You know, I'm finding that I'm a little dazed. I think that in this latest Presidential campaign for generations I had come to the unconscious conclusion that the world would wake up on November 5 and be UTTERLY DIFFERENT from the world we knew when we went to sleep on the night of November 4.

It isn't in its fundamentals, I mean. The quality of the sunshine we had known before. Water still quenches thirst. Red hot iron still burns painfully if you put your finger on it. The force of gravity still pulls things DOWN instead of UP.

At Bing's Cafe, over on Klamath avenue, the day after the election, a little old lady was sitting at the end of the counter ordering some lunch. She was probably 65, grey-haired, alert, attractive.

The waitress, making conversation with a pleasant customer, said to her: "What do you think of the election?"

She answered: "Young lady, it's like this: History tells us it didn't take many Americans to take this country away from the Indians, but it took 31 million of us yesterday to take it away from Truman."

That was a good crack. I imagine the little old lady had read her history understandingly.

More than a century ago, Lord Macaulay, the great English historian, statesman, essayist and political philosopher, wrote to a friend in America in somewhat this vein: "Your American system of government is the greatest institution in the political history of mankind. It is utterly admirable. But I doubt if it will endure in its present form. The time will come when astute demagogues will learn that they can use the POWER OF THE MAJORITY to open the doors of the treasury and scoop out its contents to their followers as a reward for VOTING RIGHT. When that happens, your American system will fail."

Those aren't Macaulay's exact words, but they convey the gist of what he said in his letter to his American friend.

Well, that is about what had happened to us.

Clever demagogues had learned how to perpetuate themselves in power. One of them, back in the beginning of the new system, put it this way: "We can tax and spend and spend and spend and ELECT AND ELECT AND ELECT. The 'gentle rain of government checks' that was relied upon to keep the people happy and drugged became an established part of the new system. It is said on good authority that 24 million Americans now receive government checks.

At each election came around, the people were reminded that if they VOTED OUT THE PARTY IN POWER this pleasant "rain" of government checks would dry up. The farmers were told that if they voted Republican that their subsidies would be cut off and they would be left out on the well-known limb. Big Labor was told that if the Republicans were permitted to come back into power Big Labor's special privileges would be cut off with disastrous results to everyone who works for wages.

And so on. In general, people were taught to believe that ALL GOOD THINGS FLOW FROM BIG GOVERNMENT, centralized in Washington. It began to look as if what Lord Macaulay had predicted more than a century ago had come to pass.

We had come to call this system "Trumanism." Truman, of course, wasn't the originator of it. He was just the latest practitioner. He certainly followed its basic principles in his 1952 whistle-stop campaign.

But—the unexpected happened! As the old lady getting her lunch over at Bing's cafe put it the other day, 31 million Americans arose in their might and TOOK THE COUNTRY AWAY FROM TRUMANISM.

It really was an epochal event.

It is because it was epochal in its nature that we still have the feeling that an old world ended on the fourth day of NOVEMBER, 1952, and a new world began. That isn't strictly true. What REALLY happened is that 31 million Americans lost faith in the cynical new world that had been forced upon us and decided to go back to the fundamentals upon which the American way of life had been built.

That is about the long and short of it. The old lady put it pretty well. Let's hope these 31 million Americans have the courage to stick with it until we get RE-ESTABLISHED on our old firm foundation.

That's the problem that now confronts us.

Clover Seed Good For Cash Loans

Alaska clover at present doesn't have a market, and a lot of Klamath farmers are wondering how to get by for a while and still retain their hold on some 5,000,000 (M) pounds of seed in storage here until prices get better.

At least one local bank and the Production and Marketing Administration are prepared to make loans on the local crop. One banker here said chances are good the market price will increase considerably from where it stands now.

At the moment the market talk isn't much better than the federal support price of 25 cents.

Problem bothering many farmers has been how to finance for the coming year without selling their clover. The loan offers may be a good answer.
