Ellsworth Looks Like Winner In District Four

(This is the last of four articles about Oregon's general election candidates.)

SALEM (AP) — Down in Southern Oregon the people hardly know they are electing a congressman, which makes U. S. Rep. Harris Ellsworth, a landslide winner.

Ellsworth, a former newspaper editor, has been in Congress since the Fourth District was created in 1913. He never has had much trouble winning, and this time his task looks easier than ever.

As in other parts of the state, the people of Southern Oregon are wrapped up in the contest for President and in the arguments about the measures to be on next Tuesday's ballot. This fact alone gives Ellsworth an advantage, because it makes it hard for his opponent to become known.

But the biggest asset for Ellsworth is that many Democrats have disowned his opponent, Walter A. Swanson, Springfield lumber mill operator who is running as a Democrat.

Swanson is against the New Deal.

Fair Deal, and all they stand for.
In consequence, he has very few
people working for him, and many
Democrats are actively working
against him.

The Lane County Democratic
Central Committee, for instance,
is thinking about issuing a state-
ment reading Swanson out of the
party.

The committee, and many other
Democrats, specifically object to
Swanson's opposition to European
rearmament, to his claim that
President Truman is letting Com-
munist into the government, and
to his statement that the Demo-
crats in Washington should "be
forced to return and live under the
laws they have passed and com-
pelled us to endure."

Neither Swanson nor Ellsworth
has done much campaigning. El-
lsworth's main plea is for govern-
ment economy.

While labor organizations gener-
ally support Democrats, those in
Southern Oregon are sitting this
one out. On a tour of Southern
Oregon last week, we found that
many voters don't even know the
name of Ellsworth's opponent.

U. S. Rep. Homer D. Angell, the
Republican who has represented
Multnomah County since 1939, may have a bigger fight
on his hands than usual.

Angell's opponent in this Third
District is aggressive 37-year-old
Alfred H. Corbett, Portland law-
yer.

Corbett is a member of the
famous Corbett family, long a
power in Republican circles. But
Alfred Corbett is a Democrat and
strong for the New Deal and Fair
Deal.

Before filing for Congress, Cor-
bett was assistant general counsel
for the Defense Electric Power Ad-
ministration in Washington, D. C.
This race looks close to some
observers, only mildly close to
others. The Democrats in Multi-

nomah County outnumber the Re-
publicans 148,632 to 131,728. That
is the result of a referendum held on
the League of Women Voters in
Portland recently.
