as the elegant lady. She is strictly feminine and never wears slacks in public. Her elegance has been carefully acquired and is a reaction from her original background.

"Marilyn Monroe wears low necklines and tight skirts because she is merchandising her assets. She would be silly not to. Her attire tabs her as a girl who is ambitious to be well known.

"Stoner volunteered to name the best- and worst-dressed males in the movie business.

"It would have to name Gary Grant as the best-dressed," he observed. "His taste is impeccable. Not only does he always wear

good-looking clothes, he also has something that few men possess—fear. Gary can put on a \$15 sport shirt from a mail-order house, turn up the collar and make it look terrific.
