Jail Break Case to Jury

John H. Brandon, 25, and Don Reichardt, 21, have been ordered bound over to await Grand Jury action on a charge of assault, armed with a dangerous weapon, in connection with the escape of two men from the County Jail Oct. 21.

Brandon escaped, and so did Robert (Bobby) Kral, 19, and Reichardt did not. But Kral was not bound over on the assault charge. Basis of the charge was the dealing of Jailer Sherman Kettenberg, which has been admitted by Brandon, and Reichardt is claimed to have assisted in planning the break.

There was no testimony given in a District Court hearing yesterday that Kral was involved in the assault on Kettenberg or in planning the escape. Brandon and Kral surrendered separately after they had been out of the jail only a couple of hours.

Brandon, who was sent here from the Tulelake Prison Camp to be detained until he could be transferred to McNeil Island, was a federal prisoner, as was Reichardt, who was held as a Marine deserter. Kral was in jail on two morals charges and already has pleaded guilty to them in Circuit Court.

Two Charged In Check Hike

A U.S. government check allegedly altered to raise its value from 15 cents to \$100 in the basis of felony charges filed against two men here. Quincy Baker, an Indian from Beatty, is the man to whom the 16-cent check was issued, and he is charged with possession of a false instrument with intent to pass. John Olaf Nelson, 72, of Pelican City, is charged with tendering an altered check.

He is accused of attempting to pass it at the J. D. Penney Company store Oct. 25. Nelson was arraigned today in District Court, waived preliminary hearing and was returned to the County Jail in lieu of \$2,500 bail. Baker was arraigned last Tuesday and also is held in lieu of \$2,500 bail.

Livestock

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK—CHICAGO (AP)—For the fifth consecutive week hog prices turned upward his week. Most sections of the cattle section also sold off with quite a number of head being held over for Monday's market. Slaughter lambs joined other livestock in slumping.

Local apples of hogs were the largest for any week since March as barrows and gilts lost 60 to 85 cents and sows fell \$1.00. In wholesale markets major pork cuts lost 1 to 6 cents a pound, selling as much as 21 cents under O.P.S. ceilings.

A dull dressed beef trade was one factor behind the slump in the cattle section. Slaughter steers and heifers ended unevenly to \$1.00 or more lower. Cows lost 25 to 50 cents and bulls 50 cents. Yearlings held steady. Receipts included about 10,000 feeder show yearlings and calves.

Choice yearlings held fairly steady, but cull to low-pool offerings lost 50 cents to \$1.00. Over the greater part of the week yearlings got broader action than the rank and file of native lambs, buyers complaining that too many fed lambs now running to market lack high finish.
