Legislature Plans Meeting

PORTLAND (AP)—The next Oregon Legislature, which will have only 12 Democrats among its 90 members, will hold a meeting here Nov. 21 to get a running start on the session's business.

Rudy Wilhelm, Portland, who apparently is assured of enough pledges to make him speaker of the House, said the meeting was being called principally at the request of the Code Revision Council.

That group has completed a survey of Oregon law, aimed at simplifying the Oregon code of laws. The next step will be up to the Legislature. Compressing the Oregon code of 10 volumes into three volumes.

Wilhelm said he is mailing letters to the 90 House members, inviting them to the meeting.

Sen. Eugene E. Marsh, McMinnville, who is expected to be Senate president, is inviting Senate members to the planning session.

The House will have 24 new members, but will have the same party split as in the last session, 51 Republicans and 9 Democrats.

The Senate will have 12 new members, 26 Republicans and 4 Democrats. Last time the Democrats had nine.

Sailors Plan Strike Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—AFL sailors protesting government delay in approving a strike-won 5 per cent wage boost will hold stop-work meetings Friday in Pacific coast ports.

"We might stay out until midnight," said Harry Johnson, assistant secretary of the 15,000-member Sailors Union of the Pacific. "The membership is getting hot about this deal."

The meetings were scheduled to start at 10 a.m. in San Francisco, Seattle, Portland and San Pedro-Long Beach.

The sailors have refused since Tuesday to sign aboard outboard ships owned by the Pacific Maritime Association — with whom they negotiated the wage increase in July. It boosted base monthly wages from \$287.90 to \$302.40.

The proposed increase was filed with the Wage Stabilization Board in Washington Aug. 13.

Sailors refused Thursday to sign aboard the Hawaiian Craftsman, scheduled to sail from Portland to Hawaii, and the Hawaiian Planter, bound from Portland to Seattle.

Jury Hears Girl's Story

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A county grand jury yesterday heard a former stewardess tell her story about the slaying of an airline official, then refused to indict her.

Pretty Mrs. Thomas H. Van Bibber, 20, testified for 55 minutes. Her testimony remained secret.

Lawrence Keil, an Otark's Air Line superintendent, was fatally shot last Feb. 18 in front of the girl's apartment, Mrs. Van Bibber, whose name then was Betty Lou Tracy, worked for the same airline.

Police quoted her as saying she shot Keil, 42-year-old father of two children, because he threatened her life for associating with other men.

Japan Joins Flying Group

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The United Nations General Assembly voted Thursday to permit Japan to join the International Civil Aviation Organization.

The vote was 53 to nine with six abstentions—the Soviet bloc plus the Philippines.

The vote came on a resolution submitted by Canada, Peru, the United States and Venezuela.

The 20-year-old girl made her professional debut only a week ago at the Mocambo, famed Sunset strip playground of movie stars and Texas oilbarons.

On the strength of this first night club stint, Paramount has signed her for the lead opposite Donald O'Connor in "The Big Song and Dance." It also earned her smaller parts in "Forever Female" and "Houdini."

A few months ago, this girl confined her singing to the shower, although her father, Ray Gilbert, is a famous song writer and coach of such singers as Tony Martin, Terri Arden and others.

She had been working as a model until last summer. Then she told her father that she thought she could sing. He took a listen, and as he puts it: "She discovered herself right under my nose."
