CHICAGO (U) — Country supplies were over-generous in their offerings of hogs Tuesday and the excess tipped the market lower by 25 to 50 cents.
Cattle were unevenly firm to weak but mostly steady while sheep were steady to strong.
Butcher weight hogs sold mostly from \$17.50 to \$17.65 over a weight range of 190 to 280 pounds.
A few loads in the 200 and 220 pound section took \$17.75. Most hogs were \$15.50 to \$16.75, with a few to \$17.00.
Good to prime steers and yearlings sold from \$26.00 to \$35.00 with a few prime loads stepping on up to \$35.50 to \$36.50. Choice heifers made \$30.00 to \$33.00 except for a short load which reached \$33.15.
Native lambs sold downward from \$23.50, yearlings from \$21.00, and ewes from \$6.25.

Record Vote

Democratic party should be continued in office because "it is the party of no one, because it is the party of everyone." He said he did not believe the country's economic well-being could be safely entrusted to the Republican party — "the party of fear, inaction, boom and bust."

Eisenhower pledged to work for "a just and lasting peace secured by the strength of the free world." He said he is dedicated to "one supreme cause" — the winning of world peace in a struggle against "the menace of Godless Communism."

Today the Republican nominee was back in New York to cast his vote and await the outcome. President Truman, speaking from Kansas City on the same hookup with Stevenson last night, said today's voting may decide "whether we achieve lasting peace or be led into a third world war."

The first town to count its vote, normally Republican Sharon, N.H., gave Eisenhower 32 and Stevenson 14. Four years ago Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Republican, received 21 of Sharon's votes to four for Truman and two for Henry Wallace, the Progressive party candidate.

As usual, both sides publicly professed confidence of victory for tickets that would carry Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California into office as vice president with Eisenhower, and would make Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama Stevenson's vice president.

Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic national chairman, came up with the prediction in a statement that Stevenson would win with 418 of the 531 electoral votes. A total of 268 is needed for election.

Arthur Summerfield, Republican national chairman, forecast the election of Eisenhower, Nixon and a Republican Congress. He added that there is evidence of a "landslide" in the making.

But it was apparent that the confidence in both camps was only skin deep—and a sensitive skin at that. While expecting a relatively close popular vote, most politicians thought anything could happen in the Electoral College contest which decides the winner.

At the campaign's close Eisenhower was defending his proposal for a Korean visit from fresh Democratic attacks, this time launched by Vice President Barkley, in St. Louis, old warrior Barkley declared that Eisenhower had "held out the false hope that there is some quick and easy way out of Korea."

In a television broadcast aimed at women voters, who now outnumber men, Eisenhower said he was "not pretending there is any patent medicine way of solving the problem in Korea." He said he was going there, if elected, to get information and "not to boss."

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U.S. Intercepts Red Plane Flying Over Japan Waters

TOKYO (U) — Far East Air Force headquarters said two American jets Tuesday flew along the coast but did not fire on the LA-11 propeller-driven fighter plane with Soviet markings. They met over Northern Japan.
Neither the two American F-84 Thunderjets nor the Russian-built fighter fired any shots, FEAF said.
The Air Force said the Communist plane was flying over the Nemuro Peninsula of Eastern Hokkaido, the same area in which an American B-29 was believed shot down by Russian fighters Oct. 7.
FEAF said the plane with Soviet markings flew off toward the international boundary between Japan and Russia and the F-84s returned to their base without leaving Japanese territory.
The American planes made "positive identification" of the strange plane's markings and flew parallel until it neared the international boundary, the Air Force said.
The American planes were in visual contact with the LA-11 for about five minutes.
"Visibility was good at the 16,000 foot level where the interception was made," FEAF said.
The Thunderjets were on routine patrol over Eastern Hokkaido when they encountered the Russian plane at 10:40 a.m.
The LA-11 is a propeller-driven single engine fighter plane of Russian design and manufacture.
FEAF said its markings unquestionably were Soviet.
The Japanese press reported earlier Tuesday that planes believed to be Russian and American exchanged shots at about the same time the F-84s encountered the LA-11. The FEAF announcement was in answer to press queries about the Japanese news report.
Kyodo News Agency reported, meanwhile, that a Japanese aborman last Saturday had found an aircraft propeller hub and a piece of wreckage two feet by one foot which seemed to be a fragment of airplane wing.
Kyodo said the wreckage apparently was part of the American B-29 which disappeared off Nemuro Oct. 7, after its radar image and the radar blip of an unidentified plane coming from the direction of Soviet territory merged and then faded from view.

The Don Cossacks, in colorful costume, are due to appear at the Pelican Theater Friday, Nov. 14—just 10 days away.
Tickets are on sale at Kohn's Flower Shop and the YMCA, or they may be purchased from members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the sponsoring agency.
The Jaycees are donating proceeds of the concert to the YMCA's basement handicraft room which is being developed with funds from outside sources. The Jaycees are playing a principal part in the basement development, YMCA officials have reported.
The Don Cossacks have been to Klamath Falls before as members of a Community Concert tour and have toured the world.
Tickets are selling for \$2.

Sales of cigarettes labeled "I Like Ike" and "Stevenson for President" ended in mid-October and final results are Eisenhower, 26,731,740; Stevenson, 23,531,600.

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (U) — James A. Hard, carried to a voting machine from an ambulance Tuesday, told the driver: "Come back and get me again in four years. I want to cast another vote for Ike."
At the polling place, four persons helped the 111-year-old Republican who is the nation's oldest Union veteran of the Civil War.
Two men from the ambulance, which brought him from a nursing home, carried him in a litter chair to the voting machine. Two women poll workers, one Republican and one Democrat, helped him cast his vote. Hard is blind.
