Western Power Proposals Face Change

WASHINGTON (AP)—Regardless of the outcome of Tuesday's elections, two western power and irrigation proposals seem to face rough going in Congress next year.

The results of Congressional races could have more effect on the fate of such projects than the national results, despite the extent to which the program has entered into the presidential campaigning.

A case in point is the proposed Hells Canyon power dam on the Snake river at the Idaho-Oregon border.

Despite strong administration support for that 400-million-dollar project, it was opposed by Idaho's four-man delegation in Congress and it made little headway in the House interior committee.

The results proved once again that it is almost necessary to win the support of congressmen representing the area concerned in order to get committee approval for a project.

The Central Arizona power-reclamation project on the Colorado river faces trouble for another reason—a fight between California and Arizona which now is heading toward the supreme court after a 10-year battle in Congress.

Idaho Sens. Henry Dworshak and Herman Welker will still be in the Senate in 1953. Reps. Hamer Budge and John T. Wood are considered favorites to win election against two Democrats who are for Hells Canyon.

Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who recently bolted the Republican party and became an independent, presumably will continue fighting for Hells Canyon in 1953 as he did in 1952.

The Central Arizona project, which opponents claim would cost one billion dollars, has been controversial for several years.

California and Arizona have been fighting for more than 20 years over the Colorado river, and the Supreme Court now is considering Arizona's request for permission to sue to establish water rights.

California members of Congress several times have succeeded in pigeonholing in committee bills to construction of a dam which would impound water near the California border for irrigation in Central Arizona.

Two strong Arizona supporters of the project seek re-election. They are Sen. Ernest W. McFarland, Democratic majority leader in the Senate this year, and Rep. John Murdock, also a Democrat and chairman of the House Interior Committee.

Regardless of election results, Utah members of Congress probably will support a third project, the upper Colorado river development program, which proposes an \$80 million dollar series of dams along the river's upper reaches.

Utah's Republican senators and Democratic representatives have been for the program because several of the dams would be in Utah a state which needs water conservation.

Sen. Wallace Bennett continues in office next year. Sen. Arthur Watkins, who this year introduced a bill to authorize the upper Colorado program, seeks re-election. His opponent is Rep. Walter Granger, also a project supporter.

Phoenix Driver Wins Long Grind

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP)—Bob Hall of Phoenix, Ariz., won the 100-mile AAA National Championship auto race Sunday in a field of 26 big cars of the Indianapolis class.

Joe James of Van Nuys, Calif., suffered a possible skull fracture when his racer swerved and flipped over four times as he was driving into the sun on the 47th lap.

There was no time on the race because the yellow caution flag was up for 12 laps after James' accident.
