'Symphonette' To Play Here

"The world's most famous music as played by the world's most distinguished ensemble," the Longines Symphonette, is to open the Community Concert season here Wednesday evening at the Pelican Theater, 8 p.m.

Under the direction of Mischel Piastro, the Symphonette has won the critics' "Top Award" poll for five seasons as the finest orchestra concert ensemble in radio.

The Longines specialty is the playing of shorter selections, or "movements," by the greatest composers, as well as many lighter pieces. The ensemble is commonly referred to as "the average man's symphony orchestra."

Critics have acclaimed the Longines as among New York's finest musicians. Much of their success is attributed to the direction of Piastro, who was Toscanini's concertmaster for many years with the New York Philharmonic.

The Symphonette includes every instrument found in a full symphony orchestra but with some of them, notably the strings, in smaller number.

Gamble Buys State Radio

PORTLAND (AP)—Ted R. Gamble reported in a statement here Monday that a group which he heads has completed purchase, from Eastern interests, of ownership of radio station KOIN in Portland and KJR in Seattle.

The group earlier had bought 56 1/2 per cent of the stock in both stations from Marshall Field of Chicago. The recent purchase is the remaining 43 1/2 per cent.

The statement said that remaining KOIN stock had been bought for \$615,000 and that the stock went to station employees.

No figures were reported on the KJR transaction. However, employees have the chance to buy the 43 1/2 per cent there too, the statement said.

Gamble, who lives in Portland, formerly owned a chain of theaters in the Pacific Northwest. He sold out recently to go into the radio and television business.

The family left here in 1942 and resided at 1033 Fuller Street.

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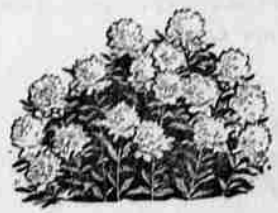
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23 Years Ago

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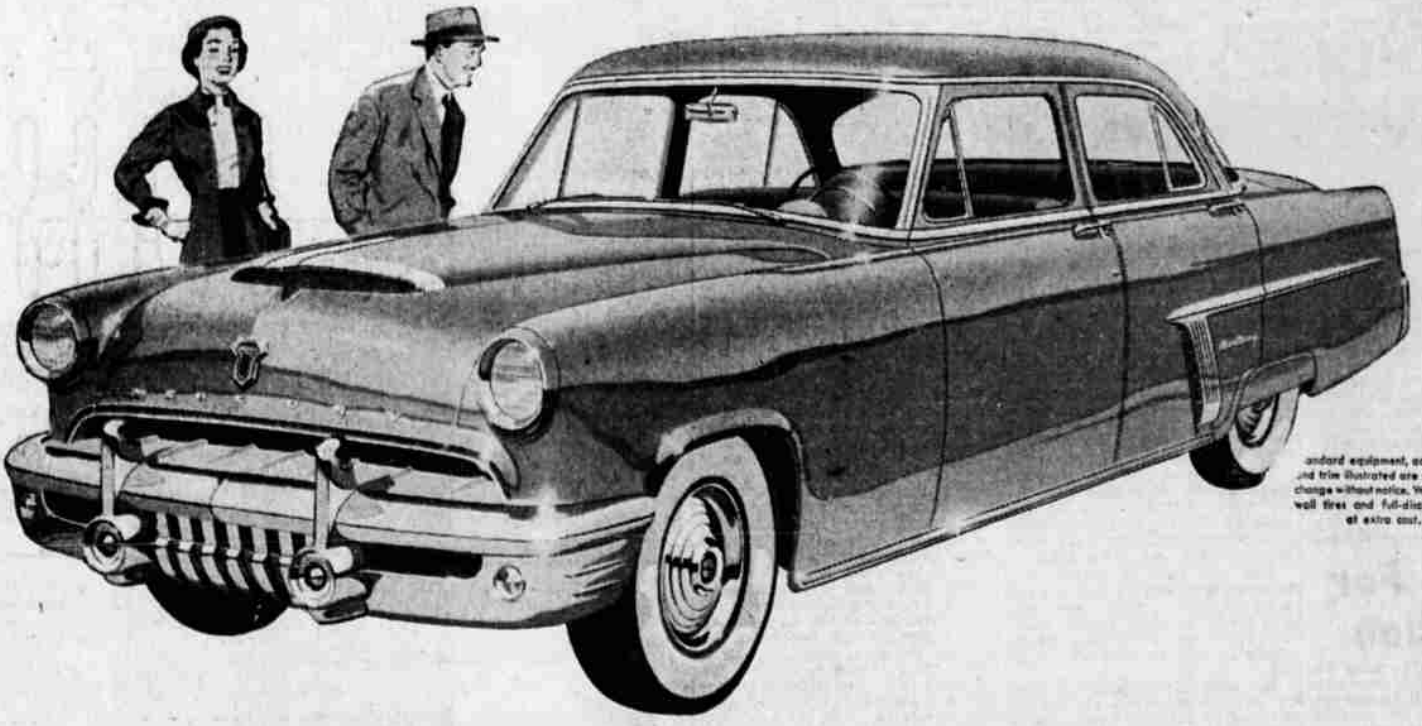
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
