Child Dies By Hanging

TULELAKE—A coroner's report from Alturas determined the death of two-year-old James C. Wolford, son of a transient potato laborer, Steve Wayne Wolford, was the result of hanging.

The little boy, one of 10 children in the Wolford family, had been left with an older sister, 13, and a three-year-old sister while other members of the family were picking potatoes on the Dale Sproat ranch, last Saturday.

The older girl, left the back of a truck in which the children had been playing to look at some new pups. A few moments later the child was found hanging in a loop of clothesline rope.

He was taken to the office of a Tulelake physician who pronounced the child dead.

The family had arrived only the day before from Redmond. They are residents of Bakersfield where the body was taken for burial.

Two years ago while the family was in Tulelake for the harvest, another child was run over by a truck and injured.

Court Reverses License Order

A State Board of Examiners in Optometry order cancelling the license to practice of Alva T. Custer, Klamath Falls optometrist, has been reversed by decision of Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Dr. Custer operates the Standard Optical Company here. His license was ordered revoked by the state board on Dec. 28, 1951, based on charges that he was allowing his license to be used for profit by an unlicensed party, the Standard Optical Company of Utah, subordinating his profession to the business of that firm.

There also were various other allegations based on his association with the Utah concern. Dr. Custer appealed the order cancelling his license and a hearing was conducted here in May. Judge Vandenberg heard the testimony, received briefs and took the case under advisement.

In his decision he found that the State Board of Examiners in Optometry had failed to prove any of its charges against Dr. Custer and that the license cancellation should be reversed. He decreed Dr. Custer is entitled to an order from the State Board of Examiners in Optometry restoring his license.

NW Potato Shipping Up

The Pacific Northwest shipped 2,300 carloads of the nation's 4,500 shipped cars of potatoes last week, and during the past five days the Klamath Basin has shipped 270 cars alone.

And at San Francisco the potato market was a little stronger, with poorly netted U. S. No. 1A's from the Klamath Basin bringing \$4.15 per 100-pound sack.

On Oct. 27, according to the OSC potato and truck crops review, Deschutes Russets, U. S. No. 1-A, brought \$4.35 to \$4.50 per hundred pounds, about 35 cents above last weeks prices.

On Oct. 28, in Los Angeles, U. S. No. 1's from the Klamath Basin brought \$4.65 to \$4.75, while same grades from Deschutes area were bringing \$4.75 to \$5 per sack.

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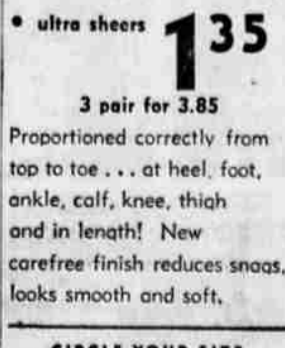
