for the program he laid out in his campaign "crusade." House control apparently hinged on the outcome in a half dozen or more districts created by reapportionment of voting strength, with only a vote or two likely to separate total Republican and Democratic strength.

There was a distinct possibility heavy absentee balloting might affect the outcome of the House control battle. Winners in four races in Washington state, for instance, might be determined by absentee votes, of which there were an estimated 90,000.

The Senate contest was just as tight. Republicans had gained a net of one seat and needed to win four of nine undecided races to seat 48 Republicans in addition to Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who turned independent and supported Stevenson.

If the GOP won the four outstanding races in which they were leading—in Kentucky, Wyoming, Arizona and Michigan—they could organize the senate Jan. 3 with Morse's help.

Mr. Morse, who won't say how he will vote on the question, joined the Democrats that party could organize the Senate with the tie-breaking vote of Vice President Barkley.

Then the Republicans would have to wait until Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California, swept into office by the Eisenhower landslide, becomes vice president 17 days later to reverse the result.

Stevenson was able to hold together only the tattered remnants of the once solid south, plus possibly Kentucky and Missouri in the border states, by his campaign of "talking sense to the American people."

His running mate, Sen. John Sparkman, helped salvage his home state of Alabama, but not more else. In Springfield, Ill., Stevenson philosophically conceded the victory to Eisenhower, called on all American to "close ranks" and pledged his support to the winner.

Eisenhower, widely cheered when he appeared in a New York hotel ballroom, matched his opponent's unity plea, said it was "a day of dedication rather than triumph" and pledged that he never will give "short weight" to his responsibilities in Washington.

In his sweep, Eisenhower carried two states the Republicans haven't been able to capture since 1924, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

He won or was out in front in 15 states where the Republicans since 1928—Arizona, California, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Minnesota, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia and Washington.

But his landslide wasn't quite as widespread as that registered by Hoover, since Eisenhower couldn't break into West Virginia, Kentucky and North Carolina as the former president did in 1928.

In some respects, Eisenhower's was more of a personal than a party victory. Although he helped elect Republican administrations in many states, there was tough sledding for the GOP in Senate and House battles and gubernatorial races.

The general's friend and one of his earliest presidential rosters, Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., conceded defeat by his Democratic opponent, Rep. John F. Kennedy in the Massachusetts senatorial race.

Republican Sen. James P. Kempton went down to defeat and Sen. Harry Cain of Washington lost to Rep. Henry M. Jackson. Eisenhower carried Washington but Missouri still was in doubt.

In Ohio, Democratic Gov. Frank Lausche won going away from Charles Taft, brother of the senator, despite Eisenhower's heavy majority over Stevenson in the state.

On the other hand, Eisenhower's surge helped Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin and William E. Jenner of Indiana get reelected. Both were prime targets for Democratic attack in the campaign.

Basin Rain Below Normal

Klamath's October rainfall is only a fraction of the normal precipitation for that month and a tiny sprinkle of a percentage of the total fall in October last year. The figures released today by the Bureau of Reclamation show total precipitation last month was only 1.4 inches as compared with a normal of 1.05 inches and 2.09 inches in October, 1951.

Mean temperature last month was 55.3 degrees, somewhat warmer than the 47.8 last October and the 49.7 normal for October. Highest temperature recorded during the month was 87 degrees, and the lowest was 31.

There were 19 clear days, six partly cloudy days and six cloudy days during October. Reservoir storage shows Upper Klamath Lake below last year's storage level with 247,920 acre feet stored as of Nov. 1, 1952, as compared with 252,300 acre feet a year ago.

Gerber reservoir, however, was up twice as high as last year, measuring 39,090 acre feet this year as compared with 18,260 acre feet last year.

Clear Lake is up almost three times last year's capacity, with 193,170 acre feet as compared with 6,900 last year.
