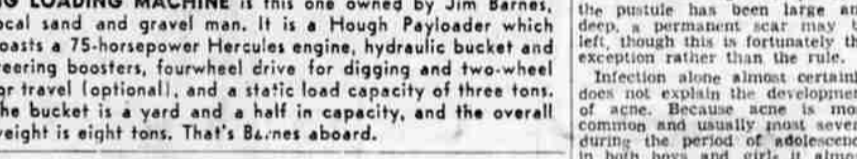

Maverick Sen William Langer May Run Judiciary Committee

WASHINGTON (P) - A big question mark hung over the future of the Senate's internal security subcommittee today in an ironic twist to the Republican election victory. In the last two years, under the chairmanship of Democratic Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada, the subcommittee has supplanted the House Un-American Activities Committee as the chief congressional group probing for Communist influences in and out of government.

Republican control of the Senate will knock McCarran out of his Judiciary Committee chairmanship, and the outlook is that his successor will be Sen. William Langer (R-ND). Langer was among the small band of senators who fought two years ago in a dramatic all-night session to uphold President Truman's veto of the Internal Security Act sponsored by McCarran.

Ike's Election Good For United States Economy

NEW YORK (P) - A fast rolling economy took the election in stride this week. Financial and industrial circles generally were pleased. But there was no overwhelming reaction to the Eisenhower victory. Most businessmen and industrialists already were convinced production would remain high over the next six months regardless of the outcome of the voting.

U.S. Moves In Ship Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (P) - The federal government moved Saturday to present a west coast shipping tieup spreading beyond 28 ships already held in port by a walkout of AFL sailors. The Sailors Union of the Pacific announced Friday its contract with shipowners had been nullified by failure of the Wage Stabilization Board to approve a wage increase.

Rookie Cop Kills Brother

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (P) - Home from the wars, a job as rookie patrolman on the San Antonio police force, and a date with his kid brother for a football game. That was the outlook late yesterday for Harold E. Manley, 21. Then a pistol he was unloading discharged, the kid brother - 19-year-old Billy Manley - was hit in the stomach, and died in agony just 45 minutes later.

Adlai Mulls Demo Future

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (P) - The future plans and leadership of the Democratic party were chief topics of discussion today at a meeting of Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson and two of the party's top leaders. Stephen Mitchell, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and Wilson Wyatt, campaign manager for the Democratic presidential nominee, were summoned to the conference.

Louis, New York, nationally known photographer of children, will speak here, Wednesday, Nov. 19, 8 p.m., to members of the Klamath Camera Club, 228 N. 8th Street. Louis, on a five months coast-to-coast trip, will lecture before more than 40 camera clubs in an effort to stimulate interest and greater proficiency in portraiture. This program is being conducted under the auspices of the Photographic Society of America, an organization composed of 7,000 members and over 600 camera clubs.
