

# Promoter Signs Tag Team Bout

# HUSKIES STEP UP

## Blocked Kick Is Margin

The Merrill Huskies won the District 5 football championship last night, and clinched a quarter-final berth in the Oregon High School Class B tournament, by edging out the invading Jacksonville Redskins 13-12. The game was witnessed by 500 chilled fans on Merrill field.

Coch Ray Rader's out-weighted Huskies came from behind an early six-point deficit, and near perfect place kick from the toe of Merrill's Jack Hendrickson proved to be the margin of victory. The Huskies' line, hard charging in the clutch, blocked both Jacksonville conversion attempts.

Jacksonville kicked off the scoring early in the first period when the Redskins' LeRoy Clay crashed over left tackle from one yard out. The score was set up by a 15 yard pass and run play going from Don Clay, the other half of Jacksonville's deadly brother combination, to right end Dick Sousa. The attempted kick for conversion was blocked by Jack Hendrickson, who turned in an outstanding performance from his right guard post.

**TIE GAME**  
Merrill roared back to tie the game just four minutes after the Redskins' touchdown. The Huskies' score capped an 11-play 80-yard drive. Merrill tailback Jerry Wolfram sped the last five yards around right end.

Johnny O'Neill's attempt to run the conversion was halted by the Redskins line. The Huskies took the lead in the title contest midway in the third period when Johnny O'Neill pitched a 20-yard strike to right end Dale McCulloch who took the ball over his shoulder in the end zone.

Jack Hendrickson then stepped back and calmly booted the ball squarely between the uprights for the 13th Merrill point, and the championship.

**FOUGHT**  
Coach Ed Rooney's Redskins fought down to the final gun though, and racked up their second score with four minutes left in the final quarter. Don Clay charged over right tackle for the counter punch, clinched a 58-yard touchdown drive.

Merrill's Jack Hendrickson again proved his value by breaking through the Redskins line and dropping Don Clay for a 5 yard loss as Jacksonville speedster tried to run the conversion.

**BREAK**  
Although the final play of the Huskies should not be detracted from, the real break in the contest was an inexcusable blunder on the part of the Redskins quarterback.

In the dying seconds of the first half, LeRoy Clay blocked a Merrill punt on the Merrill 14-yard line and one play later, brother Don ran the ball to the Merrill one-foot line. Then as the seconds ticked off the timer's clock, the Jacksonville play-caller failed to call a time-out to conserve time. Instead of having time to run two plays, the Redskins could only squeeze in one, and it failed as Don Clay fell just one inch short of the goal line as the timer's horn ended the first period.

In winning last night's game, the Merrill squad earned the right to meet the champion of District 6, Class B. That team will be decided Tuesday night when Maupin plays Moro at Maupin. Maupin has beaten Moro once in a non-counting game, and is favored to repeat.

Merrill's game with either Maupin or Moro will be played on the District 6 champion's field.

## Video Patrons Allowed to See Better Pigskinners in Action

**NEW YORK (AP)**—No one will win a popularity contest for seeing so, but the committee which chose the 11 college football games to be televised nationally this season did quite a remarkable job of long-range forecasting.

A very little research on our part discloses that of the first 10 ranking teams in the latest Associated Press poll, eight either have been seen in action at this point or will have visited the parlors and barrooms of the nation when the final telecast is made Nov. 24.

The only two ranking teams who will have played entirely to live audiences are Maryland, the current No. 2, and Tennessee, No. 8. Already seen or coming up soon are Michigan State (1), Georgia Tech (3), Oklahoma (4), UCLA (5), USC (6), Kansas (7), Purdue (9) and Notre Dame (10).

Of course, the indoor sports have sat through a number of clinkers, too, and it is quite true that there was no great popular demand for the Yale-Cornell struggle of three weeks ago. Still, we feel what by its fine overall selection the NCAA has done much to lay the original virulent criticism of its ban on unlimited TV.

Were it not for the plan, it is highly doubtful that today's top game between Oklahoma and Notre Dame would have been available on screens in every section of the country. Next Saturday Georgia Tech, the Sugar Bowl team, will be seen against Alabama, and on the following Saturday the nation will sit in on what promises to be the year's greatest attraction on the West Coast between UCLA and USC. Is that bad?

If one can believe everything he hears, Jack (Doc) Kearns, the old light manager, has lost none of the sure, deft touch which enabled him to close all the banks in Shelby, Mont., and practically turn its citizens into the streets back in the vigorous '30s.

Jack's current main ticket, light-heavyweight champion Joey Maxim, has just been signed to defend his title against Archie Moore on Dec. 17 in St. Louis. The official announcement said that Maxim was guaranteed 45 per cent of the net receipts, and that the fight would have to draw at least \$100,000 to be successful. No fight has ever drawn that much in St. Louis.

The word around here, not quite so official but not idle gossip either, is that Kearns gave in only after a flat guarantee of \$100,000.

There is no wish here to put undue pressure on a man who has just been elected president and needs a rest, but sooner or later Gen. Eisenhower is going to have to answer the report going around that he played a jax of baseball for money back when he was a student at West Point.

Specifically, the nation's leader-elect is supposed to have played under the name of "Wilson" in the old Central Kansas League during the season of 1912. Obviously enough, records show that there were, indeed, a number of "Wilson" in the league that year, one of them a pretty good hitter.

The point is, of course, that if the future President did play pro ball between classes at the Military Academy he was guilty of the same offense which caused a contemporary of his named Jim Thorpe to be stripped of his Olympic medals. Our understanding is that Dan Ferris, the secretary of the AAU, has been looking into the matter.

## Hunting Closed

"No hunting" bans were posted in a dozen states Saturday as the result of widespread forest fires and the unusually dry fall weather in some Eastern, Midwestern and Southern sections of the United States.

Mississippi and Virginia joined the list of no hunting states Friday, and the number may be increased. Several states now open to hunting are thinking of imposing bans, and others have postponed the opening of gunning seasons.

Other states in which hunting presently is banned are Alabama, Arkansas, Kansas, Kentucky, Missouri, Rhode Island, Tennessee, West Virginia, Georgia and Oklahoma.

In addition, hunting is forbidden in some sections of Massachusetts, New Jersey and Colorado. Louisiana, Gov. Robert Kenyon has put all hunters in the Bayou state "on their honor" to stay out of the woods. He says he has no legal authority to close the season there.

Hunting season has been postponed in Iowa, North Dakota and pend hunting Nov. 10 unless rains relieve the fire hazard.

### Ace Rider Is Injured

**LINCOLN, R.I. (AP)** — Tony Despirito, the nation's leading jockey with 332 victories, has accepted seven riding engagements at Lincoln Downs Saturday despite a severely swollen left wrist.

The 37-year-old Lawrence, Mass. rider, suffered the injury early Thursday morning when he was thrown while exercising a horse.

The injury became so aggravated Friday that he was forced to cancel four engagements after winning the third race.

Despirito is aiming at the 388-winners record set by Walter Miller in 1906 and equaled by Joey Culmore and Willie Shoemaker in 1950.

**MEXICO CITY (AP)** — College of Idaho ran wild against Mexico's National University Friday to post a 55-20 victory in their international football game.

The Coyotes of Caldwell, Idaho, rolled up a 27-7 first quarter advantage and were ahead at the half, 34-20. Rain fell heavily in the second half.
