Judge Brusatori's order was an siternative writ of mandamus. It orders San Quention Warden Harley O. Teets either to certify McCracken insane-making his execution illegal-or to show why this should not be done at a hearing Nov. T in Marin County Superior Court.

oni and cheese as a substitute for potatoes.

They refused to re-enter their cells and milled about in the corridor of their cell-block, a segregation unit for criminals who require constant guarding.

Deputy Warden Lawrence O'-Brien told the prisoners Friday night that he would use force unless they returned to their cells. A short time later they re-entered their cells and dinner was served. They ate.

Of the 16 convicts, three are under death sentence. Six tried under chast served. der death sentence. Six tried un-successfully to escape earlier this week.
