Sex Slayer Wins Time - SAN RAFAEL, Calif. (AP) - Snatched from the gas chamber by a court order, hillbilly musician Henry Ford McCracken Saturday had at least two months' grace for the sex slaying of 10-year-old Patricia Jean Hull.

After hearing testimony from psychiatrists, acting Superior Judge N. Charles Brunatori Friday ruled McCracken sane. He said he would fix an execution date at from 60 to 90 days in the future.

The 34-year-old Santa Ana slayer was scheduled to die in the Quentin gas chamber last Friday. In a last-minute order, Judge Brunatori granted his lawyers their request for a sanity hearing.

OLCC Studies Liquor Plan - PORTLAND (AP) - William A. Spangier, chairman of the Oregon Liquor Commission, said Friday the commission was wondering about the liquor-by-the-drink program, approved by voters last Tuesday.

The amendment said the law was to go in effect 60 days after the general election. That is Jan. 4. It also specified that the Legislature must formulate the law under which the liquor is to be sold, and the Legislature will not meet until Jan. 12.

"We must await advice from the attorney general and the Legislature before we can act," Spangier said. "We administer the law - we've got to wait and see what the law is."

Highway Commission Opens Bids for 21 Road Projects

SALEM (AP) - The Oregon Highway Commission will open bids in Portland Nov. 30 on 21 projects, costing \$1,800,000.

Projects are: Douglas County - Grading and paving 1.7 miles about 3 miles south of Winchester Bay.

Douglas - Construct 100-foot and 197-foot concrete viaducts at junction of Pacific and Elkton-Sutherland Highways near Sutherland.

Grant and Harney - Produce 1,400 cubic yards of crushed rock 10 miles south of John Day.

Jackson - Construct maintenance building addition in Medford.

Malheur - Produce 8,450 cubic yards of crushed rock on Central Oregon Highway east of Juntura.

Marion - Construct traffic signals and illuminated signs at junction of Pacific Highway and 12th Street, south of Salem.

Multnomah - Construct Arata Road interchange on Banfield Expressway between Fairview and Troutdale.

Multnomah - Construct 183-foot timber and steel trestle over railroad tracks on Cereghino Haul road 1 1/2 miles west of Fairview.

Multnomah - Install irrigating system and lawn on Tillamook Street-Steel Bridge unit of Pacific Highway West in Portland.

Coos - Paving 2.78 miles of Coos River secondary highway 3 miles east of Coos Bay.

Coos and Douglas - Produce 10,700 cubic yards of crushed rock on Coos Bay-Roseburg Highway.

Curry - Construct utility building, latrine, water system, electrical system, sewage system and grading and surfacing in Humburg Mountain State Park.

Douglas - Construct four concrete viaducts on new Pacific Highway route 5 miles northeast of Yoncalla.

Douglas - Construct three concrete structures on new Pacific Highway 2 miles south of Curtin.

Malheur - Produce 15,200 cubic yards of crushed rock on Jordan Valley and I. O. N. Highways near Jordan Valley.

Marion - Construct Water Street-Commercial Street unit of Center Street Bridge in Salem.

Mission - Construct 157-foot concrete viaduct over West Portland-Hubbard Highway 2 miles north of Hubbard.

Marion - Grading and paving highway junction roadways on West Portland-Hubbard Highway 2 miles north of Hubbard.

Umatilla - Construct culverts on Heppner Highway 14 miles west of Pilot Rock.

Sugis New Engineer

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army Saturday named Maj. Gen. Samuel D. Sugis, Jr., to be the new chief of army engineers, succeeding Lt. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, who will retire at the end of this month upon reaching the statutory retirement age of 62.

Secretary of the Army Frank Pace said Sugis, presently commander of the communication zone of the Army in Europe, will take over his new job as soon as he is able to close out the business of his present command.

Spudmen Hold For Price Hike

Many Klamath potatoemen have been holding their spuds; they've been awaiting higher prices for their produce.

And many who have been saying they wouldn't sell for less than \$4 per hundred pounds apparently are getting their price now.

Though shipments have been steady so far this season, they've been running pretty well behind shipments for the same period last year. Yesterday, however, out-bound shipments hit a seasonal high of 104 carloads—16 by truck and 88 by railroad.

The reason could well be the \$4 being offered for top quality spuds, with reports even of as much as \$4.10 on the local market. U. S. No. 1's here have been getting \$3.75 or better—quite a few at \$3.85 for some time.

Unemployment Payments Up

SALEM (AP) - Jobless benefits to Oregon's unemployed last month totaled \$754,782—the highest amount for any October since 1949—the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Friday.

The commission said 18,995 were unemployed during the month that is 5,300 more than in September and 3,100 more than in October last year.

Increased unemployment was caused by the shutdown of the logging industry because of high fire danger.

Rancher Used As Roadblock

FARMINGTON, N. M. (AP) - A Rio Arriba County rancher really meant it when he refused permission to an oil company to drive trucks across his property without charge.

Rancher E. H. Kaime set himself up as a human road block to stop trucks going to a Lowry Oil and Gas Company lease about 85 miles south of here. State officials say the road is on Kaime's property and they can't do anything about the matter.

Kaime has set up a tent and bedroll on the remote road and refuses to budge. He was not available for comment.

Livestock

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (AP) - Hogs closed the week mostly steady Saturday after an uptick during the forepart of the period was wiped out Friday when the market fell for the largest one-day run since last February.

Final quotations saw barrows and gilts steady with last week-end while sows were 25 to 50 cents lower. A healthier undertone prevailed in the market, supported by higher wholesale pork prices, a good demand from order buyers and, until Friday, moderate receipts.

Receipts of cattle were cut back sharply during the week, down 26 per cent from the previous week and the smallest since July. Steers, yearlings and heifers wound up selling on an unevenly steady to \$1.00 higher basis. Cows and bulls declined but vealers advanced.

Slaughter lambs closed the week strong. Yearlings and sheep gained around 25 to 50 cents. Eastern shipping interests were back in the market on a small scale for the first time in several weeks, reflecting an advance in choice and prime dressed lamb at New York late in the week.
