Scribe Presides At Political Meeting

FORT KLAMATH—To quote a somewhat trite saying—"there is always the first time for everything"—this was the case with your Fort Klamath correspondent when on Oct. 29, I wielded the gavel as chairman of a political rally held in the C. I. Clubhouse here. The affair was sponsored by the Fort Klamath Business Association, and as secretary manager of the group, it became my duty to preside at the mass meeting, which was very successful and attended by a large and interested crowd.

On behalf of the sponsoring organization and people of the Wood River valley, candidates and others present from outside points were welcomed, and the meeting was opened by members of the three groups of the local scout pack, when under the supervision of Scoutmaster Frank Strahan, Cub Scout Douglas Van Wormer, First Class Boy Scouts Wynn Hesecock and Robert Halford and Explorer Scout Glenn Hesecock advanced the flags of the United States and the United Nations, all present joining in repeating the pledge of allegiance to the Stars and Stripes, followed by singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the crowd, with Mrs. Bert Gray accompanying at the piano.

Many Democratic and Republican candidates for county office were at the meeting, in addition to Sen. Phil Hitchcock, who is again aspiring to a seat in the State Senate. All were introduced to the gathering, and responded with brief talks outlining their qualifications for the various offices which they seek.

Following introduction of the county candidates, those present heard Bill Wales Jr., Klamath Falls, speak for Sam Coon, Republican candidate for Congress, and also Paul Buck, Klamath Falls, spoke on behalf of John O. Jones, Democratic aspirant to the same office.

The meaning of several confusing measures on the state ballot was made very clear to all in attendance by Sen. Hitchcock, who deserves a special vote of thanks for his explanation of these proposed legislative enactments.

Introduced by George Proctor, who is chairman of the Klamath Falls "Citizens for Eisenhower" group, KFLW radio station announced Floyd Wynne told why he had deserted the Democratic party to become a supporter of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower. Originally scheduled to last only 15 minutes, Wynne's talk consumed nearly an hour, and as a result of the consequent lateness of the evening, those present heard only a short talk by Mrs. Paul Buck, Democratic congressional committee woman of Klamath Falls, who spoke on the candidacy of Adlai Stevenson for the presidency. Many who like to hear both sides of a question discussed fairly and openly were disappointed because Mrs. Buck was forced to curtail her address.

The interesting and enjoyable evening was brought to a late close by the crowd joining in singing "America", after which refreshments were served by members of the local sponsoring group. In addition to a variety of home-baked cakes, for the occasion a large specially decorated cake, inscribed with "The Fort Klamath Business Association Welcomes the Candidates", was cut and served with coffee to those present at the rally.
