Central's Wildcats will be host to Pacific Lutheran, which has lost all its non-conference games but hasn't been whipped yet when it counted. Only a tie with Western mars the Lute record in the Evergreen Conference. Pacific, co-holder of the lead in the Northwest Conference with College of Idaho, travels to McMinnville to argue with a strong Linfield club that suffered its first league loss last week at the hands of the Idahoans. The victory in that tilt will take on last-place Whitman Friday night in Walla Walla. Western Washington celebrates its Homecoming with Eastern as the opposition Saturday while Puget Sound wrangles with British Columbia in Vancouver. One intersectional affair sends Whitworth against Willamette in Salem. On the Junior College front Everett has a Friday night engagement at Wenatchee. Lower Columbia plays at Grays Harbor and Centralia at Yakima Saturday, while Olympic draws a bye.

# Bowl Bids May Ride on Owls' Tangle With Boise Saturday

Junior Rose Bowl officials in Pasadena, Calif., will have an eye on Saturday night's football clash on Modoc Field that pits one of its leading candidates against the Owls of Oregon Tech. The boys that pick contestants for the Junior Rose Bowl have mentioned unbeaten Boise Junior College as a strong candidate for one of the spots in the Junior Rose Bowl. But it's a cinch the Broncos will have to get over the high-flying Owls on Klamath Falls' mile-high campus — and that chore won't be done with press clippings. Because Coach Rex Hunsaker's lads are pointing for this game; they're determined to spoil the Bowl party the Broncos have in mind.

CLASSIC  
The Broncos, under Lyle Smith, have also saved their heavy artillery for the Owls. All in all, the game shapes up as the biggest grid classic Modoc Field has ever staged. Last year, with a 6-3 record, the Owls were mentioned, but never chosen, for several Bowl games. This season, with just one loss in six starts, the Owls haven't written off the possibility of a Bowl bid of some sort. So, both teams will be bow-minded when they kick off at 8 o'clock in a game that appears to be as close to a toss-up as is possible in this pigskin business. The Broncos have stringed together five straight wins this season. Since the day in 1946 when Smith took over as bossman of the Broncos, the Boise club has won 84 of 87 games, lost two and tied one.

HORSES  
Both teams have the backfield horses; this department looks even, although Oretch coaches Hunsaker and Art Kirkland would not trade Dan's Don Foreman for both Don White and Wayne Patrick. Boise backfield stars. Defensively, the edge goes to Oretch; the Owls have added up 156 points in their last three games while their victims — Portland State, Weber JC and Southern Oregon—haven't marked the scoreboard. Boise's offensive line would probably rate slightly over the Owls' offensive forward wall, although the Hilltoppers have shown vast improvement in this department in recent outings. Patrick, who does the passing and most of the running for Boise, can't be compared with Oretch's Jack Brown for aerial brilliance, although the ex-Banks thrower has not been the Owls' starting quarterback. That job goes to Gino Lelli. Brown has been used for his arm alone and threw five passes in the 89-0 slaughter of Southern Oregon; four were completed, two for touchdowns. If the two teams bang heads to a standstill on the ground, it could well be Brown's radar wing will be the difference. Unfortunately, the Owls are pointing with long faces to a longer hospital list than at any other time this season. Injuries will keep Don McIntosh defensive end, out of action; brother Jim McIntosh, who has shown his old power from the fullback spot this week, sprained his ankle in a Tuesday scrimmage and probably won't play; Paul Patrick, defensive guard, may see just limited action with a re-occurrence of an old leg injury; Bill Buckingham has a sprained finger suffered the first time he tried to field a Southern Oregon punt from his safety position. Cecil Spencer will get Don McIntosh's defensive end job. John Henslee will move into Spencer's offensive wing position. Larry Jeffrey will work overtime at fullback, although Champ Prayno is learning the position this week to fill in for Jim McIntosh. Laverne Stewart is ready to work for Patrick. Buckingham will probably play, trading off with Odie Canada at the safety position.

Northwestern, Bucks on Video  
EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — For the second straight Saturday TV football fans across the country will see two Big Ten aerial specialists in action as Ohio State's red-faced Buckeyes meet improving Northwestern. The nationally-televized contest starts at 11:30 a. m., PST. Ohio State, considerably embarrassed by last Saturday's 8-0 upset by Iowa, sends Johnny Barton against Northwestern's Dick Thomas in what should be a skilled sharp-shooting duel.

Wolves, E. Oregons Clash in OCC Quarrel  
Oregon Tech, which trampled Southern Oregon College of Education 89-0 last week end, faces a sterner opponent Saturday at Klamath Falls, meeting highly regarded Boise J. C. Oregon Tech has lost only one game this season, a 19-0 decision to Santa Rosa J. C. Boise's record is even better. The visitors are undefeated this year. They have won 55 of their last 59 games. Boise also won its last game by a huge margin, whacking Chaffee J. C., 71-13. Portland State, which dropped a 49-7 game to Oregon College of Education last week in the only conference action, travels to Ashland to play Southern Oregon. Oregon College, the defending conference champ, again plays the only conference game this week. The Wolves go to La Grande to play Eastern Oregon, a team that lost last week to Whitman, 20-14.



## Bears, 49'ers In Pro Clash

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Bears Sunday try to upset the unbeaten San Francisco 49ers' hopes for the National Professional Football League title—and to gain revenge for their worst loss in years. The Bears, however, are 17-point underdogs for the Kezar Stadium struggle. Two weeks ago, the 49ers dumped the Bears, 40-16, in Chicago, for the first San Francisco win in the five games the clubs have played. Hugh McIlhenny, leading NFL ground-gainer, will be at his regular right half post and powerline Joe Perry is expected to start at fullback for the 49ers.
