

OWLS BLOW TITLE CHANCE

OTI Dull In 12-13 Setback

Oregon Tech, highly favored to capture the Oregon collegiate Conference football title without much more effort than a deep breath, now has a fight on its hands for the runner-up spot.

It's now sad history that Bill McArthur's Oregon College Wolves turned back the Owls, 13-12, Saturday at Monmouth to grab its third straight OCC title and its fifth straight victory over the Hilltoppers.

Many reasons can be given for the Owls blowing their title chance, the greatest in the three-year history of the league.

But, in a nutshell, it was a case of Oregon College playing inspired ball against a team that indifferently went through the motions.

PLAY BOOK
Now the Owls have a date with Eastern Oregon, their last conference foe, Saturday at La Grande. Oregon Tech must win to tie down second place in the league. The Mountaineers can do the same thing with a victory.

The Wolves beat the Owls with a late 80-yard march that cashed in on a special play McArthur had cooked up for the Owls.

It's an old play but seldom used. It worked twice against the Owls, the second time for a touchdown.

Guard Bob Hart, pivoted in the line with his back to Oregon Tech's forward wall. Quarterback Gene Owens faked a hand-off to a halfback, shoved the ball in Hart's tummy.

The big guard merely followed Owens around into the secondary and broke loose for a touchdown that tied the score 12-all.

Owens placement kick gave the Wolves the win.

SPECIAL
Glen Humphreys worked the "guard special" from the other side during the 80-yard march that added 15 yards and put the Wolves on the 31-yard line.

On fourth down, with a yard to go from the 22-yard line, Hart squirmed loose for the winning touchdown.

Len Genetin, Oregon Tech's halfback, suffered a badly-gashed eye on Oregon Tech's first offensive play. He returned on the third play of the second quarter to punt out of his own end zone with a large patch over his left eye.

The questionable move by the Oregon Tech coaches, sending a one-eyed man in to punt, cost Oregon Tech its first touchdown after the two teams had battled scoreless in the first quarter.

End Joe Roberts barreled in to block Genetin's punt, while end Ray Hubbard covered the loose ball for the Wolves' first score. Charley Plinton, Oregon College's best running back, missed the kick for extra point.

TIE SCORE
Late in the second quarter, Oregon Tech tied the score when Don Foreman whizzed around end from seven yards out. Genetin's kick was blocked and the intermission score was 6-all.

The third period was scoreless too but early in the fourth chapter Jack Brown and Johnny Henlee teamed up for a 68-yard touchdown pass.

Henslee caught the ball near the sidelines on Oregon College's 40 and raced the rest of the way to scoring territory.

Odde Canada tried the extra point this time but booted wide as the Owls took a 12-6 lead.

Hubert Deavers, a substitute halfback, sparked the Wolves on their 80-yard touchdown drive that gave them the title with a 3-0 league record.

Pels End With 6-2 Grid Mark

The KU Pelicans beat Bend's Lava Bears only in the scoring department Saturday afternoon on Modoc Field, but that's what counts. Bend led in yardage and first downs, but the Pels won 33-25.

It was the final game of the season for the local high school team, and the year was ended with a respectable six wins in eight outings. Bend has at least another game, in the quarter-finals of the state football playoff this coming weekend.

The Lava Bears were scouted by representatives of Jefferson High, Portland, Saturday afternoon, and the scouting report undoubtedly is that Bend is a two-man team—Halfbacks Miles Boardman and Bill Robeck. They can run.

This Boardman carried the ball 21 times Saturday, and amassed 204 yards on the ground for himself. Robeck, a 155-pounder, carried the leather 18 times from scrimmage and totaled 117 yards.

The Pels gained only a net 205 yards from scrimmage.

DIFFERENCE
However, Cal Gilmore, senior halfback playing his final game for the Pels, made up the difference by intercepting a couple of passes from Bend's not-too-accurate quarterback, Volney Sigmond, one for a 32-yard touchdown runback and the other for 93 yards and a scoring runback.

The Pels scored the first time they had the ball, covering 74 yards in 14 plays. Jim Dougherty went through right tackle for the final six, and Vernon Fryor's kick was no good.

That was all the scoring in the first quarter. Bend marched down to the Klamath 21 and lost the ball on downs. But as the quarter ended, End Melvin Loy covered a Dougherty fumble on the Pels' 12.

Three plays later, in the second period, Boardman hit center for three yards and a touchdown.

BEND LEADS
Bill Gilmer, reserve guard, dropped the extra point and Bend led 7-0.

Unbeatens Shrink to 23
NEW YORK (U)—The list of unbeaten and untied college football teams stands at 23 Monday, including Georgia Tech, Michigan State, U.C.L.A., Southern California and Maryland.

Topping the nation's all-winning eleven is little Peru Teachers of Nebraska with nine straight. Four schools have been victorious in eight contests, 11 boast seven wins, six have spotless marks in six games and one school has taken all five of its tests.

Six colleges slipped from the elite group over the past weekend. They were Alfred (N.Y.), Lawrence (Wis.), Ricks (Idaho), Findlay (O.), Northern State (SD) and Montclair (N.J.).

led 7-0. After the following kickoff the Pelicans scored in eight plays, Gilmore going the last seven yards. That drive of 63-yards was marked by the only pass the Pels completed all afternoon, a 44-yard gain from Gilmore to End Jay Dearing.

Kenny Young's kick was good and the Pels led 13-7.

Toward the tail end of the second quarter Gilmore intercepted a short pass from Sigmond and dashed for his 32-yard touchdown, and Young ran around end for the conversion. Klamath led 20-7.

But the Lava Bears wouldn't lie down. Two plays and a penalty after the kickoff put them on their own 46, from where Sigmond negotiated a 52-yard scoring pass play to Robeck. The conversion missed fire and Klamath Falls was ahead 20-13 at halftime.

THREATEN
In the third period Bend was knocking again, down within the Pels 20, when Gilmore collared a Sigmond pass down on his own 7, cut over to the left sideline and kept going, 93 yards to a touchdown. Young's kick was good to make the score Klamath 27, Bend 13.

Bend came from its own 21 after the next kickoff down to the Pelican 4 on nine plays and a penalty, and Robeck sped around left end to score. Again the conversion was no good and it was 27-19 as the third quarter ended.

In the fourth period Boardman pulled a dilly. The Lava Bears were stopped on their own 24, fourth down and Boardman went back to punt. But instead of kicking, he took off around his spread-out right end, cut to the left and sailed 76 yards to score without a hand being laid on him. Gilmer's kick was no good again, and the Pels still led 27-25.

Moments later the Pelicans sewed things up, when Kenny Young, also a senior playing his last game, went over the right side of his line for a 37-yard touchdown run.

His kick was no good, but time ran out before the Bears could get anything started.

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Upsets Mark Weekend Grid Play

NEW YORK (U)—The seers were making hasty revisions in their football prognostications today after Saturday's tidal wave of upsets, and to say that they still are reeling from the reversals would be putting it mildly.

Conference championships, which should be about settled, still can go any way, and, more important, the sponsors of the big New Year's Day bowl games are gulping aspirin and hoping things follow the form that marked the first half of the season.

The demise of Oklahoma and Villanova, two of the rapidly diminishing list of unbeaten, were the big upsets. But Kansas, Penn State, Duke and Ohio State, all among the mighty of the land, fell.

And Purdue and Mississippi didn't add any prestige to their records. The Boilermakers could do no more than tie Minnesota, 14-14, and Ole Miss squeaked through to a 6-0 decision over Houston.

Only the big three—Michigan State, Maryland and Georgia Tech—have been holding up. Maryland was idle Saturday, but the Spartans rolled over Indiana, 41-14, and the Engineers clubbed Army, 43-6.

This week, though, they all face tough assignments, possibly their most rugged of the campaign.

Biggie Munn's Staters must entertain Notre Dame, the team that polished off feared Oklahoma, 27-21, last week. That it is too much to expect the Irish to pull off two surprises in a row goes without saying, but this is a team that is capable of giving the country's No. 1 outfit an unpleasant afternoon if it is keyed up.

Maryland meets Mississippi in a battle of unbeaten, Mississippi has been tied twice and came mighty close in its triumph over Houston. But this, too, is a "hungry" team, meaning it is hoping for a bowl bid. Maryland, barred from a post-season game unless the Southern Conference approves, naturally will rule the heavy favorite.

Georgia Tech, already tapped for the Sugar Bowl, will go for its ninth straight triumph when it tangles with Alabama at Atlanta. The Crimson Tide has projected itself into a bowl possibility with its 7-1 record, and has been getting better as the season progresses.

On the Pacific Coast, where the Rose Bowl nomination stands as the lure of the winner, the big game is two weeks hence when Southern California and UCLA meet—and if Southern Cal gets by Washington this Saturday.

While everyone has been talking Southern Cal and UCLA, the Huskies have entered the picture and judging by their 22-7 triumph over California Saturday, they are to be looked upon with cautious eyes. UCLA whipped them earlier, but they've been coming fast.

If, by chance, Washington does beat Southern Cal and the Trojans rebound to beat UCLA, the conference title would end in a three-way tie, and a vote of the conference members would be taken to determine the winner.

Purdue's tie by Minnesota hurt the Boilermakers, who are hoping to win their first Big Ten title in many a moon, but it should not be a catastrophe. However, Stu Holcomb's kids must go against Michigan this week. The Wolverines were the early favorites in the shifting Big Ten race until Purdue took over. This one will be a tossup and the result very possibly could settle the championships.

In the Southwest Conference, the choice still is Texas to set as host team in the Cotton Bowl, but the Longhorns have a toughie in Tex-

as Christian this week. The big game in the Ivy League sends trout-running Yale against Princeton, the defending champion, while in the Big Seven Oklahoma figures to get back in the winning column against Missouri.
