Owies Drill for Monmouth After Slim Loss to Broncos

Fans Call Tiff 'Best Ever' on Modoc Field

The Oregon Tech Owls bounce back into the Oregon Collegiate Conference race this week in the wake of a 13-14 loss to Boise Junior College Saturday night in a savage gridiron battle the fast-growing army of Owl fans are calling the "best game ever to show on Modoc Field."

Oretch travels to Monmouth for a Saturday date with the Wolves of Oregon College.

The unbeaten Broncos of Boise JC, a team the American Gridiron Index puts down as the Number 1 junior college team in the nation, caught Oretch with its pass defense down twice for the slim victory.

It's seldom two more evenly-matched teams have met.

FROM BEHIND

The Owls came from behind to tie the score 7-7 on the last play of the first half, went ahead 13-7 in the third quarter, then got caught napping as Boise scored on another pass play.

The ultimate pay-off, of course, was Leland Fowler's trusty right toe that gave Boise its two big bonus points.

Len Genetin, usually sure-fire on extra points, kicked wide on the second attempt.

The Owls tried desperately to pull the win out in the fourth quarter on Jack Brown's pitching arm. It wasn't so much Boise's pass defense that stopped the ex-bank thrower; he was simply leading his intended receivers a little too much when several times they got past the Boise secondary with a clear shot for the goal line.

THRILL

But it was Brown who gave the crowd its biggest thrill. With time for just one more play in the first half, fourth down on Boise's two-yard line, Brown faked a hand-off and boomeranged around left end for the touchdown that tied the score after Genetin's kick split the uprights.

The Broncos threatened once midway in the first quarter but a failed goal line stand by the Owls shackled the visitors after Rex Miller hit Frank Teverbaugh with a flat pass and the big end cruised to Oretch's six-yard line before being knocked out of bounds.

The big Oregon Tech forward wall batted the Bronco runners back and in three plays they had gained just one yard. Miller tried a jump pass to Paul Giles that missed.

OUT OF BOUNDS

The Owls got out of the hole when Foreman gained five yards on a quick-opener and, on third down, Genetin kicked kicked and the ball rolled dead on Boise's 34.

Early in the second quarter, the Owls started from their own 20 and in nine plays worked down to Boise's seven-yard line where, on second down, Gino Lelli's fumble on a quarterback sneak, stopped the threat.

The 13-yard march was featured by Lelli's bootleg ramp that covered 31 yards, George Clark's 13-yard cruise that gave the Owls first down on Boise's 36 and Foreman's eight-yard run that put the Owls on the enemy 13 with a first down. Genetin hit Dick Flannigan with a pass that went to the seven, then Lelli fumbled and Pete Quinn recovered for Boise.

TOUCHDOWN

Just four and a half minutes were left when the Broncos struck suddenly for their touchdown. A 17-yard pass by Miller and a 15-yard penalty had put the Broncos back to their 30-yard line with second down and some 43 yards to go.

But Teverbaugh sneaked behind the Oretch secondary and gathered in a pass from Miller on the 28 and out-raced two Owls to the goal line.

The Owls launched their 62-yard touchdown drive after the next kickoff. After Cecil Spencer received the kick and was dumped on the 38, Foreman on an optional play fired a pass to Flannigan that settled in the ex-Grants Pass boy's hands after bouncing off the fingertips of two defenders. Flannigan almost got away but was trapped on the 20. Foreman carried the load then and on seven plays the Owls were on the two-yard line with just nine seconds to go in the first half.

FAKE

Brown faked a hand-off to Foreman and barreled around end for the tying touchdown. Genetin's kick tied it up as the teams left for the intermission.

In six minutes of the third quarter, Oregon Tech went ahead. Bill Buckingham intercepted one of Miller's passes on his own 43 and raced back to Boise's 25. Foreman

couldn't find yardage on the first play but a penalty gave the Owls a first down on Boise's 10-yard line. Genetin picked up 5 and on the next play Foreman spurred through on a quick-opening play to go over standing up.

Genetin kicked wide on the attempt.

A bobble on an attempted hand-off from Lelli to Larry Jeter started Boise on its pay-off touchdown drive. Teverbaugh, deadly on an end-around play, traveled 11 yards from Oretch's 47 where Leroy Buhler had picked up the fumble.

STALLED

Leroy Weber covered eight yards. Miller threw to give the Broncos a first down on the 25. In two plays the Broncos were still on the 25 after an incomplete pass and a running play. Then Teverbaugh, on an end-around play, stopped and rifled a pass to Giles in the end zone to tie the count 13-13.

Fowler, who had kicked the first point after a 15-yard penalty put the Broncos back on the 17, calmly nudged the big one through as the Broncos took the lead again, 14-13.

Oretch Tech threatened twice in the last period but Brown's passes were barely missing the mark.

Early in the fourth period, after Boise was slapped with a 15-yard penalty that gave the Owls first down on Boise's 35, Genetin rifled to Flannigan and Brown to Genetin. Both times the receivers were clear but the passes were slightly too long.

INTERCEPTION

On Oretch's next series of downs, Brown hit Flannigan with a pass that covered 32 yards to Boise's 31-yard line. On the first play, Merle Eden intercepted a pass in the end zone for an automatic touchdown and Boise opened a time-wasting drive that stretched from the 20 to Oregon Tech's 23 with a 15-yard penalty helping the cause along the way.

The Owls opened another drive from the 20 after Boise was forced to kick over the goal line. Brown found Genetin on a pass play that covered 36 yards to Boise's 44. Two passes failed, then Boise was called on pass interference on the 33. Foreman ran to the 26. Genetin to the 20 for first down. Foreman on the ground and a Brown to John Henline pass in the flat advanced to the 13. But two running plays failed to gain through the Boise line and again the Owls were stalled in their attempt to pass the Broncos.

IMPORTANT

Boise staged another concerted drive late in the game, an important march because it kept the ball away from the Owls, desperately trying to get back into the game.

The march traveled from the 17 where the Owls lost the ball on downs. Twelve plays and three first downs later the Broncos finally gave the ball up on downs on Oretch's 31.

On the first play, with less than minute to go, Brown spotted Genetin clear on Boise's 45. But Brown gave Genetin too much lead. Genetin was well past the Boise secondary.

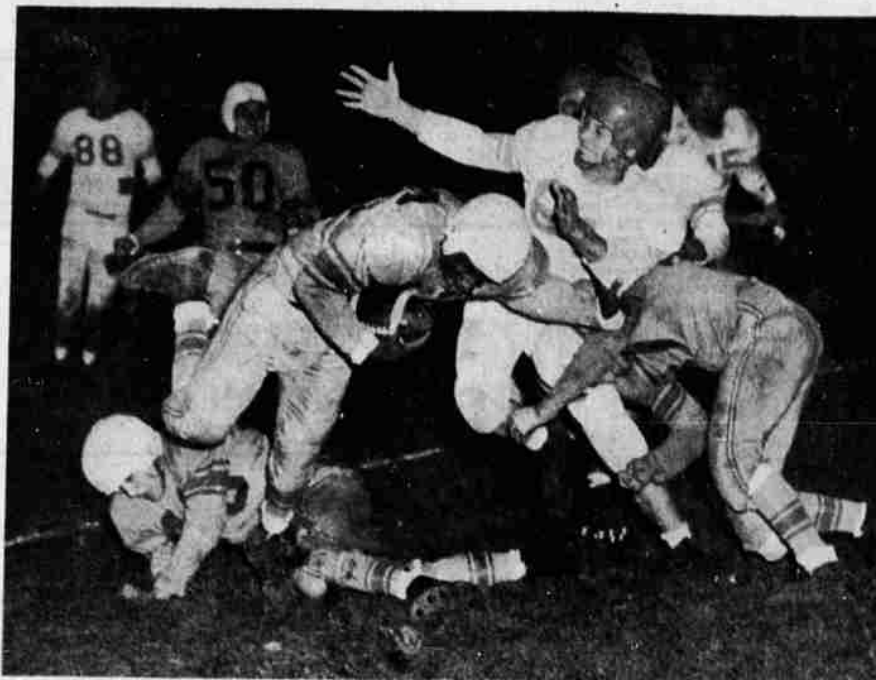

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Football's big championship chase out this way was still a two team race Monday between the unbeaten conference giants, UCLA and Southern California.

When they collide in Los Angeles Nov. 22, the winner most likely will be the coast's representative in the Rose Bowl.

The UCLA Bruins, with a flashing attack and stiff defense, took another long stride toward the title

by smearing California's Bears 28-7 last week. It gave them four league wins and an overall record of seven victories.

RETURNS

Paul Cameron, the Bruins fine tailback, returned to full time service for the first time this season.

He threw two touchdown passes and directed a 68-yard scoring march. Injuries had benched him for all but 40 minutes in the team's six previous games.

The defeat, second in a row, practically knocked California out of the running for high honors.

The Bears, incidentally, were pre-season choice to make the championship grade. They lost last week to USC, 10-0.

FAVORED

This week end, UCLA entertains Oregon State and figures to notch up another conference win handily.

Southern California, idle last Saturday and with a league record of 3-0, travels to Palo Alto for a meeting with the sometimes troublesome Stanford Indians. Stanford walloped San Jose State 35-13 in a non-conference game last week.

Washington, showing marked improvement every week under the brilliant leadership of Don Heinrich, gets a home town whack at embattled California this Saturday.

Heinrich, the T-formation counterpart of Cameron's single wing generalship for UCLA, threw three touchdown passes in his team's 38-13 win over Oregon State last week.

HOPES

In conference competition, Washington still has some hopes with a 4-1 record. It lost to UCLA, 32-7 in the third game of the season.

Washington State, 36-6 winner over Idaho, travels to Eugene for a conference engagement with oft-beaten Oregon. The Webfoots, in the throes of a disappointing grid year, lost to non-league College of the Pacific 14-6 in their latest out.

Oregon has one victory and a tie against five setbacks.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Monday held New York Yankee star Mickey Mantle physically unfit for military service. The finding, based on new examinations, renewed a previous ruling.

Maj. Gen. George E. Armstrong, Army surgeon general, made the announcement after examining the record of physical examinations recently conducted at Fort Sill, Okla.

Armstrong said the current disqualification of the baseball player was based on a chronic right knee defect resulting from an injury sustained in the 1951 World Series.

The Army examination found his condition to be "serious enough for mandatory rejection under armed forces physical standards."

Mantle had been rejected previously because of a history of osteomyelitis of the left leg.

Grants Pass, sharp on the foot-

Forty-Niners Tumble Before Chicago Bears

NEW YORK (AP) — With the professional football season half over, only one team has followed the form charts in each of its games. That's coach Jim Phelan's Dallas Texans. They've dropped six straight, just as the odds said they would.

Even the high-powered San Francisco 49ers aren't safe in the uncertain National Football League.

The Chicago Bears—15-point underdogs—handed the 49ers their first setback of the season yesterday with a 10-7 victory.

On George Blanda's 48-yard field goal in the fourth period.

San Francisco had won five straight games and was threatening to make a complete runaway with the national conference. But now it's a close race, with the Detroit Lions (4-2) only one game behind in second place.

Hugh McElhenny, the 49ers' brilliant rookie from the University of Washington, carried nine times for 80 yards. This increased his league

lead to 517 yards in six games. He ran 17 yards for one touchdown.

Quarterback Frankie Albert was a 49er "goal." He gambled on a fourth down play for four yards on his own 31 and lost the ball. The Bears took over and drove to a touchdown. Then shortly afterward Herman Clark, a Bear tackle from Oregon State, intercepted an Albert pass and the Bears moved ahead for the winning field goal.

The Detroit Lions pulled a mild upset themselves by defeating the Cleveland Browns, 17-6, as Bobby Layne tossed two touchdowns passes to end Leon Hart.

This game not only moved Detroit closer to San Francisco, but also sent the American conference into a two-way tie for first place between Cleveland and the New York Giants.

A total of 210,941 fans turned out yesterday for a full six-game card which also saw the Los Angeles Rams break loose for the first time this season to trounce the Dallas Texans, 42-20. Pittsburgh stop a late Washington rally for a 24-23 victory, and Green Bay nip Philadelphia, 12-10, and the New York Giants beat the Chicago Cardinals 28-6.

The Los Angeles Rams scoring included a 37-yard touchdown pass by quarterback Norm Van Brocklin, former Oregon star.
