Spud Market Stays Stable

Klamath Basin potatoes on the San Francisco market were bringing 4.25 this week for U.S. No. 1 grade, and four-ounce minimums were bringing 4.65 per hundred pounds according to the weekly potato crop review of the OSC extension service.

On the Los Angeles market, U.S. No. 1A's from the Klamath Basin sold for 4.75 to 4.90 a hundred, and six-ounce minimums were selling for 5.90.

Nov. 4 street sales at Los Angeles for Idaho Russets brought 4.75 to 5.00 for U.S. No. 1A's with a few selling from 4.40 to 5.35. Six-ounce minimums from Deschutes sold for 5.50 to 5.75 per hundredweight.

At Chicago Nov. 4, the supply was liberal, demand light and market dull and slower. Carlot track sales of washed Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1's, brought 4.90 to 5.10 per hundred pound sack, with unwashed Russets bringing 4.75 to 4.90.

At Idaho Falls the same day offerings were described as rather light and the market slightly weaker. Sales 10.8, shipping point for U.S. No. 1 Russets in 100-pound sacks, medium to large in size, ranged in price from 3.95 to 4.10 with most sales at 4.00 to 4.05. A few of the best larger sizes brought 4.15 to 4.20 and the small to mediums brought 3.85 to 3.95. These prices are about a nickel below a week ago.

Crash Fatal

ASHLAND—A highway crash killed Edward C. Whitton, 46, Ashland rancher, Wednesday night. Whitton's car and an empty lumber truck driven by Marjorie Huddleston, Grants Pass, collided head-on south of here.

Huddleston told investigators that he saw Whitton's car coming down the wrong side of the road so he swerved. Whitton swerved too, and they hit.

Chiloquin Police Officer Resigns

CHILOQUIN—Fredrick (Fritz) Hildebrand, agency officer in juvenile and social work here, has resigned his job to return to his home in Tacoma.

Hildebrand is the second Chiloquin officer to resign in a week. Police Chief Archie Huff submitted his resignation effective last week. No reason has been made public for the resignations, and at present the city is without an official police force, though deputies are carrying on police duties.

Man Guilty In Cafe Theft

A man listed as Adolph Peter Burch, 31, pleaded guilty in Circuit Court yesterday afternoon to a charge of burglary, not in a dwelling—the theft of a safe from Wali's restaurant on Main Street Oct. 20.

He is to be sentenced later. Burch said his true name is Frank O. Gagnon, and he is believed to be wanted in Portland on a criminal charge.

He has admitted participation in the burglary at the restaurant. The small safe was hauled out of the building, chiseled open and robbed of some \$167. Burch was arrested here in town by City Police a few hours after the burglary.

A charge of larceny in a store was placed against him, but that charge was dismissed yesterday in Circuit Court because it is debatable whether a restaurant is a store. Burch was free for a few minutes, but was informed that the burglary charge would be drawn up. He waited at the Court-house until the papers of the new charge were prepared.

He waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment. Judge David R. Vandenberg postponed passing sentence.

Church Enters New Program

The First Methodist Church Official Board here recently voted to retire an old mortgaged indebtedness to its Home Missions Board and also to enter into the new Forward Movement program. For new Methodist Churches in Oregon, All the Methodist Churches of the Pacific Northwest Area are supporting this million dollar campaign to extend the influence and service of the church in new neighborhoods, on college campuses, and in church supported social agency centers.

Of the total local goal of \$10,000 the first \$5,000 is for the retirement of the Home Missions Board mortgage, and the balance of \$5,000 is for the new Forward Movement.

The Klamath Falls church was prompted to take this action when it was reported that Oregon's population has increased over one third during the past ten years, and as of 1932 only one fourth of Oregon's citizens are members of any church.

An enthusiastic kick-off dinner for all leaders and workers is to be held at the church Monday evening, and a victory dinner for all the church fellowship is tentatively set for Nov. 11.
