Paul Henreid Searching For 'Great Love Story'

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Behind the Screen: Paul Henreid, who once ran Charles Boyer a race as a romantic continental, has his fingers all primed to grab at the first love story that's offered him. It's been lean pickings in the romantic field for Paul and he wonders "why Hollywood isn't making the great love stories any longer? I don't understand it. Who ever does a big romantic story again will clean up at the box office."
