be played any more because they were "bourgeois."

"Many Czechoslovak musicians," it said, "would like to write music for an operetta, but they are no authors to write the text."

The newspapers have one reason why funny writers apparently

can't be found. It said that "laughter and satire must be raised to be weapons exposing the traitors of the people and a means of educating people."

This means no spontaneous humor, nothing funny that hasn't first been censored by the government.

The Moscow Literary Gazette also expressed worry recently about the lack of humor on the stage and in movies.

The magazine complained: "Nobody wants to write comedies for the movies or for the theater. If one turns to a prominent writer with a request for a comedy, one is refused quickly and categorically."

"This fear of the comedy is due to the fact that several critics, who lack any sense of humor, attack almost every new comedy that is written. They declare everything funny to be unauthentic and estranged from reality . . .

"The comedy may, and must, play a great part in our life. But it is the most neglected kind of art. There is not one comic script among the movies for 1952. Our stage also does not know laughter."

OPS Posters Distributed

PORTLAND (AP) — Price ceiling posters went out Thursday to 10,000 retailers in Oregon and Southwestern Washington.

The Office of Price Stabilization sent them to such service firms as laundries, dry cleaners, service stations, automotive shops, shoe, watch, and jewelry repair shops. They previously had filed ceiling price lists with the OPS.

Concerns which did not file ceiling price lists will have until Nov. 26 to get the posters, which are to be displayed where customers can see them.

Child Survives After Accidents

HILLSBORO (AP) — A 3-year-old girl fell onto a highway from a moving automobile, apparently was run over by another car, and still managed to survive.

Ralph Frank Catchpole, Portland, said the girl fell directly in front of his car and he could not swerve. He said he believed the right wheels of his car ran over her.

The girl, Paula Patton, route 1, Banks, suffered a broken arm and leg, and face injuries, but hospital attendants here said she was recovering. The mishap occurred on the Sunset Highway near Mannitz. She fell from the car of her father, Charles Patton.

Lost Flier Body Found

COOS BAY (AP) — The body of Jack Shores, who was piloting an airplane that crashed into the Pacific Ocean Monday, was found on the beach three miles south of Bandon Thursday.

Shores, North Bend resident who was about 50, was identified by Edgar L. Jenkins, Long Beach, Calif., who survived the crash and swam three miles to shore.

A third man in the plane still is missing. He was Charles Woodruff, West Palm Beach, Fla., who is feared dead. At the time of the crash the three men were flying down the coast for a fishing trip.

Shores' body was recovered about 16 miles from the point where the plane fell into the sea.

Taft Says HST Unreliable

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) — Sen. Robert A. Taft moved into Ohio for more Republican campaign talks Friday after a blistering attack on President Truman and what he called "utterly unreliable" Democratic handling of American foreign policy.

The Ohio Republican senator told 2,200 persons Thursday night in Fort Wayne, Indiana's third largest city, that President Truman and the Democrats are "wholly incompetent" and are trying not to win but to continue the Korean war.

Declaring the Democratic administration "has got us into the worst mess we have ever been in," Taft said the commander of the Eighth Army in Korea wants to arm more South Korean troops but the Truman-Acheson administration won't let him. He added:

"They seem to be determined not to win the Korean War but to make sure the war will continue."

Taft referred to a letter cited Wednesday night by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican nominee for president. Eisenhower said a letter from Gen. James A. Van Fleet said Van Fleet had received "very little encouragement and never an approval" for his own efforts to train new South Korean divisions.
