Lewis Signs Coal Contract

WASHINGTON (AP)—John L. Lewis and hard coal operators signed a new contract Saturday raising the wages of 65,000 anthracite miners \$1.90 a day effective Nov. 16.

The new contract is subject to approval by the Wage Stabilization Board which recently chopped 40 cents off a similar agreement reached by Lewis and the soft coal industry.

The new hard coal contract was announced by Thomas Kennedy, vice president of the United Mine Workers, and Edward G. Fox who led the operators' negotiating team.

They told newsmen that all monetary benefits in the new contract, with the exception of increased payments to the union's welfare fund, have been applied to the wage structure and not to fringe benefits.

The agreement was worked out in a session which lasted until nearly midnight last night.

The WSB after studying the soft coal contract ruled that only \$1.90 of the increase was permissible under anti-inflation policy.

The decision, now under appeal, touched off a strike which ended only after President Truman asked Lewis to call it off. The miners were called back to work with the understanding they would get the other 40 cents of their daily wage increase when the WSB approved.

The hard coal industry, concentrated in eastern Pennsylvania, has avoided a strike. An interim agreement gives the union a boost from 30 cents to 40 cents a ton in the employer-paid royalty to the UMW's anthracite welfare fund.

Truman Eyes Nixon Support

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN (AP)—President Truman said Saturday that the "club" of "millionaires" that raised an \$18,000 expense fund for Sen. Richard M. Nixon thought by his votes in the Senate "he was worth a little subsidy."

The President left to the voters to judge whether the fund was "ethical or not," but declared the GOP vice presidential candidate has "proved himself a good investment for these fund contributors."

Truman, in an address prepared for delivery at Terre Haute, Ind., gave the full "give 'em hell" treatment to the California senator, who made a nationwide radio and television explanation of his senatorial expense fund.

CONVINCED
A top aide said the President is convinced Adlai Stevenson will be elected next Tuesday. And one of his chief political advisors predicted the Democratic nominee will win a minimum of 294 votes in the Electoral College against 237 for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

This advisor, Frank McKinney, former Democratic national chairman, left Truman's train at Cincinnati Friday night.

In the Terre Haute address, Truman declared that Nixon, in the event of Eisenhower's election, would stand "just one heart beat" away from the presidency. He called the California senator "one of the most thorough-going reactionaries in our public life today" and "frequently an isolationist on foreign policy." And then he added:

CLUB FUND
"You may have heard something about the contributions a 'millionaires' club' made to help Richard Nixon get along in life. They gave him a fund of \$18,000—almost \$900 a month—while he was a senator. 'Now, I'm not going to express an opinion about that fund—whether it was ethical or not. I leave that to you to judge. But I do want to call your attention to the fact that Sen. Nixon had proved himself a good investment for these fund contributors.'

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Demo Descendent To Vote For GOP

BECKLEY, W. Va. (AP)—The great granddaughter of one of the founders of what became the Democratic party says she is going to vote straight Republican for the first time tomorrow.

She is Mrs. Betty Beckley Campbell, 84-year-old widow. Mrs. Campbell is the great grand daughter of John Beckley who, along with two other Philadelphians, Benjamin Franklin Bach and Alexander J. Dallas, is credited with founding the Democratic Republican party in the early 1790s.
