Bend Cyclist Killed In Race

SAN MATEO, Calif. (AP) — Ralph Moores, 33, of Bend Ore., was killed here Sunday in what his wife said was to have been his last motorcycle race.

His wife and four children were watching as the handlebars of his machine came loose as he was speeding at 90 miles an hour around the Bay Meadows track in a trial run.

He fell to the track and was hit by the following motorcycle.

Mrs. Moores said after the accident: "Ralph never had any luck here. He raced here the past two years and had trouble both times. He finally agreed to give up racing, and this was to have been his last race."

Surviving children include Marlon, 12; Susanne, 11; Karen, 9; and Jimmy, 5.

Times Says Vote Uncertain

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Times said Monday that reports from its correspondents throughout the nation indicate that the outcome of the presidential contest is "highly uncertain."

According to the reports, the Times said, neither Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower nor Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson "can be regarded as of now as certain of election."

The newspaper's lead story added: "The reports indicate that the vote in many states might be so close that either candidate could obtain a sizable majority of the electoral votes."

"In other words, a comparatively few thousand votes, placed properly in the seemingly doubtful states, may determine the result of the election."

There are 531 electoral votes, and 266 are necessary to elect a President.

The Times, which is supporting Eisenhower editorially, printed the seventh and last of a series of surveys, published Monday mornings, on the progress of the presidential campaigns. The surveys have been based on reports from regional and state correspondents of the Times in the 48 states.

Canada Opens New Rail Line

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C. (AP) — An 18-car special Pacific Great Eastern Railway train arrived here Saturday marking formal opening of a wilderness-opening rail link started 40 years ago.

Premier W. A. C. Bennett and members of his cabinet were among passengers aboard the special for the inaugural trip over the \$12,000,000 81.9 mile extension from Quesnel.

The rail line was started 40 years ago from Squamish, 33 miles north of Vancouver. Quesnell became the northern terminus.

Bennett hailed completion of the link to Prince George as the "opening of a new era for this part of British Columbia."

Development here and in the Peace River Country "holds out greater promise of expansion than any other part of the North American continent," the Premier said.

RAF to Get Sabre Jets

LONDON (AP) — The Royal Air Force soon will be flying American F86 Sabre jets for the first time.

The Air Ministry announced last night that delivery of between 300 and 400 sabres will begin next month.

Peacemaker Lands in Jail

BERLIN (AP) — Horst Deick took on the role of peacemaker in a neighborhood quarrel and wound up in jail for his pains.

The West Berlin police reported Monday that Deick intervened in an argument among three neighbors and all three turned on him.

In fear, he whipped out a pistol and fired several shots in the air to attract help. A police patrol arrived and arrested Deick for carrying a weapon without permission.

Soviet Village Gets New Name

MOSCOW (AP) — A village in the Soviet Latvian republic which had been called "New America" has been renamed "Suvorov" in honor of the Russian military hero, Pravda announced Monday.

Explaining, the Soviet newspaper said it was all right to call the village "New America" when it was in the center of a swamp, but now the swamp has been drained.

USS Princeton Returns To Port

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The U. S. Carrier Princeton arrived Monday after eight months of combat operations off the Korean coast.

The 27,000-ton carrier, carrying 2,500 officers and men, was scheduled to leave late Monday for San Diego.

Sunday 1,815 veterans of the Korean war returned aboard the transport Gen. W. F. Hase.

Top Hollywood Writer Is Mother of Six Children

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Career-minded wives can take heart from the story of Dorothy Kingsley. A top screen writer, she is also the mother of six children.

What's more she broke into the business as a housewife with three children. It's amazing enough for a professional writer to get a break in this fiercely competitive field.

"The secret?" said the writer, an attractive blonde, "Persistence and prayer."

Miss Kingsley, who has written the majority of Esther Williams' pictures during a nine-year career at MGM, said she got the writing bug while she was a housewife in Detroit. She listened to comedy shows on the radio and was convinced that she could write lines

that were as funny.

"I showed some of the scripts to a friend of ours, Bob Scripps, editor of the Detroit News," she said. He thought they were good and suggested I should do something about them. So I did. I flew to Hollywood to look for a job."

Miss Kingsley looked up an agent in the phone book and arranged an interview. The agent seemed impressed with her work and agreed to handle her. With high hopes, she returned to Detroit and sold the family belongings to buy a car. With husband and three children, she toured back to Hollywood.

She arrived to find the agent had gone out of business!

After pounding on doors fruitlessly, she finally got in to see the producer of the Bob Hope show. He liked her work, but Hope already had a dozen writers, and

gag women were unheard of in the radio industry. So the producer put her under personal contract and submitted her jokes to Hope himself.

"He was going to reveal my identity after 13 weeks and get me a regular job on the show," she recalled. "At the end of that time, I learned he had suffered a nervous collapse. No one else in the office knew me."

Again she pounded the pavement. She was persuing the want ads in desperation when she found a notice seeking gag writers. The advertiser turned out to be Edgar Bergen. He picked her from 13 applicants and she wrote Charlie McCarthy gags for two years.

Then she turned to the more lucrative field of screen writing. She interested producer Arthur Freed in her writing ability and landed

O'Brien Stays On Lee Hong

HONG KONG (AP) — The ferryboat Lee Hong lost her rudder in drydock Monday, but not her passportless "permanent" passenger, Michael Patrick O'Brien.

O'Brien even has the ship to himself at night. The crew has moved ashore temporarily.

O'Brien, who claims he is an American, entered Portuguese Macau from Red China last summer with Red Cross documents. Authorities told him to leave immediately.

He boarded the Lee Hong for the 40-mile trip to Hong Kong. There, British authorities refused to admit him. O'Brien now has lodged 41 daily round trips plus six days in drydock, with no prospect of going ashore.

The U. S. State Department says he is a Hungarian National.
