Cards Charge Browns With 'Jumping Gun'

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Cardinals and Browns are at each other's throats again—this time over Harry (Red) Clavin's alleged "jumping gun" on the mound.

Fred Seigh, owner of the St. Louis National League club, said Monday night he has protested the matter on two counts—the local American League either "tampered" with Brecheen while he still was a Cardinal pitcher or did so after he had an oral agreement to become a Redbird coach, or both.

SIGNED

Brecheen, 38, was signed by the Browns last week to pitch in 1953. Seigh said he didn't "want Brecheen back on my club" adding that he did want "our neighbor to quit meddling in our affairs."

Browns owner Bill Veeck immediately denied the charge saying:

"We adhered to the rules and have nothing to worry about. He's just trying to save face. I'm very happy to have him back, because I've lost so many players, and misery loves company."

LEGAL TALK

Seigh contends the Browns couldn't legally talk to Brecheen until Oct. 28, Brecheen said at his home in Ave. 104, that Marty Marion, the Browns' manager, didn't talk to him until Oct. 22 of last year.

Seigh said his club asked waivers on Brecheen Oct. 10.

Matmen Stage Benefit

NEW YORK (AP) — The maligned sport of professional wrestling is going to "turn honest" for one week this month.

During Thanksgiving week, under the leadership of a sightless promoter and an almost blind wrestling champion, promoters and grapplers throughout the United States will stage some 500 mat shows for the benefit of Leader Does for the Blind, a Rochester, Mich., organization which trains dogs and their blind masters to get around without human aid.

The three men behind this movement are Leroy McGuirk, a blind promoter who handles wrestling shows in seven arenas; Ed (Strangler) Lewis, a former great wrestler who is 73 years old and almost sightless; and Paul Knowles, field director for Leader Dogs.

Knowles, blind since birth, travels more than 200,000 miles a year with his dog, Pat.

He came here recently to do a little promotion work on the wrestling project, which is expected to raise some \$250,000 for his organization.

Among other things, Knowles reported the wrestlers have promised him to give the fans "the darndest shows they ever saw" during that one week.

Bruins Jump to Fifth in Poll

NEW YORK (AP) — Mighty Michigan State strengthened its grip on the top spot in the Associated Press football poll today, closely followed by Maryland, Georgia Tech and Oklahoma, but the showdown of a four-time winner hung over the rest of the top 10 teams.

Notre Dame, squeezing back into the top 10 on the bottom rung of the ladder, has a date with fourth-place Oklahoma this week.

One week later the Irish, who ruled the roost in 1943, '46, '47 and '49, meet Michigan State and on Nov. 29 tangle with Southern California, current No. 6 team.

Thus Notre Dame once again will have a lot to say in the naming of college football's No. 1 team of 1952, even if that team isn't Notre Dame.

Michigan State, although polling less first-place votes than Maryland in the eyes of 136 sportswriters and broadcasters in the sixth AP poll, actually increased its point margin from 26 points to 109. It had a total of 1,204 points.

Indians, Huskies In Way of USC Trojans

LOS ANGELES (AP) — There is an excellent chance that the Rose Bowl ambitions of UCLA and Southern California will be decided when they stage their annual cross-town football brawl in Memorial Coliseum Nov. 22.

There is no such thing as a sure thing in football, however, and both teams have a matter of two to handle before they reach this stage of the Rose Bowl eliminations.

The Trojans of USC have two pressing problems to solve, namely Stanford this week at Palo Alto, and then the suddenly revitalized Washington Huskies here.

The UCLA road is admittedly less dangerous. They have but Oregon State ahead, then a week's rest, and then USC.

A Stanford-USC game is never a sure thing, even less so when played at Palo Alto. And Washington, after losing one conference game to UCLA and then taking a licking from Illinois, has bounded back and is still a bowl contender.

As Jess Hill, USC coach, told the football writers Monday, UCLA has had a rough schedule, but "they're through with it."

"Our's is still ahead," he noted.

UCLA has taken in succession Oregon, Texas Christian, Washington, Rice, Stanford, Wisconsin and California.

Asked what he thought of the SC chances against Stanford and Washington, UCLA coach Red Sanders said the Trojans could expect trouble.

BEST PASSER

"I said after our game with Washington that the Huskies had a fine team. Don Heinrich is the best passer in the country and they have some other mighty good backs to go with him."

As for Oregon State, Sanders said: "I can't forget that they played toe to toe with Michigan State and only lost the game in the final minutes. And Michigan State is rated the best team in the Nation."

Tony Molinare already has a team ready to go.

Arlington High Loses by Forfeit

ARLINGTON, Ore. (AP) — Arlington High School lost the Wheat League six-man football championship by forfeit Monday.

Five games were forfeited because of use of an ineligible player.

As a result Fossil and Condon, tied for second place, will meet in a playoff game Tuesday night. The winner will meet Cascade Locks in the finals of district 2 play.

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BOROS 'PRO OF YEAR'

CHICAGO (AP) — The dramatic rise of Julius Boros from obscurity to fame and fortune in one season Tuesday earned him professional golfer's highest award.

The 32-year-old Hungarian-born swinger was selected "professional golfer of the year" by the Professional Golfers' Association.

He received an overwhelming 314 votes in a poll of PGA members and sportswriters. Runnerup Sam Snead got only 25 votes.

Boros has been a professional only three years.

He never won a major golf tournament, professional or amateur, until he captured the National Open title at Dallas, Tex., last June. He parlayed this championship with a number of other purses and emerged golf's leading money winner with a total of more than \$37,000.

In the "golfer of the year" award is its fifth year. Ben Hogan won in 1948, 1950 and 1951. Snead was winner in 1949.
