

# Candidates' Views Show Wide Differences On Many Points

WASHINGTON (AP) — A capsule summary of views expressed by Dwight D. Eisenhower and Adlai E. Stevenson on major issues:

**KOREA** — Eisenhower — Bunching by Truman administration led to Communist aggression; that made decision to intervene inescapable. South Koreans should be trained to man the front lines, reducing U. S. losses. The Democrats can't be counted on to find a solution. Eisenhower will go to Korea personally to see what should be done toward ending the war.

**STEVENSON** — The decision to intervene may be a turning point in history, preventing a bigger war. Republicans have wavered between reckless calls to expand the Korean War and weak-kneed moves to quit. The U. S. for many months already has been doing all it can to train South Koreans and put them in battle lines. Stevenson will not make same promises of an easy way out even if it costs him the election.

**CORRUPTION** — Stevenson — There has been corruption involving a minute fraction of federal employees, and many of the cages have been exposed by Democrats. Stevenson could do a better job fighting dishonesty because he has learned as governor of Illinois how to wield the axe on both parties.

**EISENHOWER** — Vexatious and outright theft of the people's money has been staggering. Much worse, the administration has consistently conspired corruption. No man who owes his election in any degree to the administration can clean up. He would rather be defeated than be elected by men who have lost their morals.

**COMMUNISM** — Eisenhower — Communists have plundered the U. S. of highest diplomatic and military secrets. It is time to clean out a leadership that has failed to see Communists slipping into vital government offices, that has been complacent and has tolerated Russian spies.

**STEVENSON** — He would deal mercilessly with Communists. Eisenhower clamors loudly but what would he do? Would he fire FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and other security officials, who have infiltrated the innermost ranks of the Communist party and exposed one conspirator after another?

**MCCARTHY** — Stevenson — Eisenhower seems to have embraced or been embraced by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis), defamer of Gen. George C. Marshall, "champion of slander." A few "peddlers of hate" would not be important if they had not been included in the leadership of Eisenhower's crusade. For all his talk, McCarthy has yet to uncover evidence leading to conviction of a single Communist agent.

**EISENHOWER** — He supports McCarthy as a member of the Republican organization. He and McCarthy have the same goal of riding the government of the subversive and disloyal, but they differ on method. Eisenhower will never approve unjust denigrating of reputation. He has no patience with anyone who criticizes Marshall, a

great patriot. **"SURRENDERERS"** — Eisenhower — Stevenson has been taken over by, boots and breeches by the Truman administration and stands revealed today as a captive candidate. The Democrats offer not a change of heart but only a change of face.

**STEVENSON** — The biggest fact in the pre-election picture is that Eisenhower has surrendered to Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) and the Republican Old Guard, a team of isolationists and reactionaries who have opposed progress at home and abroad for 20 years. Both Eisenhower and Stevenson have denied they are captives of anybody or have yielded ground on their convictions.

**CIVIL RIGHTS** — Stevenson — He has been very much impressed by a bill in Congress to set up a federal commission to promote fair employment practices, to act only if states themselves do not take proper steps against discrimination. He would support a move to change congressional rules to stop ceaseless debate. (Filibusters have been used to block civil right bills in the past).

**EISENHOWER** — The gravest charge against the Truman administration may be shoddy cheap politics in the field of human rights. Wrong have been left uncorrected to win votes in election after election. He would end segregation in the District of Columbia, which the Truman administration did not do. He would exert leadership to persuade the states to end job discrimination without federal compulsion, an impossible handicap.

**ORGANIZED LABOR** — Stevenson — He would not repeal but would favor amending the Taft-Hartley Act. The law could be used to break unions, and that must be changed. Stevenson wants compulsory arbitration or seizure power. Eisenhower rejects compulsion on grounds the right of men to leave their jobs is a test of freedom.

**STEVENSON** — The Taft-Hartley Act has not improved labor relations and must be repealed. A substitute law should not attempt a precise formula for all national emergency strikes but should give the President a choice of mediation, continued private negotiation, arbitration or seizure. The right to bargain does not include the right to stop the national economy.

**FARM POLICY** — Stevenson — Farmers have been helped to their present prosperity by Democratic programs such as price supports, soil conservation, flood control, rural electrification, research. Democrats will keep price supports at 90 per cent of parity. Although Eisenhower also enforces 90 per cent supports, Sen. Taft opposes them and Republicans have again and again voted against farm programs in past.

**EISENHOWER** — He and the Republican party will continue 90 per cent supports. Accusations to the contrary are false. Republicans will halt the trend toward regimentation of farmers by Washington and seek farmer participation and co-

operation. Democratic politicians have used farm programs to win votes.

**INFLATION** — Eisenhower — Inflation is a policy of the present administration, designed to fool the people by giving them more money that is worth less. Controls over prices are weak stopgaps. The administration has ignored really effective inflation controls over money and credit. Old Guard is the best friend inflation ever had. It voted against price controls. We have inflation today because the Kremlin started the Korean War. Stevenson favors control by direct ceilings, when needed, credit and monetary policies, and a pay-as-we-go budget if possible.

**TAXES-SPENDING** — Stevenson — The U. S. must pre-

forward with religious fervor to try to reduce spending and taxes. But

the budget should be reduced only as national security permits. Out of tens of billions would be like

disbanding the Army, renouncing friends abroad and crawling in a cave to await destruction. Eisenhower — The present expenditure program is reckless and extravagant to the point of sheer folly. Democrats are stale and self-satisfied and complacently say

nothing much can be done. Republicans say big savings are possible without reducing defensive power. (Sen. Taft, in a statement he said was approved by Eisenhower, said 10 billion could be cut next year and another 10 billion the following year.)

## The new milk law will help small dairymen

"Small dairymen do not have the legal staffs to fight the monopolistic organizations that control our present milk administration. We lose at every turn. We have been defeated repeatedly in our efforts to give the public high quality milk.

"Those in power tell us the public doesn't want higher quality milk.

"The new Milk Reform law will give us a chance to prove that pure, high-test and high solid content milk at competitive prices will be met with great demand.

"All we ask is the right to do business like any other small business man. We want to be free from a dictator who dilutes our milk, who tells us who can sell milk, where it must be sold, and to whom."

# Be sure you understand Oregon's Milk Situation

Your Affiliated Milk Committee claims that Oregon's milk law is obsolete; a detriment to the state; that it is run by a small group of dairy leaders and middlemen for their own advantage and not for the benefit of the dairy industry as a whole, and with little or no regard for the public. This committee obtained 43,000 signatures to a petition for a new milk law. It is on the ballot as No. 532 Yes.

The following facts are pertinent and illuminating:

1. The present law was started under the NRA "Blue Eagle" in 1934. It was and is a legalized cartel, controlling prices all the way from farm to consumer.
2. 27 states, including Oregon, adopted similar price fixing laws in an effort to overcome the depression. Only Oregon retains its depression milk law. The Blue Eagle law itself was declared unconstitutional.
3. Oregon's milk law deliberately holds prices up and holds quality down. That is its purpose.
4. The new milk reform law will keep up the price paid the producer, thus insuring an abundant milk supply, but it will leave the distributor and retailer subject to competition, like any other business.

**5. ABOUT SANITATION**  
Neither the old or new law has anything to do with sanitary standards. That's the business of city and state health officers. Opponents of the new milk law try to drag in "sanitation" to scare the public, but sanitation is not an issue.

This shortage is made up by shipping milk in from the State of Washington.

9. The present law is controlled entirely by the little inside ring which profits from state price protection.
10. Under the present law, the Administrator represents the middlemen—under the new milk reform law he will represent the public and the producer—which makes all the difference in the world!
11. Here is the way the 48 states handle their milk business:  
13 states have no milk price controls at all.  
21 states control farm prices only.  
4 states have flexible controls permitting lower store prices.  
7 states have retail price controls but no pooling and quota restrictions on farmers.  
1 state (Oregon) has full control of everything — "the most rigid bureaucratic control system in the United States."

# AFFILIATED MILK COMMITTEES OF OREGON

**MILK PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ACT BILL**—Purpose: Authorizes governor to appoint milk control administrator, an instrumentalities of state, with annual salary of \$7,200, vested with power to investigate, supervise and regulate the production of milk for human consumption within the state. Act requires butterfat labeling of milk and licensing of milk dealers. Appropriate license fees for expense of administration. Authorizes administrator to designate marketing areas, fix minimum milk production prices after public hearing, and require bonds of milk dealers. Appeals are provided for and penalties for violations; all existing milk control laws are repealed. **VOTE YES OR NO**
