

It Happened This Way in New Pine Creek

How fortunate! What a glorious relief here at election time when those almost constant vitriolic campaign blasts are flying—to have accessible to our rainer remote communities such heavily musical performances as "The Angelicals" of the Community Concert series!

This quintet of five stellar harpists played in concert at the new Grade School auditorium in Alton last Wednesday evening. A considerable number of New Pine Creek and Lakeview concert enthusiasts attended on that very lovely arrangement wherein those having tickets for the three local concerts in Lakeview, likewise can take in the neighboring community concerts in Alton and Klamath Falls, flow into this almost treacherous value of the concert tickets by bringing added Carnegie Hall performances within our reach.

It seems almost too good to be true or to last but I venture to predict if this practice does continue, Cary's Skaterdancer Hall will have to be used to accommodate the crowds.

If you like any kind of music you would hear the Angelicals! My Gosh! you never saw such elegant feminine loveliness nor heard anything more sensational yet so serenely beautiful to play upon your auditory organs. This array of magnificent talent leaves one with an experience long to remember.

Aside from the sheer beauty of this quintet and rare type of music which contained intermittent strains and cadences that were simply out of this world, the artistic use of the harp's hands and arms was a study in interpretative gracefulness like the art of dancing.

We had a brief interview with the leader of the ensemble, Virginia Werner, who organized the quintet in 1929, the first of its sort ever to be thusly organized. A rather small person with a big feeling of warmth and sincerity emanating from her gracious personality, she is also responsible for many of the arrangements played. When asked if she had much trouble transporting the bulky instruments she said they managed it easily. They have a special trailer built for this purpose and it goes right along with them behind their car.

We also spoke a word with Elyse Yockey, the one playing the central position on the stage, who is responsible for the modern element of jazz which was injected into the more popular numbers played. She was also slight of build and very beautiful. In common interest with a fiddler's calloused finger tips, she displayed the tips of her dainty fingers, each with a small, round, bearing the marked callus of her

profession where they pluck and rake across the steel strings of the harp. She, like Jeanne Fink of the quintet, began her musical career on the piano then shifted to the harp which she thinks is more intriguing and challenging presumably to her musical talents. With the harp the artists have seven foot pedals with which to modulate and develop certain tonal effects on the harp.

On the local Community Concert series Oct. 27th, De La Fuente and Sitash delighted one of the largest crowds ever yet to attend the concert series in the past in the Lakeview High School auditorium. Fuentis on his sweet-toned, Italian violin thrilled the audience with a large range of classic and well-known favorite selections. Fuentis' accompanist, Herbert Sessin, co-starred on the piano to share in winning the hearts of the audience. Both displayed a complete mastery of their instruments and the program was arranged so the both instruments blended well to give the maximum entertainment. Those from here who attended the concert were all in accord in acclaiming the concert a rare treat—something not to have missed!
